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the 1990s, the number of people in the UK who are employed in the public sector has increased from 10.5 million to 12.5 million (12.5% of the population).

There are a number of reasons why the public sector has grown so rapidly. One of the main reasons is that the government has increased its spending on health, education and social services. This has led to a large increase in the number of people employed in these sectors. Another reason is that the government has created new public sector jobs in areas such as health care, education and social services.

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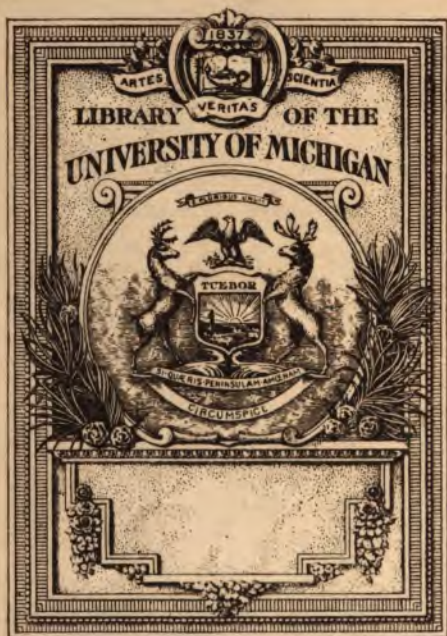
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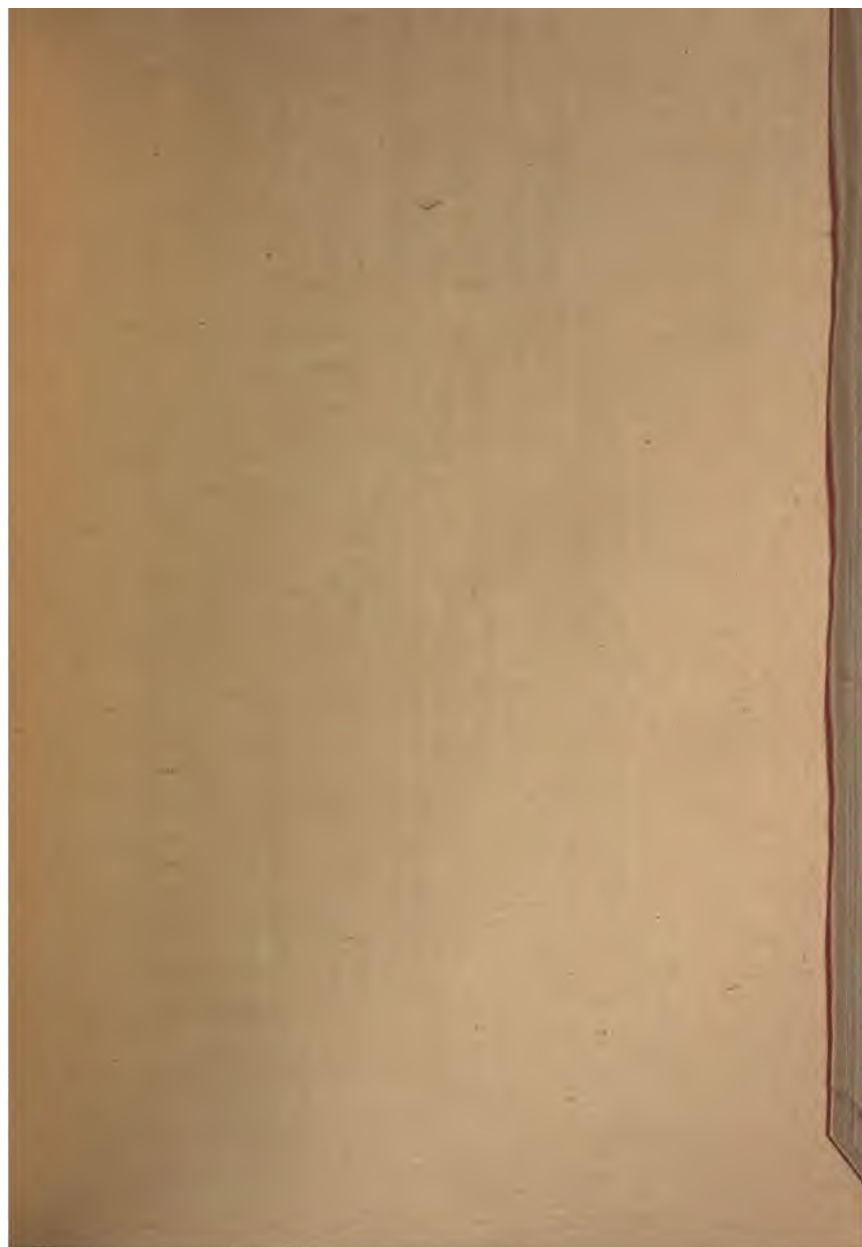
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PREFACE.

A YEAR ago the Autumn Sitting was responsible for the later publication of the LIBERAL YEAR BOOK. 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THE Liberal Central Association is the official organization and headquarters of the Liberal Party.

The Association maintains the necessary offices in Parliament Street for the Chief Whip of the Party and for the permanent officials of the Liberal Central Association. In these offices correspondence is carried on and constant interviews arranged with candidates, officials, and leading Liberals in the constituencies. The Central Association is the medium through which Liberal Associations in search of candidates, and Liberal candidates seeking constituencies, are brought into touch with each other; it stimulates local action in looking after the registration of voters; it undertakes an annual canvass of the London out-voters, and reports the result to the various Associations; it obtains legal advice for Agents on technical points and fresh phases of registration and election law; it publishes and circulates gratuitously to Liberal Agents from time to time digests and summaries of Official documents bearing upon their work; and generally furthers the Party interests in these and other ways.

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FOUNDED in 1877, the Inaugural Meeting was held at Birmingham, and was attended by Mr. Gladstone, who, in an historic speech, welcomed the formation of the new organization.

The Federation is a Union of Liberal Associations established on a popular and representative basis. *All Associations, thus constituted, are eligible for affiliation.* No interference with the local independence of the Federated Associations is involved. *Each Association arranges the details of its own organization and administers its own affairs;* but from time to time, and on all occasions

of emergency, representatives from all the Associations in union are convened to consider the course of action which may be recommended to their respective constituents. No formal political programme is submitted for general acceptance; but the opinion of Liberals on current questions is, as occasion may require, promptly and authoritatively ascertained. Thus the whole strength and resources of the party may be concentrated upon the promotion of such legislation as is, by general consent, deemed of the first importance.

The essential principle of the Federation is the participation of all members of the party in the formation and direction of its policy, and in the selection of those particular measures of reform and progress to which priority shall be given. This object can only be secured by the organization of the party upon a representative basis; that is, by popularly elected local Associations, and by the union of such Associations in a general Federation.

'The Federation is designed to assist the formation of Liberal Associations on a popular representative basis, throughout the country; to bring such organizations into union, so that by this means the opinions of Liberals, on measures to be supported or resisted, may be readily and authoritatively ascertained; and to aid in concentrating, upon the promotion of reforms found to be generally desired, the whole force, strength, and resources of the Liberal Party.'—[*Extract from the original statement of the proposed objects of a National Federation of Liberal Associations.*]

The Constitution of the Federation is as follows:—

(1) An *Executive Committee* consisting of the Officers with not more than twenty other members (Members of Parliament being ineligible) elected by ballot by the General Committee at its first meeting in each year. Its functions are:—

To consider representations from the Federated Associations; to prepare the business for meetings of the Council and General Committee; to prepare the resolutions for these meetings; and generally to carry on the official business of the Federation.

(2) A *General Committee*, consisting of the Officers and Executive Committee together with representatives of each of the Federated Associations and all Liberal Members of Parliament; each Liberal Association representing the whole of a Parliamentary Constituency appointing three members, and Associations other than those representing an entire constituency appointing one member. Its functions are:—

(a) To aid in the formation of Liberal Associations based on popular representation, and generally to promote the objects of the Federation.

(b) To submit to the Federated Associations political questions and measures upon which united action may be considered desirable.

(c) To elect at its first meeting in each year a Chairman of Committee and an Executive Committee, and from time to time to give any instructions it thinks fit to that Committee.

(3) A *Council*, consisting of the Officers and Executive Committee together with representatives of each of the Federated Associations and all Liberal Members of Parliament, each Liberal Association representing the whole of a Parliamentary Constituency appointing one member for every thousand electors or fraction of one thousand electors, and Associations other than those representing an entire constituency appointing members not exceeding three for any one Association. Its functions are:—

To express in its discretion by resolution the opinions of the Liberal Party on such questions as are deemed by general consent to be of the first importance, and generally to act as the authoritative and representative mouthpiece of the rank and file of the Liberal Party throughout England and Wales.

THE Scottish Liberal Association is a Federation of all the Liberal Associations of Scotland. It is divided into two sections—the headquarters of the Eastern Section being at 95 Princes Street, Edinburgh, and that of the Western Section at 7 West George Street, Glasgow. It has affiliated to it all the Liberal organizations in the Scottish constituencies, by whom representatives are sent to form the General Council and the Executive Council of the Association. The former consists of twelve members from each constituency, elected by the local Liberal Associations, and the latter of one member from each constituency, elected in a similar manner. The General Council holds an Annual Meeting either in Edinburgh or Glasgow for the transaction of business, and in addition holds at least one other meeting each year in the provinces, when questions of policy and of the various phases of political action are duly considered.

Through means of its agents in the constituencies the Association is kept in constant touch with the requirements of Scottish Liberalism, and is thus in a position to advise on all questions which may arise. It gives advice and assistance in all matters pertaining to Registration and Election law, and is always in a position to obtain the opinion of Counsel on any points which may arise, and carries Registration Appeals through the Superior Courts.

The origin of the Association goes back to the great days of 1880, when Mr. Gladstone was carrying through his great campaign in Midlothian. In these days it was known as the *North and East of Scotland Liberal Association*, and had its headquarters in Edinburgh. Following upon this, an organization was started in Glasgow under the title of the *Scottish Liberal Federation*. These two bodies continued each to carry on political work within their own spheres until 1887, when they were amalgamated under the title of the *Scottish Liberal Association*, and they have continued to carry on their work under that designation ever since.

Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman has held the office of President since Lord Rosebery resigned it in 1900, while the Master of Elibank, the Liberal Whip for Scotland, acts as Honorary Treasurer. Liberal Peers and Members for Scotland are all Honorary Members of the Association, while all the Office-bearers are elected annually. The Annual Subscription to the Association for Honorary Members is not less than one pound, but there is a large number of Subscribers who pay less sums, the amount of the Subscription being entirely optional.

THE London Liberal Federation consists of the members of the representative Liberal and Radical Association in every London constituency, together with the members of such Women's Liberal Associations as number not less than 100 members, and are recognised by the Executive Committee of the Federation as representative of the women in their respective constituencies.

The Federation is governed by a Council and an Executive Committee, the former consisting of six representatives elected by each of the London Liberal Associations, and of one representative from each affiliated Women's Association.

The Officers and the Executive Committee are elected by the Council at its Annual Meeting at the beginning of the year.

The Federation aims at co-ordinating and strengthening the Liberal Associations throughout the Metropolis. It assists and advises Liberal Associations with regard to Registration and Organization ; it prepares and distributes literature on current political questions, and generally acts as the Central Organization of the Party for London.

THE Women's Liberal Federation was formed in 1886 by the Federation of fifteen Women's Liberal Associations. The first Council Meeting of representatives was held in 1887, when the approximate membership of the Federation was 6000. Its past Presidents are : Mrs. W. E. Gladstone, 1887 to 1893 ; The Countess of Aberdeen, 1893 to 1894 ; The Countess of Carlisle, 1894 to 1902 ; The Countess of Aberdeen, 1902 to 1906.

The objects of the Federation are :—

(1) To promote the adoption of Liberal principles in the government of the country.

(2) To promote just legislation for women (including the local and Parliamentary franchise for all women, married, single, or widowed, who possess any of the legal qualifications which entitle men to vote), and the removal of all their legal disabilities as citizens.

(3) To protect the interests of children.

(4) To advance political education by meetings, lectures, and the distribution of literature.

(5) To promote a Women's Liberal Association in every constituency, and also the admission of women to Membership in any existing Liberal Associations.

(6) To bring into union all Liberal Associations of which women are members, and so to encourage their co-operation in the promotion of reform.

The affairs of the Federation are managed by a Council, consisting of elected delegates from the affiliated Associations, and the Hon. Officers and Executive Committee for the time being. This meets annually to discuss the Policy of the Federation, which is only alterable by the Council; and to elect Hon. Officers and an Executive Committee to conduct the business of the Federation subject to the approval of the Council.

The number of affiliated Women's Liberal Associations in October, 1907, was 613, with an approximate membership of 83,000.

THE Women's National Liberal Association is a union of Local Liberal Associations and of individuals desiring to co-operate with one another, and with the National Liberal Federation, for the furtherance of Liberal thought and Liberal policy, which naturally includes just legislation for women, and the protection of the interests of children.

There is no interference with the local independence of affiliated Associations. Every Association arranges the details of its own organization, administers its own affairs, and initiates its own policy.

The essential principle of the Women's National Liberal Association is the preservation of absolute liberty of local action on the part of all members and Associations in dealing with questions about which there is a difference of opinion within the Liberal Party, and at the same time the maintenance of a common centre of action for the purpose of dealing with those about which there is no such difference.

The function of the Executive Committee is therefore strictly limited to the *transaction of business*, and the promotion of such legislation as is by the *general consent of the Liberal Party* deemed of the first importance.

Vice-Presidents pay a minimum Annual Subscription of one guinea; Members subscribe at least one shilling annually, and all Subscriptions and Affiliation Fees are payable on election, and thereafter on 1st January.

THE Scottish Women's Liberal Federation was formed in 1891 with the following objects :—

- (1) To promote and extend the knowledge of Liberal principles.
- (2) To promote the formation of Women's Liberal Associations in Scotland, and to afford to them a centre from which information on, and assistance in, political matters can at any time be obtained.
- (3) To promote intercourse and united action between the Women's Liberal Associations of Scotland, without compromising their independence or in any way interfering with their Constitution, Rules, or local authority.
- (4) To secure just and equal legislation and representation for women, especially with reference to the Parliamentary Franchise; the removal of all legal disabilities on account of sex; and the protection of the interests of children.
- (5) To communicate information and arouse interest among women on political and social questions both of general and of local interest, by meetings, lectures, and individual effort.

The Federation consists of all organizations of Liberal Women numbering not less than twenty-five members, and of any Liberal Association which has admitted women to its membership, on payment of an affiliation fee. Liberal Women in any district where there is no local Women's Liberal Association may also join on payment of a small fee.

Its affairs are managed by a Council, which consists of representatives from each Federated Association and of the Executive Committee. The Council meets annually in spring, when the Executive Committee is elected for the year and the policy of the Federation discussed. According to the last return, there are 103 affiliated Associations, with an aggregate membership of 14,291.

The *Scottish Liberal Women's Magazine* (price 1s. a year, or 1s. 6d. post free), edited by the President, the Lady Marjorie Sinclair, is issued monthly by the Federation. It aims at gathering together points bearing on the chief questions before the country, and reminding its readers of notable utterances by public men during the current month, with the object of helping Liberal workers. It is also a useful medium of information, discussion, and suggestion between the various Branches of the S.W.L.F.

A *Lending Library* of works on political and social questions, blue books, &c., is kept at the office of the Federation, from which all members of Women's Liberal Associations throughout Scotland may borrow free of charge.

THE 'Eighty' Club was originally formed in the year 1880, shortly before the General Election of that year, with the object of promoting Liberal Education, and of stimulating Liberal organization, especially with reference to the election which was shortly to take place. The necessity for some such body was felt in consequence of the numerous applications received by the Central Association of the Liberal Party for the assistance of Speakers and Lecturers at meetings, both in London and the country.

Since that time it has been felt desirable to continue the work for which the Club was originally formed, and at a meeting in February, 1881, at the House of Commons, it was determined that the Club should be placed on a permanent basis, with the intention of carrying out the above objects, and of supplying, as far as possible, the want experienced by Local Associations.

The Club consists of a number of gentlemen who are willing to give assistance by speaking at Clubs, Debating Societies, Liberal Associations, Public Meetings, and also by delivering Lectures on political subjects.

Committees of local organizations are invited to communicate with the Secretary, stating (1) the subject preferred; (2) the date, time, and place of meeting; (3) the number of persons the hall holds; and (4) the probable number present. A series of meetings can be arranged for if desired. No fee is charged.

Election to the Club is by ballot, and candidates must be proposed and seconded by members of the Club.

The Annual Subscription is one guinea, and the Entrance Fee is one guinea for candidates under 30, three guineas for candidates between 30 and 40, and ten guineas for candidates over 40.

THE Objects of the National Reform Union are :—

(1) The dissemination of political knowledge, and the furtherance of Liberal Organization, especially in the County Constituencies.

(2) The promotion and agitation of any leading question which an important section of the Liberal Party may from time to time place before the nation, and in regard to which it may be thought desirable to move and instruct public opinion.

The National Reform Union was founded at a great Conference held in Manchester in 1864, over which Mr. George Wilson presided, and at which many of the leaders of the Anti-Corn-Law League were present. Their object was to concentrate and focus in one National Organization the several forces which

were working in different parts of the country for the Parliamentary Reform which was obtained by the Reform Act of 1867. After that the efforts of the Union were directed to many other Reforms, for the accomplishment of which the country had to thank the Liberal Administration of 1868-1874. The defeat of the Liberal Party in 1874, and the necessity of reorganizing the militant forces of Liberalism, led to the reconstitution of the Union on a still wider basis at a Conference held in Manchester in December, 1875, at which Mr. John Morley was the principal speaker. Numbers of Branches were formed in all parts of the country, and a large staff of lecturers was employed to arouse and educate the constituencies.

To this educational work, both by lectures and by the dissemination of leaflets and pamphlets, the resources of the Union have been ever since directed.

The terms of Membership of the Union are (a) for individuals, an Annual Subscription of 1s. and upwards, (b) for Clubs and Associations, an Annual Subscription of 21s. Every Branch is represented on the General Council by its officers and two delegates appointed annually, and they, as well as every subscribing member, are entitled to attend and vote both at the Annual Meetings, when the Honorary Officers are elected and the policy of the Union is determined for the ensuing year, and at any Special Meetings which may be called at political crises.

THE Liberal League was formed in 1902 for the purpose of bringing together, with a view to common action, all those who approve of the policy expounded by Lord Rosebery at Chesterfield. It believes that upon those lines progress can best be made with that practical Liberalism which the conditions of the day urgently require.

In the following utterance Lord Rosebery laid down the broad foundations of the Liberal League:—

It threatens no one, it proscribes no one, it sets itself in antagonism to no one. It offers, in my conscience and in my judgment, the best means of setting the Liberal Party right with the country. It represents, at any rate, practical politics, practical Liberalism, common-sense Liberalism, imbued with a deep and a sane sense of the responsibilities of *Empire*. And if this policy be founded, as I believe it to be founded, on *political truth and on political justice*, it will prevail, whatever may be the *antagonism against it*. If it be not so founded, it does not deserve to prevail.'—*Glasgow, March 10th, 1902.*

THE National Education Association consists of persons approving of its objects and subscribing annually to its funds, Local Branch Associations formed in different parts of the country, and Affiliated Organizations formed for other objects but embracing those of the National Education Association.

The constitution and policy of the Association are controlled by a Council of three hundred members, representing all parts of England and Wales, which is elected annually by the subscribers, branches, and affiliated bodies.

The Association, which was formed at the beginning of 1889, has for its objects:—

(1) To promote a system of national education which shall be in all its grades efficient, progressive, and unsectarian, and shall be under popular control; and also to oppose all legislative and administrative proposals having a contrary tendency.

(2) To secure the universal establishment of representative authorities in districts of suitable area, and having under their control unsectarian schools within reasonable reach of the population requiring them.

(3) To secure the abolition of fees in all elementary schools, and the opportunity of free or aided education for deserving pupils in higher schools and colleges.

(4) To obtain facilities for the better training of teachers in unsectarian institutions under public management.

The Association seeks to effect these objects:—

(a) By publications, meetings, and lectures, and by the collection and diffusion of information;

(b) By watching the proceedings of Parliament, of the Board of Education, of Education Authorities, and of other managers of State-aided Schools,

with a view to prevent the sacrifice of educational to denominational or other interests ;

(1) Such amendments of the law of landlord and tenant, both in town and in country, as will encourage occupiers in improving either houses or agricultural holdings, by giving them absolute security for the results of their outlay.

PARLIAMENT

AND

PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURE.

Unless otherwise stated, the reference is to the House of Commons.]

ADMISSION.

ENTRANCE to the Palace of Westminster is free to all, by the doorway in Old Palace Yard, opposite St. Margaret's Church, at any time when the Legislature is sitting, but the visitor must remain in the Central Hall (or Outer Lobby) unless he has a ticket of admission to either House. This can be obtained through a Peer or a Member respectively; but, in the case of the House of Commons, places in the Members' Gallery, owing to the increasing demand, have now to be balloted for, and Members are requested to make application seven clear days before the seats are needed. In the Commons, three places are set apart for visitors—the Distinguished Strangers' Gallery, the Strangers' Gallery, and certain benches Under the Gallery; while there are the Peers' Gallery and the Ladies' Gallery. Admission to this last also has to be balloted for beforehand by Members, because of the great demand for the few seats; but in the Lords, lady visitors can sit in the ordinary gallery with their male friends. On Saturdays throughout the year, and on Easter and Whit Mondays and Tuesdays, except when either House is sitting, visitors are admitted to view the Palace of Westminster between the hours of ten and four, by tickets freely obtainable at an entrance near the Victoria Tower, at the House of Lords' end.

ADJOURNMENT—

OF THE SITTING.

Except by special resolution, the consideration of contentious business in the Commons is suspended at eleven on the first four days of each week, and at five on Fridays; and, after the disposal of any remaining and unopposed orders of the day, the House adjourns upon motion made, usually by a Minister; though, if the sitting continue until half-past eleven in the former case, or half-past five in the latter, the Speaker adjourns the House without question put. In case of grave disorder, the Speaker can either adjourn the House or suspend a sitting at his discretion. The House also stands adjourned if the Speaker finds, upon his attention being called, that forty Members are not in the Chamber, save that no 'count' can take place at an evening sitting between a quarter after eight and a quarter after nine; while, if at any time before four on Friday forty Members are not present, the Speaker withdraws until that hour, unless the required quorum be previously made, but, if they be not there then, he adjourns the House.

FOR A RECESS.

The Commons can adjourn, not only from day to day, but for a given period by way of recess. The latter course is invariably adopted at Easter and Whitsuntide, the length of the holiday varying with the amount of work the Ministry has to do, or wishes to be done; and it is sometimes taken in the early autumn when it is desired to complete the business of the session without breaking into the customary holiday period. There is then an adjournment resolved upon, and an 'autumn sitting' held, the Bills being taken up on the resumption at the stage they had reached earlier in the session. If Parliament has been prorogued at the customary date, and has to be summoned at an earlier date than had been intended, which is usually because of some national emergency, an 'autumn session' is necessary, when all business has to be begun afresh.

MOTIONS FOR.

A member has power to propose after questions that the House shall adjourn for the purpose of discussing a definite matter of urgent public importance; and, if not fewer than forty rise in their places to support him, the motion comes on for debate at a quarter past eight. It is for the Speaker to decide whether the question submitted is 'a definite matter of urgent public importance,' and the motion must neither raise a question substantially identical with one already decided in the same session nor anticipate discussion upon a Bill or motion of which notice stands on the paper. For the consequences of this last restriction, see *Blocking Motions*.

BILLS.

Every Member is entitled to submit a project of law in the shape of a Bill, and, in addition to the measures brought forward by Ministers, generally known as Government Bills, and by private Members—Private Members' Bills—there are Private Bills and Provisional Order Confirmation Bills. The two former classes deal with legislation affecting the whole, or a defined section, of the body politic, while the two latter are concerned with projects promoted by municipal bodies, public companies, or private individuals for local or personal objects; but all classes have to be read three times in each House before they can be sent to the Sovereign for assent. Government Bills are those introduced by Members of the Administration in accordance with promises given in the Speech from the Throne, or in Parliament or on the platform. They have precedence on certain days and at specified periods of the session, and, if desired by the Ministry promptly to be passed, have special facilities afforded them. Private Members' Bills have to take their chance in a ballot for places, and their introducers select the vacant date on the order paper which promises to enable the ensuing stage to be reached early. Fridays up to nearly the end of the session are set apart for their consideration; but, although the closure may be invoked to secure their second reading, no Private Members' Bill which is opposed by a determined minority has, in present circumstances, a chance of passing unless assisted by the Government. Every measure has to be 'backed' by the names of its introducer and certain Members who support it, not exceeding a dozen, and it may be accompanied by a non-contentious memorandum explaining its provisions. After being read a first time, which is normally a formal step, and a second, which is a disputed one, it is (unless otherwise ordered by the House, or it be a Bill for imposing taxes, or Consolidated Fund, or a Bill for confirming Provisional Orders) referred to a Standing Committee (see *Committees*), from which it is reported to the House. The objects of Private Bills have to be advertised before the schemes are presented to Parliament, and they have to comply with certain Standing Orders previous to being introduced, and when brought in have to be 'backed' by a Member, usually representing the district most nearly affected. Upon being read a second time—a stage very seldom opposed—they are referred to a committee of four Members, whose decision upon both the principle and the details is, in the very large majority of instances, accepted as final. Provisional Order Confirmation Bills are brought forward by a representative of the Government Department which has issued, under statutory powers, the provisional order requiring legislative sanction; and they may be referred to a Joint Committee of both Houses, but this is a course adopted with extreme rarity.

BLOCKING MOTIONS.

There are two kinds of blocking motions, one to hinder the progress of a Bill, and the other to prevent a subject being debated. The former is a simple notice of rejection, which serves, until withdrawn, to stop a measure from being pro-

ceeded with after eleven on the first four days of the week or five on Friday. The latter is a notice to call attention on 'an early day' to the subject in question, with the addition of an intention to move a resolution, the terms of which are sometimes given. It has been ruled, with increasing strictness of recent years, that, in the words of May's *Parliamentary Practice*, 'a motion is out of order which anticipates, not only a matter standing on the notice paper as an order of the day, or as a notice of a motion, or an amendment appointed for a future day, but also a matter of which public notice has been given in the House, at the time when notices are given, or a notice of motion standing as a notice for which no special day is fixed.' As a consequence, a Member who desires to prevent discussion of a subject inconvenient to his party, hands in a notice of motion which he does not intend to move, and with the terms of which he may himself disagree; and this, by the official ruling, prevents debate as long as it remains on the paper, whence it can be removed only by the Member concerned, who may place it thereon at the opening of the session and leave the country for the remainder, secure in the power of his 'blocking motion' to stifle discussion. A Select Committee which considered this matter in 1907, reported, however, that as 'the rule against anticipation' was originally intended to prevent any member from unfairly forestalling the discussion of a matter which another member had already given notice of his intention to bring before the House by motion or bill, but had in practice been developed in such a way as to have an almost exactly opposite effect—namely, to enable a member, by giving such a notice, to prevent any effective discussion of the matter at all—the rule, if preserved at all, should be brought back and confined to its original purpose. This would be done if it were laid down that the discussion of a matter should not be ruled out of order on the ground of anticipation unless there was, in the opinion of the Chair, a probability of the matter anticipated being brought before the House within a reasonable time; and the suggested alteration is likely to be made in another session.

BUDGET, THE.

The Budget is the speech of the Chancellor of the Exchequer, containing an account of the national revenue and expenditure for the previous financial year and the Government's proposals for raising the revenue of the coming one; and it is usually laid before the House of Commons towards the end of April or in the earliest days of May. The proposals are at once submitted to the Commons in the form of resolutions; and upon the adoption of the first (which is customarily non-contentious and is passed the night the Budget is opened), the whole of the suggested taxes are immediately levied. After the House has discussed all the proposals, the resulting resolutions form the basis of the annual Finance Bill, which has then to go through the usual course of Government measures, except that it can be discussed after eleven o'clock, and cannot be altered in any detail by the House of Lords, which must either accept or reject it as it has come from the Commons. If any of the Chancellor of the Exchequer's proposals affecting the amount of an impost be amended or withdrawn during the progress of the resolutions or the Finance Bill through the House of Commons, the money already levied, as a consequence of the proceedings on Budget night, is returned.

BUSINESS, ARRANGEMENT OF.

Broadly speaking, the business of Parliament is divided into two well-defined sections, public and private, the former dealing with national or imperial, and the latter with local or personal, concerns. But of more interest to the legislator is a further division of the former into Government and Private Members' business. *Government business* includes not only Ministerial Bills, but

the whole of the country's financial affairs; and an increasing degree of precedence and other facilities for its progress has of late years been accorded to it in the Commons. It has precedence at every sitting except the evening sittings on Tuesdays and Wednesdays, which commence at a quarter past eight without any previous interruption of business, and the sitting on Fridays; but the Tuesday evening sitting is given to the Government by Standing Order after Easter and the Wednesday one after Whitsun, and only the third and fourth Fridays after Whit Sunday are reserved to private Members when that holiday has been passed. As the Friday sitting occupies for effective purposes only five hours, and the Tuesday and Wednesday evening sittings not quite three hours, the time allowed to the 635 private Members for making progress with their Bills or moving their resolutions is, therefore, extremely limited; and it is not infrequently the more contracted by the Government moving to take the whole time of the House at even an earlier date than is provided by Standing Orders, while it is still further lessened by the provision that opposed Private Bills shall be discussed at the commencement of the evening sittings. Yet some four hundred Members ballot at the opening of every session for a chance to bring forward a Bill or move a resolution.

COMMITTEES.

From the point of view of popular liberty, the most important of House of Commons Committees is the Committee of Ways and Means, which is composed of the whole assembly, and in which originates all financial business. Its Chairman, by virtue of his office, is not only Chairman of Committee of Supply and of Committees of the Whole House, but is Deputy-Speaker, charged, in the absence of the Speaker, with all the powers of the Chair; and he is chosen from among the Ministerial majority at the commencement of each Parliament, or when a casual vacancy occurs. The Committee of Supply, in which every Member is included, has power to deal in detail with all the Estimates laid before the House by the various Government departments; but it can only grant, reduce, or refuse the amount asked for in the Estimates, and no motion for an increase can be made. In Committee of the Whole House, the clauses are discussed of such Government and Private Members' Bills as have not been referred to Standing or Select Committees; and Members, who can speak only once on each separate question when the Speaker is in the Chair, can address the Committee, with relevancy, as often as they please or their colleagues will listen.

At the opening of each session, there are appointed certain Select Committees possessing extensive powers relative to the business of the House, as indicated by their names, these being the Committee of Privileges, the Committee on Standing Orders, the Committee of Selection, the Committee of Public Accounts, the General Committee on Railway and Canal Bills, the Committee on Public Petitions, and the Police and Sanitary Committee; while the Kitchen and Refreshment Rooms Committee is an important body, selected every session to provide for the creature comforts of the Members generally. Four Standing Committees—sometimes referred to as Grand Committees—are appointed in each session, three for the consideration of all bills relating to law and courts of justice and legal procedure, and to trade, shipping, and manufactures, referred to them by the House, and the other to deal with all Public Bills relating exclusively to Scotland, and similarly referred. Each of the first three Standing Committees consists of not less than sixty nor more than eighty members nominated by the Committee of Selection, who must have regard to the classes of Bills sent to such Committees, to the composition of the House, and to the qualification of the members selected; while the Scottish Standing Committee is composed of all the members representing Scottish constituencies, together

with not more than fifteen other members nominated in respect of any Bill by the Committee of Selection, who must have regard to the approximation of the balance of parties in the Standing Committee to that in the whole House. And the Chairman of each—who is appointed by the Chairmen's Panel (consisting of not less than six or more than eight members) nominated by the Committee of Selection—was specially given by the House in 1907 the same powers of dealing with irrelevance and repetition and with dilatory motions, as well as the application of the closure, as are enjoyed by the Chairman of Committee of the Whole House, 20, however, being substituted for 100 as the number necessary to render the majority effective for the closure.

Select Committees, other than those set up each session as already named, are appointed by the House to inquire into and report upon some special question or particular measure, and they consist of a varying number of Members, selected as nearly as possible in proportion to the relative strength of parties. They sometimes become Joint Committees by being linked with an equivalent body of Peers. Private Bill Committees consist of four Members, chosen by the Committee of Selection (except in the case of opposed Railway and Canal Bills, when the Chairman is appointed from among its own members by the General Committee on these measures); while Hybrid Committees, which deal with Public Bills affecting private interests, are nominated partly by the House and partly by the Committee of Selection. In no case is a member of any of these Committees paid for his services.

COMMONS, HOUSE OF.

The House of Commons consists of 670 Members, 465 of whom represent England, 30 Wales, 72 Scotland, and 103 Ireland; and, of the total, 377 sit for counties, 284 for boroughs, and 9 for universities. The present number and composition of the Chamber was determined by the Redistribution Act of 1885; and the existing House was chosen at the General Election of January, 1906. It can thus, if the operation of the Septennial Act be fully insisted on, be continued in existence until the winter of 1912; but only two Parliaments out of the last fifteen—those summoned by the late Queen Victoria previous to the present one—have lived even a few months over six years, while something nearer four than five years is the average length.

CONDUCT.

Members of Parliament have to conform to certain rules of conduct, some written but most unwritten, which govern their behaviour in the House itself. As they advance up the floor to their seat, they bow to the Chair; they must be uncovered while standing and always when speaking, except it be on a point of order after a division has been called, when the Member raising it has to remain seated, and to wear a hat; they must not pass between the Chair and one who is addressing the House; and, when speaking, they must not step beyond a red line woven into the matting on each side of the floor. During a debate, they must not read a book or newspaper, and they are supposed not to indulge in conversation, while they must not clap their hands or stamp their feet in token of approbation or hiss in sign of disapproval, the allowable applause being to call 'Hear, hear' as frequently as desired, and dissent being usually limited to cries of 'Vide' and 'Question,' with inarticulate but reasonably courteous murmurs. A speaker must sit when the occupant of the Chair rises, and he may be called to order for irrelevancy or repetition; while, if he disregard the Chair or abuses the rules by persistent and wilful obstruction, he is 'named,' and, upon motion made and carried, suspended from the service of the House, having at once to leave the precincts. If his conduct be grossly disorderly, the Speaker can order his immediate withdrawal, and, if he declines to go, he may be removed by force and suspended for the remainder of the Session.

DEBATE.

A Member who desires to take part in debate must rise uncovered and address himself to the Chair, and it is for its occupant to single out which one of those who have risen shall speak, by calling upon him by name. The custom is to select in turn one from each side of the House, or one who may be presumed likely to reply to the arguments of the immediately preceding speaker; but preference is given to a Minister or an occupant of the Front Opposition Bench, save in the case of a new Member, who is always called upon when he desires to make his maiden speech. No one can speak more than once on the same question when the Speaker is in the Chair, except as a matter of personal explanation, and then only by leave; but in Committee he can speak as often as the Chairman sees him rise. In either case he must be relevant to the subject, and refrain from vain repetitions; and, though he may refresh his memory with notes, he must not read his speech. He may not refer to any subject which is *sub judice*, or make any personal charges against another Member; must avoid both treason and obstruction; and must be courteous both in language and demeanour.

DIVISIONS.

When a debate has concluded, either by natural exhaustion or the application of the closure, the question before the House is put from the Chair. Those in favour of the motion are invited to say 'Aye,' and those against it 'No;,' and the Speaker or Chairman says 'I think the Ayes [or Noes] have it.' If the minority desire a division, they challenge the opinion by exclaiming 'The Noes [or Ayes] have it;,' whereupon strangers are directed to withdraw, an order which in these days applies only to those sitting Under the Gallery. Simultaneously the Clerk turns a two-minute sand-glass, and, while the sand is running out, electric bells ring through the building and policemen shout 'Division!' in the precincts, so that all Members within hail can enter in time to vote. The outer doors of the House are then closed and locked, and the question is put a second time from the Chair, when, if the minority persist in their claim for a division, two tellers are named for each side by the Speaker or Chairman, and the Ayes are directed to go to the right of the Chair and the Noes to the left, the practical effect of which is that the former leave the House behind the Chair and the latter by the other end of the Chamber, and as they pass into the respective division lobbies their names are taken. When Members have passed the tellers and been counted, they return to the House in the reverse direction to that by which they left, and when the lobbies are clear the tellers come to the table, those for the winning side being on the right hand, and the senior teller for the majority reads out the numbers, which are repeated from the Chair as the decision of the House. If the numbers are equal, the Speaker or Chairman gives his vote, and this usually so as to ensure the subject being further discussed. A Member may vote in a division though he did not hear the question put, but he is not, in any case, obliged to vote, and can remain in the Chamber while the division is in progress.

ESTIMATES, THE.

In the early part of every session there are laid before the Commons the Estimates for the public service during the coming financial year, these being divided into three sections—the Navy, the Army, and the Civil Service. With the two former is accustomed to be circulated a memorandum, signed by the First Lord of the Admiralty and the Secretary of State for War respectively, explaining any special features or proposals embodied in them; and the representative in the House of the Admiralty or the War Office adds to this a speech when laying the Estimates formally before the Commons, but there is no such memorandum or speech in the case of the Civil Service Estimates, these

covering all the Government Departments outside the two already named, no one Minister, therefore, being responsible for the whole of them. Each of the Estimates contains a detailed statement of the money intended to be spent in the financial year next ensuing; but it is extremely unusual for the session to pass without Supplementary Estimates being presented to cover unforeseen contingencies, these greatly adding to the expenditure of the year. When money is wanted for any of the Services before the estimated expenditure is fully sanctioned, it is secured by means of a Vote on Account, while, in case of a national emergency, a Vote of Credit is granted.

FRONT BENCHES.

The Treasury Bench, which is to the immediate right of the Chair, is occupied by members of the Administration, while on the Front Opposition Bench, which faces it, sit members of the preceding Government and Privy Counsellors, most usually (though not necessarily) in political antagonism to Ministers. The leader of the House, who is the principal Minister in the Commons, is responsible for the arrangement of business. No direct official responsibility falls upon the leader of the Opposition, who is chosen for that position by his parliamentary colleagues; but, as one who has held high office, and in the customary course may be expected to be so occupied again, he is sometimes supplied by Ministers with confidential information, and privately asked for counsel.

HOURS OF MEETING.

The House of Lords meets as a judicial tribunal in the morning, and as a legislative body at half-past four in the afternoon; while the Commons assemble at a quarter before three o'clock on the first four days of the week, and at noon on Fridays. On these first four days, the Commons cease debate on disputed subjects at eleven o'clock, and on Fridays at five, usually adjourning very speedily thereafter, and at half-past eleven and half-past five respectively in any case, unless a Money Bill is under discussion or the rule on this head has been suspended by vote of the House.

KING'S SPEECH AND THE ADDRESS IN REPLY.

At the commencement and the close of every session, there is read to the two Houses a Speech from the Throne, prepared by Ministers and adopted by the Sovereign, the earlier indicating to Parliament the principal measures intended to be proposed, the later recording such as have been passed, and each containing some account of the country's position in regard to foreign relations. After the earlier, a motion is made in each House for an Address to be presented to the Crown, expressing thanks for the Royal Speech; and although within recent years the form of this has been altered so that instead of the Speech being echoed paragraph by paragraph the motion is simply a brief expression of thanks, amendments can be proposed alluding to every public matter which either has or has not been touched in the original document. A defeat upon the Address is tantamount to one upon a vote of no-confidence, and involves the immediate resignation of the Ministry.

LOBBY, THE.

There are various portions of the Palace of Westminster known as 'lobbies, and though the one most often seen by visitors is the Outer Lobby or Central Hall, into which all must go who wish to find a Member or enter the House, the Inner or Members' Lobby is the one meant when 'the Lobby' is referred to as a place of political gossip or party intrigue. It is reserved to Members and ex-Members, Peers, private secretaries of Ministers, and a select number of

journalists and political organizers, whose names appear on a 'Lobby List,' authorised by the Speaker and superintended by the Serjeant-at-Arms. The corresponding 'outer room' of the House of Lords, is not used for a similar purpose but for the hanging of the hats and coats of the Peers; and in neither is supposed to be permitted that form of parliamentary endeavour known elsewhere as 'lobbying,' which consists of a systematic endeavour on behalf of powerful 'interests' to secure legislative aid for private concerns at the public expense.

LORDS, HOUSE OF.

The House of Lords is an ever-increasing body which consists at the moment of over 600 Members. This number includes 16 Representative Peers for Scotland, chosen at the commencement of every Parliament, and 28 Representative Peers for Ireland, elected for life. There is no limit, except the will of the Sovereign, to the creation of Peers, the average attendance of whom during the comparatively brief sittings is less than 50, but that number is considerably increased on any Party emergency.

MINISTRY, THE.

The Ministry is composed of a number of Members of both Houses, who occupy the chief positions in the various offices of State, and who, while technically holding office under the Crown, are changed according to the will of the Commons. No Administration in modern times has resigned because of an adverse vote of the Peers; but, when defeated in the Commons on a sufficiently substantial issue, it must either resign or obtain the Sovereign's consent to a dissolution in order that the country may decide whether it shall continue in power. The head of the Administration is the Prime Minister, who is usually also First Lord of the Treasury, although the position—for it is not an office—has sometimes in recent years been held in association with the Foreign Secretaryship. The Prime Minister chooses his colleagues, the principal among whom, to a varying number (now nineteen) with him form the Cabinet, in which body are always included the First Lord of the Treasury, the five Principal Secretaries of State—those for the Home Department, Foreign Affairs, the Colonies, War, and India—the First Lord of the Admiralty, the Chancellor of the Exchequer, the Lord Chancellor, and the Lord President of the Council; but it is according to the determination of the Premier what other Ministers shall be included. Outside the Cabinet are a number of minor official positions, departmental, legal, and connected with the Royal Household, filled by members of the parliamentary majority, which are changed as that majority is altered; and all holders of these are accustomed to be called 'His Majesty's Ministers,' though in some of the lesser instances this is a matter of courtesy rather than of right.

PETITIONS.

Every subject has a right to present or sign a petition to either or both Houses of Parliament, praying in respectful language and prescribed form for the removal of a grievance or in favour of or opposition to any measure which is before the Legislature. The right is exercised with great freedom but somewhat less frequency than formerly, the introduction of household suffrage having given citizens other opportunities for pressing their wishes upon the legislature; while now that no debate, except in very special circumstances, is allowed on a petition, that its prayer rarely is read in the House, and that the overwhelming majority are quietly dropped by the presenting Members in a bag *at the back of the chair*, leaving only a bald record subsequently to be published in an official report, petitioning does not affect the proceedings or the opinion of Parliament in anything like the old degree.

QUESTIONS.

One of the most valuable and valued privileges of the private Member, greatly as it has been curtailed of late years, is the putting of questions to Ministers. These may concern any matter of general or local interest—though the over-asking of questions of the latter type furnished one argument for lessening the privilege—and they are put at the beginning of the sitting, with a limitation of time for their answer to an hour. As a rule, they must be given notice of in writing, but Ministers may reply to those of which they have received private warning. If a Member desires an oral answer, he distinguishes his question by an asterisk, and questions not so distinguished or not reached by ten minutes before four on ordinary days, are replied to in a printed form, which is circulated with the daily official 'Votes and Proceedings.' Questions arising out of the answer the Minister has given are allowed, but the putting of such supplementary questions is discouraged alike by Ministers and the Speaker.

RESIGNATION OF SEATS.

In a strict sense, no Member of the House of Commons, once duly elected, can vacate his seat except by death or the dissolution of Parliament. There is no formal method of resignation, but a Member who accepts office under the Crown vacates his seat. When, therefore, a Member wishes to retire, he applies to the Chancellor of the Exchequer to grant him the Stewardship of either the Chiltern Hundreds or the Manor of Northstead, and, upon this purely honorary office being given, and duly gazetted, a new writ can be moved for to fill the vacancy, such a motion—as also in the case of death or succession or elevation to the peerage—being accustomed to be made by the Chief Whip of the party to which the late Member belonged. No new writ in case of resignation can be issued during a recess.

ROYAL ASSENT.

A Bill which has passed through all its stages in the two Houses needs the Royal Assent in order to become law; and in these days this is never given by the Sovereign in person, but by certain Lords Commissioners, usually including the Lord Chancellor, acting on his behalf. The Assent is given in the House of Peers in the presence of both Lords and Commons, the latter headed by their Speaker, and their presence being specially desired for the occasion; and it is pronounced in Norman-French forms, varying according to the class of Bill sanctioned. For a Money Bill, the words are: "*Le Roy remercie ses bons sujets, accepte leur benevolence, et ainsi le veult*"; for a Public Bill, '*Le Roy le veult*'; for a Private Bill, '*Soit fait comme il est désiré*'; and upon a petition demanding a right, whether public or private, '*Soit droit fait comme il est désiré*.' Should the Royal Assent be refused, it would be in the form, '*Le Roy s'avisera*'; but, although this was not uncommonly used under the Stuarts, it has not been heard in Parliament since March, 1708—not 1707, as given in all the text-books, the significance of the year lying in the fact that the Royal Assent has thus been once, and only once, refused since the Legislative Union between England and Scotland.

SESSION, THE.

It is customary for Parliament to meet annually for the Session early in February and to separate in August; but the limit may be extended in either direction, with the consequence that it is possible for a session to extend into two years. A question upon which a decision has been taken cannot be reopened in the same session, nor can a Public Bill be taken up in an ensuing session at the point it had reached in the preceding one.

SPEAKER, THE.

The Speaker of the House of Lords is the Lord Chancellor, though he exercises no disciplinary powers; but the Parliamentary official known to all as 'The Speaker' presides over the deliberations of the House of Commons. He is the free choice of the Members, for, although that choice has formally to be approved by the Sovereign, no monarch since Charles II. has interfered with the selection. Nominally he is appointed for a Parliament, but in practice he continues in the Chair until he desires to withdraw, when he is made a Peer. In this way, his impartiality is secured and respected in a degree not accustomed to be anticipated from the Deputy-Speaker or Chairman of Committees, who is changed according to the composition of the parliamentary majority. The Speaker's powers, defined and undefined, are extremely wide, and his decisions are treated with the greatest deference by the House; and, though his labours, in mere point of the time occupied, have been reduced of late years by the closing of debate at eleven o'clock, unless the House otherwise specially orders, his responsibilities have been increased by the working of the new rules of procedure, and particularly those affecting motions for adjournment and the application of the closure.

SUPPLY.

Of all matters with which the Commons are concerned, the most permanently important, and the most regularly attended to, is the business of Supply. An attempt in recent years has been made to secure a more systematic examination of the Estimates, by specifically allotting twenty days before August 5th in each session for their discussion. In practice, however, it has been found that those responsible for the Estimates have not been loth to allow the House to fritter away most of the allotted time in discussing trivialities, while, as in former days, many millions are voted in as many minutes towards the end of the session, without the slightest pretence at examination or debate. The old parliamentary theory was crystallised in the phrase, 'Grievances before Supply;' but the limitations now imposed upon the discussion of the Estimates prevent this being carried into practice. There are only certain technical differences between the House sitting as a Committee of Supply and as a Committee of Ways and Means, for in both capacities it has full charge of the nation's finance; and the chief point of its labours is the passing of two Appropriation Bills in the course of the session—the one necessary before March 31st, in order to clear up all the Supplementary Estimates, and the other before the prorogation to deal with the regular Estimates of the year. And the constitutional importance of these measures is that the votes of money submitted by Ministers are 'for services coming in course of payment during the year,' and that all such moneys must be appropriated by Act of Parliament to some distinct use either wholly or partly within the financial year in which the statute is passed. It is this which absolutely prevents this country from being without a Parliament for a full year.

WHIPS.

Although technically the 'Whips' are no part of the machinery of Parliament, in a practical sense, and under existing conditions, they are essential to its smooth working. Three parties are recognised by the House of Commons authorities as entitled to the use of a 'Whips' Room,' the Liberal, the Conservative, and the Nationalist. From these go forth the summonses which bring Members together for the more important debates and divisions; and each party is provided with a chief and a second whip, and certain assistant-whips, all of whom are Members. The Ministerial Chief Whip is always the Patronage Secretary to the Treasury, and his assistants are the Junior Lords of the Treasury and certain parliamentary officers of the Royal Household.

REGISTRATION.

(ENGLAND AND WALES.)

The Period of Qualification for Occupiers and Lodgers is One Year, i.e., Twelve Months immediately preceding the 15th July in any year; and for Freeholders (who have votes in Counties only, except in the Parliamentary Boroughs of Bristol, Exeter, Norwich, and Nottingham), full possession of the qualifying property for Six Months previous to the 15th July.

I.—THE PARLIAMENTARY FRANCHISE.

(The Parliamentary Franchise in no case extends to women.)

(a) COUNTIES.

In order to vote at **Parliamentary Elections** a person must possess one or other of the following qualifications:—

1.—**As a Householder**, he must have lived in the same Parliamentary Division for **Twelve Months preceding the 15th July**. He may have removed once or oftener, but so long as each house occupied is within the Division, he is entitled to the franchise in succession. Any person who separately occupies *part of a house as a dwelling*, the landlord *not* residing on the premises or, if resident, exercising no control over the part of the house so occupied, is entitled to be registered.

2.—**As a Freeholder**, he must have possessed for *six months* property of the value of forty shillings per annum clear of all expenses, unless the Freehold is acquired by Descent, Marriage, or Succession, or promotion to a benefice or office.

3.—**As a Leaseholder**, he must have held for twelve months previous to the 15th July a lease of property worth £50 per annum, and originally created for a term of not less than 20 years; or a lease of property worth £5 and upwards per annum, and originally created for a term of not less than 60 years.

4.—**As a £10 Occupier**, he must have occupied for twelve months some land or tenement of £10 clear yearly value.

5.—**As a Lodger**, he must have occupied rooms in the same house for twelve months. The annual value of the rooms, unfurnished, is fixed by law at £10. A son living at home with his parents may claim, when by agreement with his father he is the sole occupant of a room in the house, and might, if he chose, lock it up and prevent any other member of the family from entering. Every man over 21, who has a right to the exclusive use of a room or rooms, of the required annual value, in his parents' (or any other) house, should therefore claim to be put on the Register as a Lodger. In all cases Lodgers must claim every year.

6.—**The Service Franchise**. Bank Managers, Schoolmasters, Railway Men, Caretakers, Servants, and others who occupy rooms or houses rent free on their employers' property, are entitled to this franchise, provided their employers do not reside on the premises.

(b) PARLIAMENTARY BOROUGHS.

In order to vote at **Parliamentary Elections** a person must possess one or other of the following qualifications:—

1.—**As a Householder**, he must have lived in the same Parliamentary

Borough for **Twelve Months preceding the 15th July**. He may have removed once or oftener, but so long as each house occupied is within the Parliamentary Borough, he is entitled to the franchise in succession. Any person who separately occupies *part of a house*, the landlord *not* residing on the premises or, if resident, exercising no control over the part of the house so occupied, is entitled to be registered.

2.—**As a £10 Occupier**, he must have occupied for twelve months some land or tenement of £10 clear yearly value, and have resided within seven miles of the Borough boundary during six months previous to July 15th.

3.—**As a Lodger**, he must have occupied rooms in the same house for twelve months. The annual value of the rooms, unfurnished, is fixed by law at £10. A son living at home with his parents may claim, when by agreement with his father he is the sole occupant of a room in the house, and might, if he chose, lock it up and prevent any other member of the family from entering. Every man over 21, who has a right to the exclusive use of a room or rooms, of the required annual value, in his parents' (or any other) house, should therefore claim to be put on the Register as a Lodger. In all cases Lodgers must claim every year.

4.—**The Service Franchise**. Bank Managers, Schoolmasters, Railway Men, Caretakers, Servants, and others who occupy rooms or houses rent free on their employers' property, are entitled to this franchise, provided their employers do not reside on the premises.

II.—THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT FRANCHISES.

1. Who may Vote for Town and County Councillors (London Excepted).

The Ownership, Service, and Lodger qualifications do **not** confer a vote for the election of Town and County Councillors. The household and the £10 qualifications **do**; and 'occupation of a house, warehouse, counting-house, shop, or other building,' without regard to value, with the usual limit as to residence within 7 miles of the Borough or administrative County also confers the Town and County Council vote. And for Town and County Council purposes, **women** (spinsters and widows), if they in all other respects possess the necessary qualifications, may be registered.

Who may Vote for London County and Borough Councillors.

All persons, male or female, whose names are upon the Parliamentary Register as Owners, Occupiers, or Lodgers, or upon the County or Parochial Electors' Lists, may vote for County Councillors and Borough Councillors.

2. Who may Vote for District or Parish Councillors.

Any persons qualified as Parliamentary (including Owners, Service Voters, and Lodgers) or County Council electors may vote for District or Parish Councillors, in addition to married women occupiers who, if single or widows, would be entitled to vote at an election of County Councillors.

3. Who may Vote for Guardians (in County Boroughs, Boroughs, and Urban Districts).

All persons whose names are upon the Parliamentary or County Electors' or *Municipal or Parochial* Electors' Lists, excepting Freemen only.

REGISTRATION.

(SCOTLAND.)

The Parliamentary franchises in Scotland are as in England—ownership, occupation, inhabitancy, and lodging; there are, however, some differences in the law and methods of Registration in regard to each.

The period of qualification is from July 31 to July 31 in the case of occupiers and lodgers, and from January 31 to July 31 in the case of owners.

The lists of **occupiers** are prepared by the Assessors from the Valuation Roll, and, as in Scotland every tenement of £4 annual value and upwards is separately assessed, the duty of the official who compiles the voters' list is much simplified; the list in the main being a copy of the Valuation Roll.

Lodgers in Scotland are allowed to claim in succession from different houses within the same County Division or Burgh, a privilege not accorded to England and Wales.

The list of Electors must be published by the Assessor on or before September 15.

The date allowed for claiming either as owner, occupier, or lodger, is later than in England, viz., September 21; the same date applies to objections to the published list, notwithstanding which the Parliamentary Register in Scotland comes into force on November 1, instead of January 1 in the succeeding year as in England and Wales.

The following are the franchises existent in Scotland:—

(a) COUNTIES.

1. **As owner** for six months prior to July 31 of property of the clear annual value after all deductions of £5, or of £10 where the property has come to the owner within the six months by inheritance, marriage, marriage settlement, or *mortis causa* disposition.*

2. **As tenant (not occupant)** on a lease for at least 19 years of £50 annual value, or on a lease for at least 57 years of £10 annual value, with possession of 12 months prior to July 31.

3. **As occupying tenant** of a building separately or jointly with any other building, or with land in the same division of a County of the annual value of £10 with occupation for 12 months prior to July 31, and payment of all rates laid upon him.

4. **As inhabitant occupier of a dwelling-house** as owner or tenant, or of any part of a house separately occupied as a dwelling, and payment of all poor rates.

5. **As a service voter** where the dwelling is occupied by virtue of any office, service, or employment.

6. **As a lodger** occupying lodgings of the clear yearly value of £10 if let unfurnished, with the right to claim succession from one house to another in the same division of the County.

(b) BURGHS.

1. **As owner** of a building separately or jointly with any other building or any land owned in the same Burgh, of the clear yearly value of £10, with residence in the Burgh, or within seven miles for six months prior to July 31, and payment of all assessed taxes.*

2. **As occupying tenant** of buildings of the annual value of £10, whether separately or jointly with any other buildings or land within the same Burgh, for 12 months prior to July 31, and payment of all assessed taxes.

3. **As inhabitant occupier of a dwelling-house**, or any part of a house, and payment of all poor rates.

4. **As a service voter**, where the dwelling is occupied by virtue of any office, service, or employment.

5. **As lodger**, occupying lodgings of the clear yearly value of £10 if let unfurnished, with the right to succession from one house to another in the same Burgh.

* Where a wife is the owner, the husband is reckoned as owner for the purpose of the franchise.

THE COUNTY COUNCIL.

THE RURAL DISTRICT COUNCIL.

THE BOARD OF GUARDIANS.

THE PARISH COUNCIL.

In London (not including the City) for

THE COUNTY COUNCIL, THE BOROUGH COUNCIL, THE BOARD OF GUARDIANS.

In the City, for

THE COUNTY COUNCIL, THE BOARD OF GUARDIANS.

Before School Boards were abolished by the Education Act, 1902, every woman on the Rate-book had a vote in the School Board Election. But, as the law now stands, BEING ON THE RATE-BOOK ENTITLES TO NO VOTE, and IT IS ESSENTIAL for every purpose TO BE ON THE REGISTER.

A Woman claiming to be Registered must be qualified as OCCUPIER, either as owner or as tenant.

No woman owner has any right, in virtue of her ownership, to vote in any local election. Until 1894, women owners, as such, were entitled to vote in Poor Law Guardian elections, but the Local Government Act of that year disfranchised them, while enlarging the voting rights of men owners.

No woman lodger can vote in any Local Government Election, although men lodgers can vote in District and Parish Council and Guardian elections, and in the election of the London County and London Borough Councils.

For women there is no service franchise—such as entitles men to vote in District and Parish Council and Guardian Elections, and in the election of London Borough Councils—i.e., no occupation of a dwelling as an official or servant (for example, as matron or caretaker) entitles a woman to be placed on the Register.

What is an Occupier?

Household Qualification.—Every person is an **Occupier** who occupies a dwelling-house, or part of a house as a separate dwelling (even only one room), provided the Landlord does not, as Landlord, reside in the house. This qualification is irrespective of the amount of the rent.

£10 Qualification.—Every person is an **Occupier** who occupies land or business premises of the clear yearly value of not less than £10, and who resides within the County, or within 15 miles of its boundary, or, in the case of the Municipal Borough, within 7 miles.

Joint Occupation.—Persons sharing the same dwelling, or the same land or business premises, may claim as **Joint-Occupiers**, provided the tenancy is joint, and that the clear yearly value, when divided, amounts to £10 for each person claiming. There is, however, no such limit to the clear yearly value in the case of a person claiming to be registered as a Burgess for the election of a Town Council.

Married Women.—Husband and wife cannot claim as Joint-Occupiers, but, by the Local Government Act, 1894, section 43, they may both be registered, provided they

are not qualified in respect of the same property; such registration will entitle married women to vote in the election of District Councils, Rural and Urban, Parish Councils, Boards of Guardians, and London Borough Councils, though not in Town Council Elections, nor in County Council Elections, *except that of the London County Council.*

It is essential that **the poor rates** due, in respect of the dwelling-house, business premises or land, for the year preceding the last 5th of January, **shall have been paid** by some person **before July 20th**, but not necessarily by the Occupier.

What is the Period of Qualification?

The Period of Qualification is one year, *i.e.*, twelve months immediately preceding July 15th in any year. Occupiers who remove during the twelve months do not lose their qualification, provided they successively occupy qualifying premises during the whole period within the boundary of the Administrative County or the area of election.

It should be noted that on the **First day of August** the Overseers of every Parish place the Occupiers' List for the coming year on the door of each Church, Chapel, Post Office, and other Public Buildings in the Parish. Examine this list, and if your name is not there, go at once to the Overseers, or to the Secretary of your Political Association, and learn how to make your **Claim to be put on the Register. It will cost you nothing**, and you should **make sure of your right to vote.**

, **The LAST DAY for sending in NEW CLAIMS is August 20th.**

WOMEN CANDIDATES

IN ENGLAND AND WALES.

For Election to a—

COUNTY COUNCIL, BOROUGH COUNCIL.

QUALIFICATIONS.

A woman, married or single, is entitled to be a Candidate for a County Council if she is a County elector; for a Borough Council if she is a burgess.

NOMINATIONS.

Forms of Nominations for the County Council can be obtained free of charge from the Returning Officer, or for the Borough from the Town Clerk.

Only one Candidate's name must appear on each Nomination Paper, and each Paper must be signed by two electors as nominator and seconder, and eight other electors as assentors. The electors so signing must be registered in the County Council District or for the Ward in the Borough for which the Candidate is nominated.

For Election to a—

METROPOLITAN BOROUGH COUNCIL, URBAN DISTRICT COUNCIL, RURAL DISTRICT COUNCIL, PARISH COUNCIL, BOARD OF GUARDIANS.

QUALIFICATIONS.

A woman, married or single, is entitled to be a Candidate for election to any of these bodies, if

- (1) Her name appears on the Register as a Parochial Elector, or
- (2) She has resided for the whole of the twelve months preceding the Election within the specified area:

For the Metropolitan Borough Council, if resident in or registered in any Parish comprised in the Borough.

For the Urban District Council, within the Urban District.

For the Rural District Council, within the Poor Law Union.

For the Parish Council, within the Parish, or within three miles thereof.

For the Board of Guardians, within the Poor Law Union.

NOMINATIONS.

In all cases Forms of Nominations can be obtained free of charge from the Returning Officer, and (except for election to an Urban District Council) from the Overseers.

Only one Candidate's name must appear on each Nomination Paper, and each Paper must be signed by two Parochial Electors of the Parish or District, or Ward of a District, in which the Candidate is standing for election.

Each Candidate may, and where possible should, get more than one Nomination Paper signed.

SUMMARY OF PARLIAMENTARY ELECTION OFFENCES.

CORRUPT PRACTICES.

OFFENCES.

BRIBERY.—No gift, loan, or promise of money or money's worth must be made to a voter to induce him either to vote or to abstain from voting.

The offer or promise of a situation or employment to a voter or any one connected with him, if made with the same object, is also bribery.

The consequences are the same whether bribery is committed before, during, or after an election.

Giving or paying money for the purpose of bribery is equivalent to the offence itself.

A gift or promise to a third person to procure a vote is bribery. Payment for loss of time, wages, or travelling expenses is equal to bribery.

Any person who receives a bribe, or bargains for employment or reward in consideration of his vote, is guilty of bribery.

TREATING.—No meat, drink, entertainment or provision can be paid for or provided for any person, at any time, in order to induce him, or any other person, to vote or to abstain from voting.

Treating the wives or relatives of voters is equally forbidden.

The gift of tickets to be exchanged for refreshment is treating.

The receiver of any meat, drink, &c., is equally guilty, and liable to the same consequences.

UNDUE INFLUENCE.—No force, restraint, or fraud may be used to compel an elector to vote or abstain.

Using or threatening any spiritual or temporal injury is undue influence.

The withdrawal of custom, or a threat to do so, comes under this prohibition. A threat to evict a tenant will also be undue influence.

PERSONATION.—*Applying for* a ballot paper in the name of another person, whether alive or dead.

Voting twice at the same election.

Aiding or abetting the commission of the offence of personation.

Forging or counterfeiting a ballot paper.

PENALTIES.

To the briber or the person bribed, twelve months' imprisonment, with or without hard labour, or a fine of £200.

Deprivation of the right of voting for seven years.

Removal from, and disqualification for, any public office.

Payment of costs of an election inquiry in certain cases.

If committed by the Candidate he also loses his seat, if elected, and is disqualified for ever from representing the Constituency.

If committed by any Agent the election is void, and the Candidate is disqualified for seven years.

The same as for Bribery.

The same as for Bribery.

To the offender, two years' imprisonment, with hard labour.

Seven years' incapacity to vote, or hold any public office.

If committed by any Agent, the Candidate loses his seat.

ILLEGAL PRACTICES.

OFFENCES.

PENALTIES.

CONVEYANCE.—Paying or receiving money for conveyance of voters to or from the poll.

(Private conveyances lent gratuitously can alone be employed; hackney carriages are prohibited except when hired by voters for their own exclusive use.)

ADVERTISING.—Paying money to an Elector for exhibiting bills, &c. (except to regular bill-posters). The receiver is also guilty.

COMMITTEE ROOMS.—Hiring unauthorised Committee Rooms. (The Election Agent alone, or Sub-Agents in Counties, may hire Committee Rooms, and the number is strictly limited.)

VOTING when prohibited or inducing a prohibited elector to vote. (Elector employed for payment cannot vote.)

FALSE STATEMENT.—Publishing a false statement of the withdrawal of any Candidate, or with reference to the character of a Candidate.

A fine of £100.
Incapacity to vote for five years.
If committed by an Agent, the election may be rendered void.

ILLEGAL PAYMENT, EMPLOYMENT, AND HIRING.

OFFENCES.

PENALTIES.

PUBLISHING BILLS, placards or posters, without the printer's and publisher's name and address. (The Election Agent alone, or Sub-Agents in Counties, must issue any printed matter at the election.)

PAYMENT FOR BANDS OF MUSIC, torches, flags, banners, ribbons, &c.

LENDING OR USING, for the conveyance of voters, horses or vehicles usually kept for hire.

EMPLOYMENT of any persons beyond the numbers allowed.

(No person can be employed for payment at an election except by the Election Agent—or, in Counties, by the Sub-Agents—who is strictly limited as to the numbers he may engage.)

USING AS A COMMITTEE ROOM any room in a licensed house, refreshment house, or public elementary school.

A fine of £100.

IMPORTANT.

Any of the above offences, if committed by a Candidate or Election Agent (or Sub-Agent in Counties), will render the election void. The vote of the person committing the offence is also void, in case there is a scrutiny.

The term 'Agent,' as used above, includes members of an Election Committee.

No expense must be incurred by anybody without the Election Agent's written authority, as the maximum expense allowed by law for each Candidate cannot be exceeded without rendering the election void.

The person incurring any unauthorised expense will be personally liable for its repayment, as well as for the consequences of having broken the law.

All claims against a Candidate must be sent to his Election Agent within 14 days, and paid within 28 days from the declaration of the poll. With some exceptions, no claim sent in later can be paid.

PARLIAMENTARY VACANCIES : HOW CREATED, HOW FILLED.

A MEMBER of the House of Commons cannot relinquish his seat during the continuance of the Parliament for which he is elected, nor can he refuse to serve even if nominated and elected against his will. This rule is, however, in practice evaded by a Member who wishes to retire applying for the Stewardship of the Chiltern Hundreds, an office under the Crown which, on acceptance, vacates the seat, and which is resigned as soon as its purpose is fulfilled, or retained only until the appointment is revoked in order to make way for another applicant.

The acceptance of the Chiltern Hundreds during a Recess does not create a vacancy so as to enable the Speaker to issue a new writ, therefore a Member cannot effectively resign his seat during a Recess. Applications have sometimes, under exceptional circumstances, been refused, but ordinarily the Treasury will give the office (the duties of which are merely nominal) to any Member who applies unless there appears sufficient grounds for withholding it.

Vacancies can arise, therefore, only from the following causes :—

1. Death of Members.
2. Their elevation to the Peerage.
3. Acceptance of Office under the Crown.
4. Bankruptcy.
5. Lunacy.
6. On the report of Election Judges that elections or returns are void.

Issue of Writs during Session.

If a vacancy occurs during the Session, the writ issues on the Speaker's warrant by motion in the House, but where the vacancy occurs prior to or immediately after the opening of a new Parliament, a writ cannot be issued until after the expiration of the time for presenting an Election Petition.

Issue of Writs during Recess.

If a vacancy occurs during a Recess, the Speaker's warrant for the writ issues on a Certificate under the hands of two Members, that a Member has died or that a writ of summons under the Great Seal has been issued to summon him to Parliament as a Peer.

In the case of a Member accepting an office under the Crown, the procedure is the same, but the certificate must be accompanied by a copy of the *Gazette* containing the Member's appointment to the Office, and, in addition, the Member must himself in writing notify his acceptance of the Office to the Speaker, or countersign the certificate. (The power to issue the warrant is in this case permissive and not obligatory on the Speaker, so that he may, by abstaining from issuing the warrant, reserve for the decision of the House any question as to whether the Office is one the acceptance of which vacates the seat.)

Bankruptcy.

If the vacancy arises by reason of a Member being adjudged a bankrupt in England, the writ issues on the certificate of the Bankruptcy Court. By the Bankruptcy Act, 1883, if the disqualifications for sitting and voting in the House or in Committees of the House are not

removed within six months from the date of the order, the Court is required to certify the bankruptcy to the Speaker, and the seat of the Member thereupon becomes vacant.

No penalty appears to attach to a bankrupt for sitting and voting, and as no notice of his bankruptcy is required to be given to the Speaker for six months, a bankrupt Member may continue to attend Parliament until the Speaker receives such notice, unless the House itself takes notice that he is incapable of sitting and voting, and order him to withdraw.

Notice of certificates so received by the Speaker during recess must be Gazetted, and the writ must not issue until six days thereafter, nor shall the writ issue unless application be made for it so long before the next meeting of Parliament as that the writ for the election may be issued before the day of such meeting.

Lunacy. *If the vacancy arises by reason of the Member's confinement as a Lunatic, the procedure is as follows:—*The medical practitioner on whose certificate, or the Court or person on whose order the Member is detained, shall, or two Members may, certify the same to the Speaker, who shall transmit such certificate to the Commissioners in Lunacy, who thereupon shall visit and examine the Member and report to the Speaker whether he is of unsound mind. If the report is in the affirmative, the Speaker shall, at the expiration of six months if the House is sitting, and, if not, as soon as may be after the next sitting, require the Commissioners to again examine the Member, and if he is still of unsound mind, the report is laid upon the Table of the House—the seat becomes vacant and a new writ is issued.

Apparently under this provision a Writ cannot be issued during a recess, and similarly—

Election Petition. *If the Vacancy arises by reason of a Member being unseated on Petition, the House, on being informed by the Speaker of the receipt of the Judges' Certificate, gives the necessary direction for confirming or altering the Return, or for issuing a Writ for a new Election as circumstances may require.*

The Returning Officer. The writ is directed to the Returning Officer. The Sheriff is the Returning Officer in Counties and in cities and towns being Counties in themselves, and the Mayor in parliamentary Boroughs.

PROCEDURE BETWEEN RECEIPT OF WRIT AND THE POLLING.

The Returning Officer must give public notice of the Election on the day on which he receives the Writ or the day after in a Parliamentary Borough, and in a County, not later than the second day after. The notice must be given between the hours of 9 a.m. and 4 p.m., and must state the place, day, and hour on which he will attend to receive nominations, and, in case of a contested election, the date of the polling.

The following tables (copied by permission from the 'Duties of an Election Agent and of a Returning Officer at a Parliamentary Election,' by the late Frank R. Parker, published by Knight & Co., 227 Tooley Street, S.E.) show how the time is calculated between the receipt of the Writ and the day of polling, on the assumption that the Writ is received on the first day of the month. This computation does not take into consideration Sundays, Christmas Day, Good Friday, and days of public fasting and thanksgiving. Anything falling on either of these days may be done on the next day, but a Bank Holiday is to be treated like any other working day and cannot be excluded in computing election dates.

PARLIAMENTARY CANDIDATURES.

QUALIFICATIONS.

ANY male person of the full age of twenty-one years, a natural-born subject, and not barred by any of the inherent or statutory disqualifications named below, is eligible for election to the House of Commons.

A naturalised subject is now also, apparently, eligible. It has been enacted (33 and 34 Vict. c. 14, s. 7) that an alien, to whom a certificate of naturalisation has been granted by a Secretary of State, is entitled to all the political and other rights, powers, and privileges, and is subject to all the obligations to which a natural-born British subject is entitled or subject. Some authorities still hold it questionable whether the words in the above section so repeal section 3 of 12 and 13 Will. III. c. 2 (which enacted that no alien, though naturalised, shall be capable of being elected to either House of Parliament) as to qualify a naturalised person for election.

DISQUALIFICATIONS.

In Parker's *Election Agent and Returning Officer* (see preceding page) the different grounds of incapacity for election to the House of Commons are, for convenience, divided into three classes—

- (a) Incapacity by reason of infirmity or mental imbecility.
- (b) Incapacity by reason of circumstances, character, or conduct.
- (c) Incapacity by reason of holding certain offices or positions.

In addition, there is the disqualification arising from sex—the Candidate may not be a woman.

Under class (a) fall idiots, lunatics, minors, and persons who are deaf and dumb.

Under class (b) fall aliens, bankrupts, criminals, persons reported by an Election Court as guilty of corrupt or illegal practices, either by themselves or through their Agents, at Parliamentary or Municipal Elections. This disqualification extends for seven years, or a lesser period, according as to whether the offence was one for which the Candidate was himself personally guilty, or reported guilty by his Agent.

Under class (c) fall priests or deacons of the Church of England, ministers of the Church of Scotland, or in holy orders in the Church of Rome; contractors for or on account of the Public Service, other than Incorporated Companies; permanent paid officials of a County Council who are required to devote the whole of their time to such employment; Governors of Colonies, Judges of the High Court, Peers of Parliament (except Irish Peers who have not been elected as representative Peers in the House of Lords), and various other officials.

There are partial disqualifications attaching to the following: Returning Officers, Recorders, Revising Barristers, and certain others holding official positions.

It would be the duty of the Election Agent, or officials of a Party Organization, before the nomination of any person holding a public office, to ascertain whether a disqualification would be likely to attach to the Candidate, and it might be expedient to make similar inquiry in regard to any public office held by the opposing Candidate.

PARLIAMENTARY ELECTIONS.

CANDIDATES' ELECTION EXPENSES.

THE Corrupt and Illegal Practices Prevention Act of 1883 (46 & 47 Vic., c. 51), better known as the 'Corrupt Practices Act,' and the Ballot Act of 1872 (35 & 36 Vic., c. 33), are the principal statutes under which Parliamentary Elections are now conducted and controlled.

The former defines an **Election Expense** as one 'incurred on account of, or in respect of, the conduct or management of an Election,' and places a maximum limit upon such expenditure according to the number of electors.

The following is the Scale in **Counties**, and divisions of Counties (and, in Scotland, combined Counties), exclusive of the Returning Officers' Charges and Candidates' Personal Expenses, and the cost of conveying voters by sea in certain cases:—

And so on, adding £30 for every complete 1000 Electors in the case of single Candidates, and £45 for every complete 1000 Electors in the case of two joint Candidates. The Scale is the same in Irish Boroughs with the exception that if the number of Electors on the Register does not exceed 500, the maximum amount shall be (for a single Candidate), £200; exceeds 500 but does not exceed 1000, £250; exceeds 1000 but does not exceed 1500, £275.

A **Joint Candidature** is created (a) Where the same Election Agent is appointed by, or on behalf of, two or more Candidates, or where two or more Candidates by themselves, or any Agent or Agents; (b) Hire or use the same Committee-rooms, or (c) Employ or use the services of the same Sub-Agents, Clerks, Messengers, or Polling Agents, or (d) Publish a joint Address, or joint Circular or Notice. But the Candidature will not be deemed a joint Candidature if the hire or employment referred to in (b) and (c) be accidental or casual, or of a trivial or unimportant character.

FISCAL DIAGRAMS.

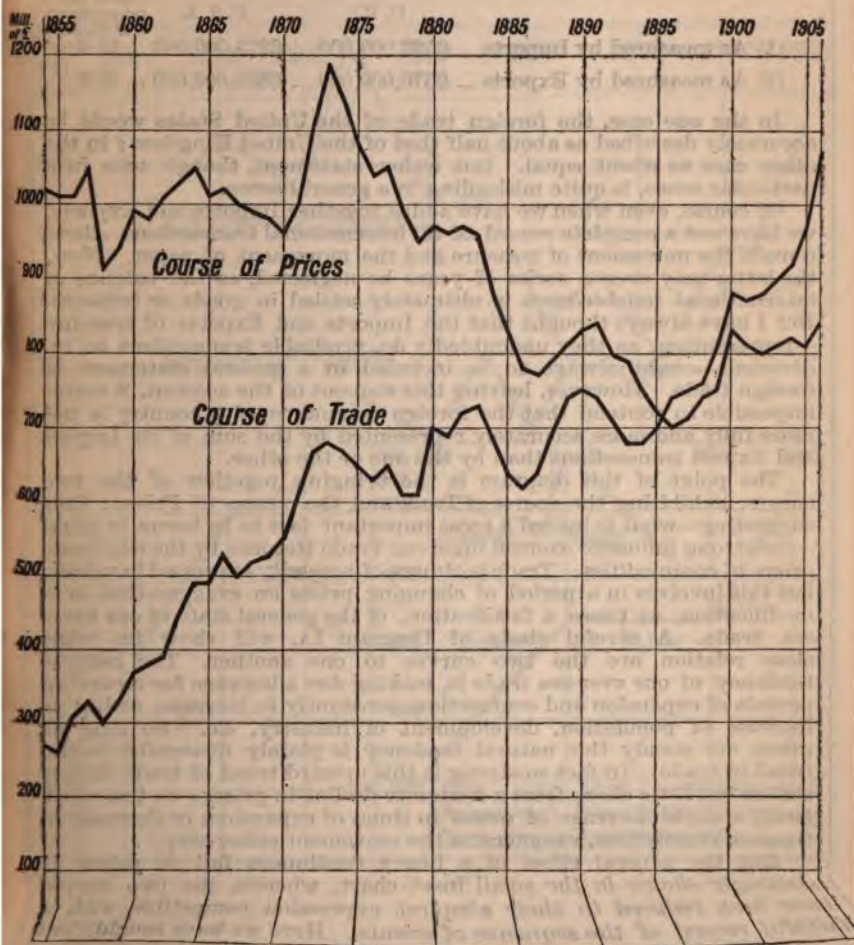
THE following series of diagrams has been designed to bring out certain salient facts in the fiscal controversy, facts too often ignored or misinterpreted by the so-called 'Tariff Reformers.' In these brief notes attached to the diagrams I shall content myself with giving my references, alluding to any necessary explanations or qualifications of my figures, and pointing the moral.

Diagrams I. and IA. The Trade curve in each case shows in millions of £ the aggregate Over-sea Trade of the United Kingdom, *i.e.*, total Imports + Exports of British Produce + Exports of Foreign and Colonial Produce, as shown in the Statistical Abstracts of the United Kingdom: the figures for 1906 being taken from the monthly Trade and Navigation Returns.

The Price curve in each case shows the course of prices, expressed by the method of index numbers, in percentages of the prices prevailing in a standard year—1871. From 1854–1900, the curve is the same as that given in the chart published in Parl. Paper 321 of 1903, and in Cd. 1761. For the years 1901–06 the curve is based on the index numbers published in the *Board of Trade Gazette* for January 1907, expressed in terms of the old standard year—1871—instead of the new standard 1900. This is done to preserve the continuity of the curve, and of course does not impair the relativity of the values. In the Price curve 1000=100%, 900=90% of the standard, and so on.

Objection is sometimes taken to the adding together of Imports and Exports when setting forth the foreign trade of a country. But a moment's reflection will, I think, show that the objection cannot reasonably be maintained. In discussions on international trade it is naturally desired to measure for the different countries their relative activities in foreign commerce. To take only Exports or only Imports is sufficient where attention is being directed only to Exports or Imports, as the case may be; but in a general comparison of foreign commercial relations, to take either one or the other alone is manifestly to give but a partial view of the matter. For it is too often forgotten that all exporters are not necessarily also importers; and that even manufacturers consuming imported raw material, who are also large exporters, are often not themselves the importers of the raw materials they use in their industry. Now, in the long run, we are surely entitled to assume that every pound's worth of Imports, no less than every pound's worth of Exports, represents a profitable transaction to some inhabitant of the country into or from which the Import or Export comes. Consequently, to take either one or the other as the sole criterion of a country's foreign trade is to give but one-half of the picture. Now, this would not much matter if the conditions were alike for all countries. But they are not. Take the striking difference

between the foreign trade of the United Kingdom and of the United States. In the former there is a large excess of Imports, in the latter a large excess of Exports. According as one or the other is selected as the test of relative activity in foreign trade, a marked difference is shown in their comparative trade statistics. The following table shows this in striking fashion :—

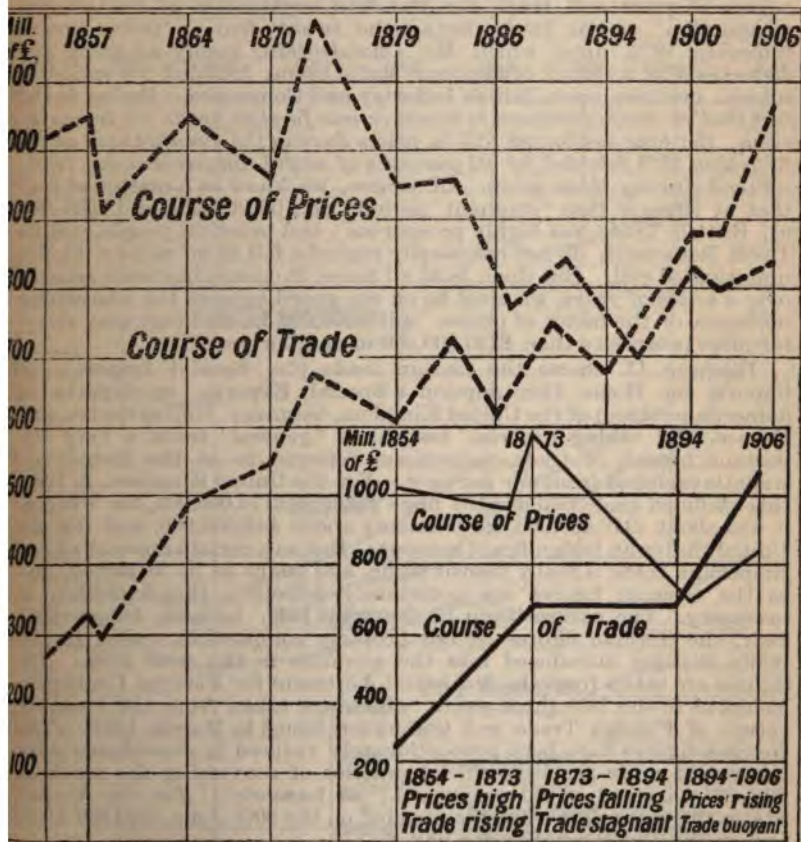
In the one case, the foreign trade of the United States would be accurately described as about half that of the United Kingdom; in the other case as about equal. But either statement, though true in a particular sense, is quite misleading in a general sense.

Of course, even when we have added together Imports and Exports, we have not a complete record of all international transactions—there remain the movement of treasure and the movement of paper. Now, the latter may over a series of years be neglected, as the balance of international indebtedness is ultimately settled in goods or treasure. But I have always thought that the Imports and Exports of treasure—representing, as they undoubtedly do, profitable transactions to individuals—ought always to be included in a general statement of foreign trade. However, leaving this also out of the account, it seems impossible to contend that the foreign commerce of a country is not more fully and more accurately represented by the sum of its Import and Export transactions than by the one or the other.

The point of this diagram is the bringing together of the two curves, exhibiting the course of Trade and the course of Prices; thus suggesting—what is indeed a most important fact to be borne in mind—the strong influence exerted upon our Trade Returns by the wholesale prices of commodities. Trade is almost of necessity expressed in values, but this involves in a period of changing prices an exaggeration or a modification, at times a falsification, of the general state of our over-sea trade. A careful study of Diagram IA. will show in what close relation are the two curves to one another. The natural tendency of our over-sea trade is, making due allowance for recurring periods of expansion and contraction, constantly to increase, owing to increase of population, development of industry, &c. So long as prices are steady this natural tendency is plainly discernible in the trend of trade. In fact so strong is this upward trend of trade that it suffers but little check from a moderate decline in prices; on the other hand, a slight increase of prices in times of expansion, or decrease in times of contraction, exaggerates the movement either way.

But the general effect of a heavy continuous fall in prices is strikingly shown in the small inset chart, wherein the two curves have been reduced to their simplest expression compatible with a faithful record of the sequence of events. Here we have roughly two

DIAGRAM 1a.—Showing for the period 1854–1906 the chief oscillations in the course of Trade and the course of Prices; based on Diagram 1.



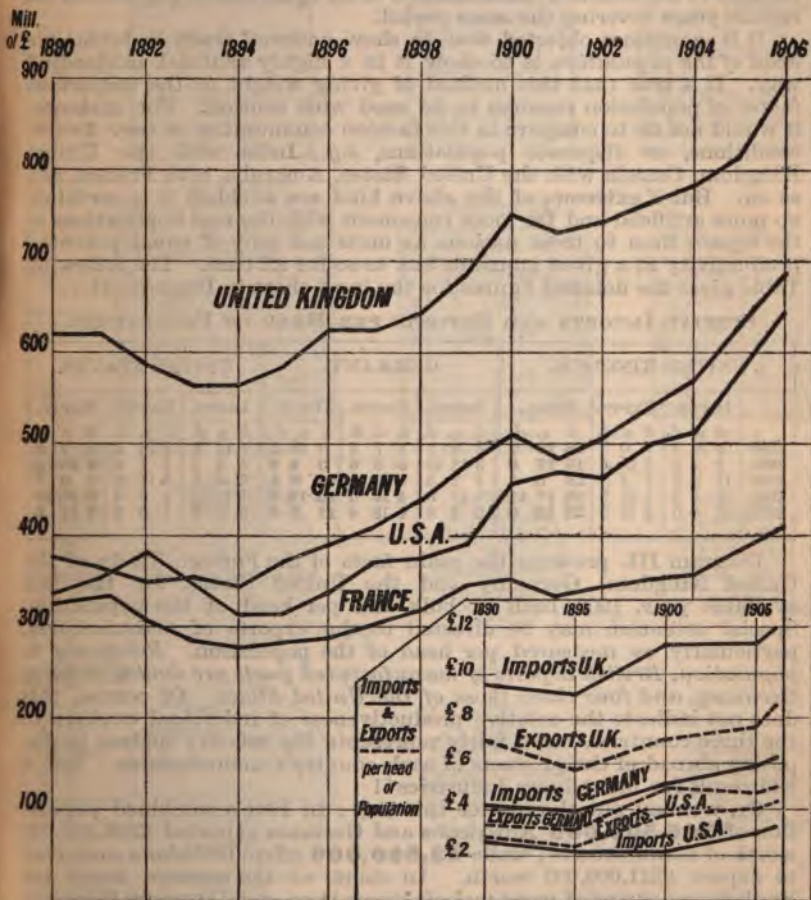
completed periods of twenty years each and one of twelve years. In the first, for the greater part of the time, prices were fairly steady, followed in the last three years by the great inflation of values caused by the Franco-Prussian War. Trade rose steadily and then boomed. In the last twelve years, prices have first risen and then maintained a fairly high level. Trade, as measured in terms of Imports and Exports, has been remarkably buoyant, and but for the hesitation during the closing years of the war in South Africa, persistently so.

It is the second period—from 1873-94—that illustrates most forcibly the point I am making. In the relation between the two curves of price and trade lies the chief explanation of the alleged 'stagnation' of our trade during the twenty-five or thirty years following 1872, upon which Mr. Chamberlain, rashly adopting the deductions of a crowd of amateur statisticians, founded his series of funeral orations upon British Industry and Commerce. *Owing to the fact that we are accustomed to measure our foreign trade in terms of value, the long-continued fall in prices during the twenty-three years following 1873 falsified for all purposes of useful comparison our trade returns during those years.* Of course, we know as a matter of fact that at times in that 'stagnant' period, e.g., in 1881-2-3 and 1889-90-91, British Trade was highly prosperous; and practical people, unlike Tariff Reformers, do not necessarily regard a fall in prices as a wholly unmitigated evil. But then, as at all times, in comparing trade returns over a series of years, we must be on our guard against the disturbing influence of the factor of prices. £100,000,000 in one year may stand for more prosperity than £120,000,000 in another year.

Diagram II. shows the foreign trade (i.e. Special Imports, or imports for Home Consumption + Special Exports, or exports of domestic produce) of the United Kingdom, Germany, United States, and France. By taking 'special' instead of 'general' trade, a very important branch of trade (sometimes referred to as the Emporium trade) is excluded from our purview. For the United Kingdom, in 1906, this excluded trade reached the huge total of £170,000,000, for France, it was about £110,000,000, for Germany about £40,000,000, and for the United States an insignificant amount. But as a certain amount of our Emporium trade is really transit trade, and ought to be deducted, and as the German figures are notoriously defective, this exclusion is necessary. The curves begin in the year 1890, because, before that year, the German figures are not properly comparable, owing to the many changes introduced into the accounts in the year 1889. The figures are taken from the Statistical Abstracts for Foreign Countries, except as to the last three years, which are taken from the monthly return of Foreign Trade and Commerce issued in March, 1907. (The German figures have been proportionately reduced in accordance with the recent more accurate official practice of converting the mark at 20.4=1*l.*, instead of 20 marks=1*l.*, as formerly.) For the United States the years shown are those ended on the 30th June, for 1890-1903, and on the 31st December, for 1904-6.

In the main diagram, the striking thing is the general similarity of the curve for the three great commercial nations whose population is rapidly increasing, and the steady maintenance by the United King-

dom of its commanding lead. The curve for France is added to show that the foreign trade of a great commercial nation may be comparatively 'stagnant' when measured by imports and exports, although, it has not yet occurred to Tariff Reformers to hold up the wealthy French people as an awful example of a nation in premature commercial decay, the facile prey of foreign rivals, and the home of ruined manufacturers and of starving workmen. In the inset diagram the imports for home consumption and the exports of domestic produce of the United Kingdom, Germany, and the United States are shown reduced to the common denomination of an equal unit of population for certain years covering the same period.

It is sometimes objected that to show national trade in terms *per head of the population* is to show it in a highly artificial, misleading way. It is true that this method of giving weight to the important factor of population requires to be used with caution. For instance, it would not do to compare in this fashion communities of very diverse conditions, or disparate populations, *e.g.*, India with the United Kingdom, Canada with the United States, Australia with France, and so on. But if extremes of the above kind are avoided, it is certainly no more artificial and far more consonant with the real implications of the figures than to treat nations as units not only of equal potential productivity at a given moment, but as so for all time. The following Table gives the detailed figures for the inset chart in Diagram II. :—

Diagram III. presents the main facts of the Foreign Trade of the United Kingdom, Germany and the United States, for the last available year, 1906, both in bulk and per head of the population. Special attention may be directed to the exports of manufactures, particularly as measured per head of the population. *Relatively to population, British exports of manufactured goods are double those of Germany, and four times those of the United States.* Of course, this does not indicate the relative productiveness of individual workers in the three countries, but it fairly represents the relative success in disposing abroad of the products of each country's manufactures. Not a bad result for our 'dying industries'!

Or, we may put the matter this way : In 1906 a combined population of **146,500,000** Americans and Germans exported £356,500,000 worth of manufactures; while **43,500,000** effete Britishers contrived to export £311,000,000 worth. In short, *on the average*, every SIX Englishmen exported more manufactures than every SIXTEEN Germans and Americans combined.

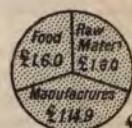

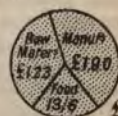


Diagram IV. deals with the question of population. The estimates of total population are based on those given in the various Statistical Abstracts. The estimates of those engaged in the principal manufacturing industries are based on the following table taken from p. 434 of [Cd. 2337].

According to the official figures the German total increased by 35 in the 20 years, 1875-95. I have simply assumed that it increased by 8 in each period, 1875-80 and 1895-1900. Then for 1906, I have in each case taken the figure for 1900-1. This is probably correct for the United Kingdom, but is certainly an under-statement for both Germany and the United States. I then multiply these figures by 4, on the assumption that each worker has on the average 3 dependents. And in this way I arrive at the shaded portions of the columns in the diagram.

Now, a consideration of the facts illustrated by this diagram shows that so far as these groups of industries are concerned, the population of the United Kingdom had already reached saturation-point, as it were, a quarter of a century ago, while that of Germany, and still more that of the United States, is even to-day far below that point. But already the German workers in these industries exceed the British, while those of the United States are nearly as numerous as ours. It follows, quite apart from the increasing disparity between the total populations, that the co-efficient of expansion in Germany is greater, and in the United States enormously greater, than it is in the United Kingdom; and with a greater possible rate of expansion calculated on larger and more rapidly growing populations, both Germany and the United States may be expected, other things being equal, to be ere long in a position to export more manufactured goods than the United Kingdom. Of course, other things are seldom equal, but this factor of population is one to be constantly kept in mind in all international comparisons.

[N.B.—The Self-governing Colonies taken are Canada, Newfoundland, New Zealand, Australia, Cape Colony, Natal.]

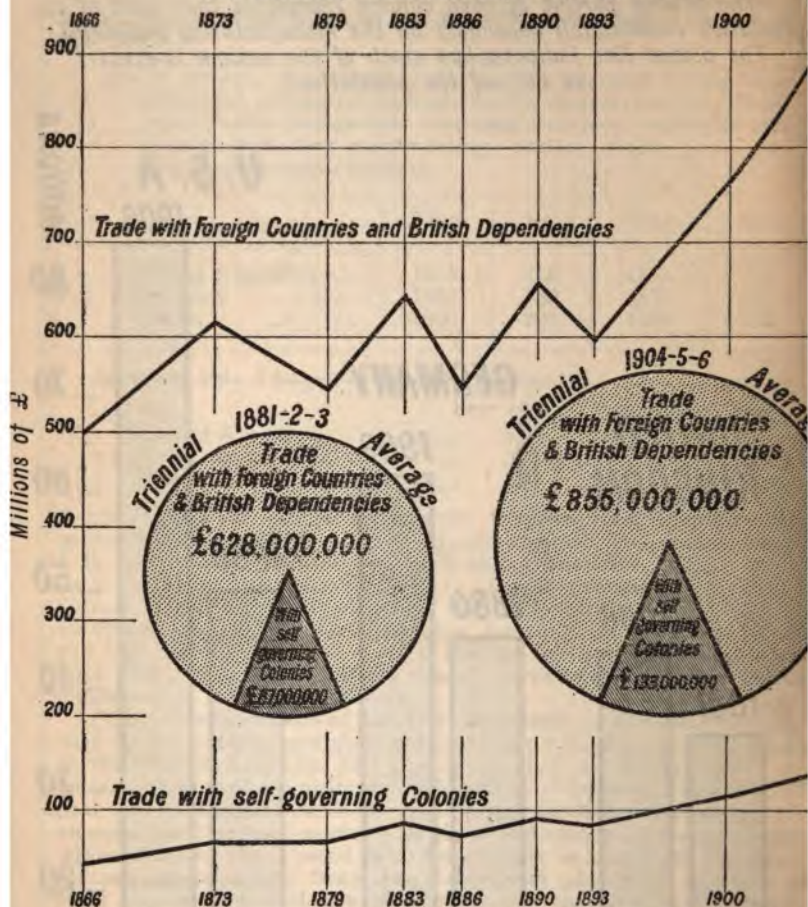


Diagram V. shows our total Over-sea trade, distinguishing that with foreign countries and British dependencies enjoying Free Trade, and that with our Protectionist Self-governing Colonies, from which "offer" of such preferences as that contained in the new Austral Tariff may be said to emanate. The diagram shows (1) the comparative importance of the two trades, (2) the vastly greater expansion of our foreign trade, and (3) the fact that for nearly a quarter of a century there has been little change in the relative values. Comparing two periods of great trade activity, 1881-2-3 and 1904-5-6, in the latter

DIAGRAM VI.—FOREIGN TRADE AND UNEMPLOYMENT.

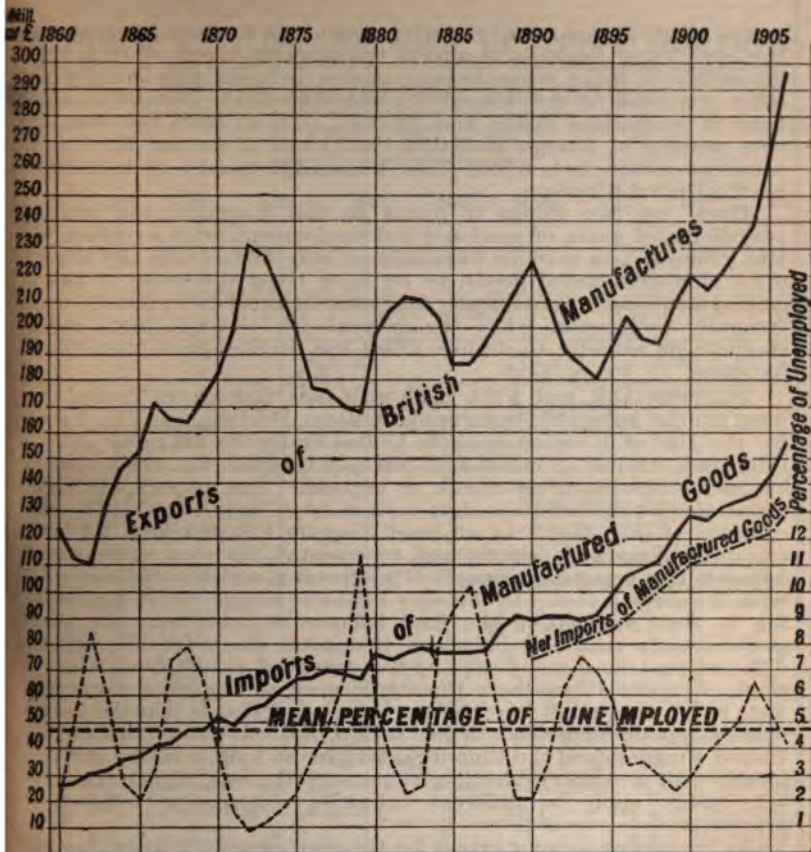


Diagram VI. In this diagram I have brought together the curves of our exports and imports of manufactured goods, and that of unemployment. The figures for Imports and Exports are taken from pp. 341-2 of [Cd. 2337], and from the Trade and Navigation Returns for December 1906. The percentage of unemployed, year by year, is taken from a table at p. 90 of [Cd. 2337], supplemented by the *Board of Trade Gazette* for January 1907.

The main broken curve which goes up and down with violent oscillations indicates, year by year, the percentage of unemployed members of those Trade Unions making returns. The line showing mean percentage of unemployed is based on the main curve. The scale for reading both these lines is on the right of the diagram.

Of course, employment as here shown is strictly relative and necessarily limited to the condition of things in the higher grades of the skilled trades. Of course, too, it does not imply that the same measure applies to the period of time. It is simply the b

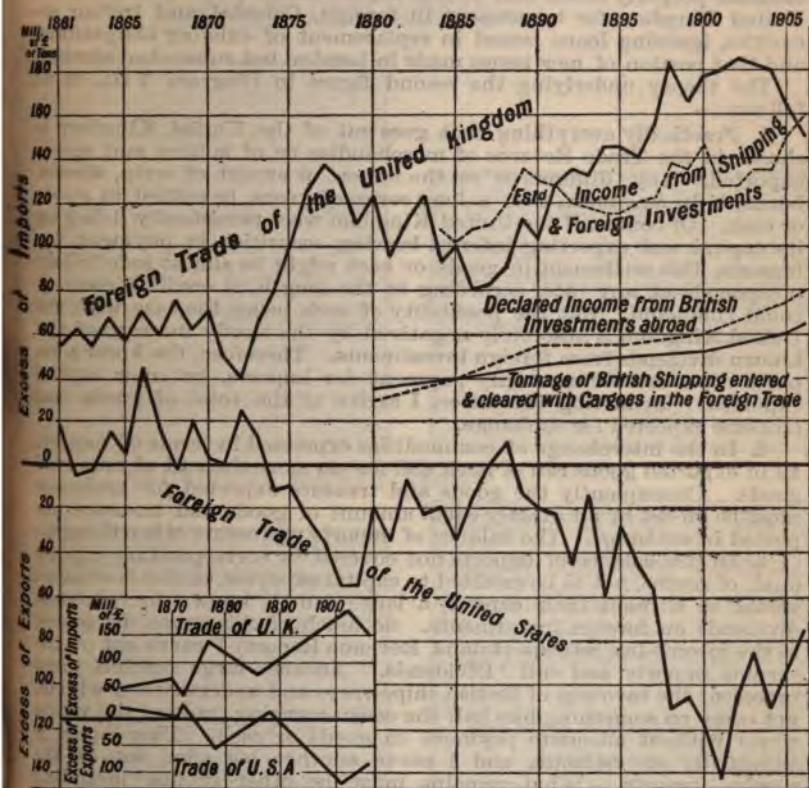
means at our disposal for indicating, from time to time, the *comparative* activity of trade as it affects the working classes. It is quite impossible to make accurate comparisons between this country and other countries in this respect for the reasons (1) that no common basis of comparison exists, and (2) that, as is so often the case, the very poverty of foreign statistical *data* tends to conceal for foreign countries certain facts which fuller knowledge enables us to indicate for the United Kingdom.

There are two things to notice in this diagram: the striking periodicity of years of good and bad employment, with a tendency of late years to less extreme fluctuations; and the fact that the importation of manufactured goods, so far from being the cause of lack of employment—as is so frequently suggested by Tariff Reformers,—tends generally to increase when the demand for labour is good, and to stagnate or actually to decline when the percentage of unemployed increases.

Diagrams VII. and VIII. deal with the 'Balance of Trade,' that most fruitful source of Protectionist fallacy. In Diagram VII. I show for the United Kingdom and the United States the net result of their total trade (including bullion and specie) on balance—*i.e.*, as showing an excess of imports or an excess of exports. The remarkable thing about these two curves is that each is to a large extent the exact converse of the other. In an inset diagram I have taken, for both, certain well-marked periods, and represented the sum of the yearly balances by a curve in arithmetical progression, which sums to equality with the given period. In this way I get two simple curves representing in their summation the final balance of trade over the whole period, while retaining only the dominant characteristics of the different tendencies manifested by the course of events from time to time. I cannot discuss here the significance of this most suggestive fact, but I may point one obvious moral, and that is that the almost exactly opposite experience of two such prosperous communities as the United Kingdom and the United States over so long a series of years (nearly half a century) should give pause to those political economists who rashly apply to different countries certain fixed criteria of prosperity.

As accounting to some extent for the great excess of imports into the United Kingdom I have added further curves, suggesting rather than defining the extent of the earnings of our shipping and of our income from investments abroad. The statistics of British shipping are taken from the Stat. Abst. for the U.K., the *declared* income for British investments abroad from the table, now published annually, in the Inland Revenue Report—for 1906 I have estimated this at £80,000,000. With regard to the curve showing estimated income from shipping and foreign investments since 1884, I have proceeded in this wise; I have taken the tonnage of vessels employed in the foreign trade and partly in the home and partly in the foreign trade, and assumed a gross earning capacity of £10 a ton in the year 1900 (see p. 101 of [Cd. 1761]). To the resultant figures I have applied the index numbers constructed to represent the course of ocean freights and published at p. 256 of [Cd. 2337] (estimating the following index numbers: 1904, 75; 1905, 80;

1906, 80), thus increasing proportionately the estimated earnings in years of high freights, and reducing them in years of low freights. The addition of the income from abroad noted in the Inland Revenue Report yields the figures represented by the curve referred to. Of course, this does not pretend to be anything more than a very rough estimate, or rather suggestion, of the very large portion of our imports which are thus accounted for.

Finally, in Diagram VIII. I make an attempt to show graphically the difference between the false and the true balance of trade. In this diagram the estimate of dividends and of the earnings of our shipping is the same as that in the preceding. The estimate of British capital sent abroad during the years 1884-1906 is taken from an article published in the *Statist* for July 20th, 1907, and compiled by a writer of recognised authority in these matters. It should be noted that his estimate properly refers only to *new* capital actually *subscribed* in the United Kingdom for investment in foreign, Colonial, and Indian securities, ignoring loans issued in replacement of existing obligations, and that portion of new issues made in London but subscribed abroad.

The theory underlying the second figure in Diagram VIII. is as follows:—

1. Practically everything that goes out of the United Kingdom is shown in the Trade Returns of merchandise or of bullion and specie exported. Any 'differences' on the import or export of scrip, shares, bonds, bills, &c., must, over a long series of years, be settled in goods or cash. Of course, if the United Kingdom were persistently living on its capital and exporting interest-bearing securities in payment for imports, this settlement in goods or cash might be almost indefinitely postponed—at any rate, according to the length of credit a country could command. But the possibility of such being the case with the United Kingdom is absolutely negatived by the steady increase of the known dividends from foreign investments. Therefore, the known exports must include not only payment for imports, but new capital exported. Deducting the latter, I arrive at the total of goods and treasure exported for exchange.

2. In the interchange of commodities expressed in terms of money, £1 of exported goods can of itself call for no more than £1 of imported goods. Consequently the goods and treasure exported *for exchange* must be off-set by an exactly equal amount of goods and treasure imported *in exchange*. The balance of imports represents other things.

3. In this balance of imports not covered by corresponding exports (and, of course, not to be credited to capital exported, or the borrowers would be without their capital) a large sum is known to represent dividends on foreign investments. So much of this as can be traced in the income-tax returns (Inland Revenue Report) I carve out of the surplus imports and call 'Dividends.' Another large portion must represent the earnings of British shipowners and underwriters, who do not carry on something like half the ocean-carrying trade of the whole world without adequate payment in goods or cash. This figure is admittedly an estimate, and I carve another big slice out of the surplus imports. What remains must be other profits, including dividends from investments not disclosed or not distinguished in the income-tax returns (*e.g.*, under Schedule D. 1), merchants' profits made abroad, parts of salaries, commissions, &c., earned abroad and remitted home, Indian pensions, &c. &c.

4. These various receipts and profits must be balanced by services rendered of exactly equivalent value. Hence we find, as we should expect to find, that the final balance of trade is represented in the case of the United Kingdom by an **excess of exports**, being in fact the

amount of new British capital invested abroad during the period under review.

I should add, that in any attempt to make a similar analysis of the balance of trade of the United States, many disturbing factors intervene: the large export, on balance, of American capital to Canada, the large sales of American securities to Europe, their repurchase from time to time, their large borrowings, and again, their investments abroad, being opposing forces, tend to mask, if not to negative, any such permanent tendency as is disclosed in the British returns. Again, the American imports are under-valued as compared with ours, while, the earnings of their shipping being small, there is an outward balance of freights due by them to foreign countries, chiefly the United Kingdom. Further, the large expenditure of wealthy Americans either touring or *resident* in Europe involves very heavy remittances of goods or treasure neither by way of exchange, nor in payment of creditors, nor as investment of capital. In most countries there is a certain amount of give and take in this connection, but in the case of the United States the flow is practically all one way.

Generally speaking, the foregoing diagrams, based as they are on official figures, establish the following propositions:—

I.—The alleged stagnation of British Trade from 1872 to the end of the century is contrary to fact—it is an apparent stagnation only, caused by the effect of the fall in prices upon gross values, which do not bear any necessary relation to profits. (Diagrams I. and IA.)

II.—During the last fifteen years or so, when alone satisfactory comparisons can be made, the United Kingdom, in spite of the diminishing ratio of its population, has fairly maintained its absolute commercial supremacy over the United States and Germany, while, proportionately to their respective populations, the United Kingdom, whether in Imports or Exports, has actually increased the already considerable gap which separated it from its two chief competitors, Germany and the United States. (Diagrams II. and IV. and Table at p. 124.)

III.—The United Kingdom, with a population roughly only two-thirds that of Germany, exports manufactures to a value fifty per cent. greater, and with a population only half that of the United States, exports manufactures to double the value. Reckoning per head of the population, the average Englishman exports more than twice as much manufactures as the average German, and more than four times as much as the average American. (Diagram III.)

IV.—Important as is our trade with the Protectionist Self-Governing Colonies, it yet represents only about one-eighth of our total over-sea trade, a proportion which has remained practically constant during the last twenty-five years. (Diagram V.)

V.—Importation of foreign manufactures, so far from being connected with or productive of lack of Employment in this country, is most active when trade is brisk and employment full. It is an index of general prosperity and not the reverse. (Diagram VI.)

VI.—The so-called 'Balance of Trade' as generally understood is a very incomplete statement of a nation's international trading account. In any case the United Kingdom enjoys, by reason of its ability and willingness to invest capital abroad, what would be called 'a favourable balance of trade,' *i.e.* a large and constant excess of exports. (Diagrams VII. and VIII.)

There are numerous other statistical tests of National Commercial success, the great majority of them equally favourable to the claim of the United Kingdom to be absolutely first in commerce; but the above propositions deal with those aspects of international trade upon which, with a singular disregard of the essential facts of the case, Tariff Reformers have concentrated their attention. Tried by all the available tests, there is no sort of doubt that the United Kingdom is not only prosperous in trade, but progressively so; and further, that in just comparison with other commercial nations, she not only maintains the commanding lead she has so long enjoyed, but steadily increases it.

RESOLUTIONS PASSED BY THE HOUSE OF COMMONS IN 1907.

Colonial Preference (*July 15th, 1907*).

'That, in the opinion of this House, the permanent unity of the British Empire will not be secured through a system of preferential duties based upon the protective taxation of food.'

Proposed (as an amendment to Mr. Lyttelton's Vote of Censure) by

Mr. SOARES (L); *Seconded by Mr. J. A. SIMON (L).*

Against, 111; For, 404.

Criminal Law and Procedure (Ireland) Act (*March 13th, 1907*).

'That, in the opinion of this House, the presence of the Criminal Law and Procedure (Ireland) Act on the statute-book is a gross violation of the constitution without parallel in any other portion of His Majesty's dominions, and that the Act should be immediately repealed.'

Proposed by Mr. HOGAN (N); Seconded by Mr. NOLAN (N).

Against, 83; For, 252.

Disestablishment (*February 27th, 1907*).

'That, in the interests alike of religion and the nation, it is desirable to disestablish and disendow the Church of England both in England and Wales.'

Proposed by Mr. EVERETT (L); Seconded by Mr. GODDARD (L).

Against, 90; For, 198.

House of Lords (*June 24th, 1907*).

'That, in order to give effect to the will of the people as expressed by their elected representatives, it is necessary that the power of the other House to alter or reject bills passed by this House should be so restricted by law as to secure that within the limits of a single Parliament the final decision of the Commons shall prevail.'

Proposed by Sir HENRY CAMPBELL-BANNERMAN.

Against, 147; For, 432.

Imprisonment for Debt (*March 20th, 1907*).

'That the present powers of committing to prison for non-payment of a debt ought to be restricted.'

Proposed by Mr. PICKERSGILL (L); Seconded by Mr. D. MACLEAN (L).

Agreed to without a division.

Irish Land Purchase Finance (*July 5th, 1907*).

'That, in the opinion of this House, the method at present in force for providing money for land purchase in Ireland has broken down in practice, and, if persisted in, will throw such a ruinous charge on the already overburdened ratepayers of Ireland as to endanger the entire scheme of land purchase.'

Proposed by Mr. JOHN REDMOND (N); Seconded by Mr. GINNELL (N).

Agreed to without a division.

London Rating (*March 20th, 1907.*)

'That, in the opinion of this House, the present inequality of the rates raised in the different parishes in London requires the early consideration of Parliament.'

Proposed by Mr. CROOKS (LRC); Seconded by Mr. DICKINSON (L).
Agreed to without a division.

Obstructive Motions and Bills (*March 27th, 1907.*)

'That to put a motion on the Order Paper of this House, or to introduce a bill, so as to prevent discussion in this House of motions for which precedence has been obtained in the ballot or of definite matters of urgent public importance, is hurtful to the usefulness of this House, and an infringement of the rights of its members.'

Proposed by Mr. BOWLES (C); Seconded by Mr. A. HENDERSON (LRC).
Agreed to without a division.

Sir Horace Plunkett's Position (*April 24th, 1907.*)

'That the position of Vice-President of the Board of Agriculture in Ireland was intended by Parliament to be, and in fact is, a Ministerial and Parliamentary office, properly vacated upon a change of Government, and that the retention of that office by a political opponent of the Government of the day is undesirable as a permanent arrangement.'

Proposed by Mr. MURPHY (N); Seconded by Mr. MOONEY (N).
Agreed to without a division.

Railway Servants (Hours of Labour) (*March 6th, 1907.*)

'That this House disapproves of engine-drivers, firemen, guards, and other classes of railway employees being compelled to be on duty during excessive hours, and being allowed but short intervals of rest, and urges upon the Government the necessity of applying more vigorously the Railway Regulation (Hours of Labour) Act, 1893, and, if this is inefficient, to prepare an amendment to the Act.'

Proposed by Mr. W. E. HARVEY (Lab); Seconded by Mr. R. BELL (Lab).
Agreed to without a division.

Rural Depopulation (*May 8th, 1907.*)

'That the progressive decline of population in rural districts is a subject of serious national concern, and that this House ought at once to take such action, legislative and administrative, as will maintain a rural population as a reservoir of national strength and a necessary condition of national well-being.'

Proposed by Mr. ROGERS (L); Seconded by Mr. H. DE R. WALKER (L).
Agreed to without a division.

Scottish Ecclesiastical Assessments (*February 26th, 1907.*)

'That the levying of compulsory assessments in Scotland for the purpose of defraying the cost of rebuilding or repairing churches or manses of a particular denomination is inequitable and unjust, and ought to be abolished forthwith.'

Proposed by Mr. McCRAE (L); Seconded by Mr. CROMBIE (L).
Against, 39; For, 177.

Shop Hours Act, Failure of (*May 1st, 1907.*)

'That, in the opinion of this House, more drastic legislation with regard to the closing of shops and the hours of shop assistants is required.'

Proposed by Mr. SHACKLETON (LRC); Seconded by Mr. SEDDON (LRC).
Agreed to without a division.

Taxation and Social Reform (*March 26th, 1907.*)

'That, in the opinion of this House, having regard to the wealth of the United Kingdom and the nature of its distribution, it is necessary to readjust the burden of taxation in order to make provision for social reforms which are urgently needed.'

Proposed by Mr. BENNETT (L); Seconded by Mr. CHIOZZA MONEY (L).
Agreed to without a division.

Town Development (*May 1st, 1907.*)

'That, in the opinion of this House, local authorities should be granted by legislation the power of laying out suburbs for building upon a rational plan, which shall include adequate air space, convenient grounds for recreation, and facilities for locomotion, so preventing the grave evils which result from overcrowding in and around great cities.'

Proposed by Mr. P. W. WILSON (L); Seconded by Mr. JOWETT (LRC).
Agreed to without a division.

THE STATUTE BOOK OF 1907.

[An asterisk (*) indicates that the measure was introduced by the Liberal Government, a dagger (!) that facilities for its passage were afforded by the Government.]

† **Advertisements Regulation.** (7 Edward VII. c. 27.)

Gives power to local authorities to make regulations dealing with high hoardings and with advertisements which disfigure landscapes, &c.

* **Army (Annual).** (7 Edward VII. c. 2.)

Provides for the discipline and regulation of the army.

* **Australian States Constitution.** (7 Edward VII. c. 7.)

Removes a number of restrictions upon the power of the Governors of Australian States to assent to Bills, and in its provisions meets the views of all the Colonies concerned.

* **British North America.** (7 Edward VII. c. 11.)

Readjusts, at the request of the Dominion and Provincial Governments of Canada, the amount of subsidies payable by the Dominion to the various Provinces.

* **Butter and Margarine.** (7 Edward VII. c. 21.)

Prevents the manufacture and importation of adulterated butter and butter substitutes, fixes the limit of moisture for butter, margarine, and what has hitherto been sold as 'milk-blended butter,' and makes various other provisions for the protection of the purchaser.

* **Cabs and Stage Carriages (London).** (7 Edward VII. c. 55.)

Empowers the Home Secretary to fix fares for taximeter cabs in London and makes certain provisions in regard to stage carriages. Abolishes the 'privilege' system under which the London railway companies could refuse to admit to their stations cabs which were not under contract with them.

Injured Animals Act (1894) Amendment. (7 Edward VII. c. 5.)

The original Act of 1894 authorises the police to slaughter any horse, mule, or ass found in such a condition that it cannot be removed without cruelty. This Act extends the principal Act so as include cattle, &c.

*** Irish Land.** (7 Edward VII. c. 38.)

Enables the Irish Land Commission to let or sell the mining rights reserved to them in connection with land sold under the Purchase Acts.

Irish Tobacco. (7 Edward VII. c. 3.)

Repeals (from a date to be fixed by Order in Council as soon as Parliament has made provision for an Excise duty) an old prohibition against the cultivation of tobacco in Ireland.

*** Isle of Man Customs.** (7 Edward VII. c. 26.)

Continues for the Isle of Man the existing duties on tea, tobacco, spirits, ale, and beer.

*** Judicature (Ireland).** (7 Edward VII. c. 44.)

Provides for the abolition of two judgeships in the Irish King's Bench Division, when vacancies occur, and reduces the salary of the Lord Chancellor of Ireland from £8000 to £6000, the savings to be devoted to the purposes of the financial scheme of the Labourers Act, 1906.

† Lights on Vehicles. (7 Edward VII. c. 45.)

Deals with the danger which is caused by the inadequacy and lack of uniformity in the present local regulations as to the carrying of lights by vehicles at night.

† Limited Partnerships. (7 Edward VII. c. 24.)

Permits the formation and provides for the registration of limited liability partnerships.

† Marriage with a Deceased Wife's Sister. (7 Edward VII. c. 47.)

Legalises marriages with a deceased wife's sister, whether contracted before or after the passing of the Act.

Married Women's Property. (7 Edward VII. c. 18.)

Amends the Act of 1882, as interpreted by the Courts, in respect of the disposition of trust estates and settlements of a married woman's separate property.

*** Matrimonial Causes Acts Amendment.** (7 Edward VII. c. 12.)

Removes defects in the procedure under the Divorce Acts requiring and at last receiving a remedy.

*** Merchant Shipping.** (7 Edward VII. c. 52.)

Dockowners and harbour authorities have often complained that the deduction allowed to be made for space occupied by propelling power in ascertaining the net tonnage of a ship has injuriously affected their receipts, their dues being levied on the net tonnage of the vessels using the docks. This Act places a limit on the amount of the deduction which may be made in respect of propelling power.

*** Employment of Women.** (7 Edward VII. c. 10.)

Repeals two obsolete exemptions from the Factory Acts (relating to flax scutch mills and the surface works of mines), in order to bring the English law into conformity with the Berne International Convention (signed by Great Britain and thirteen other States in 1906), forbidding the employment of women in industrial occupations during the night.

*** Evicted Tenants (Ireland).** (7 Edward VII. c. 56.)

Enables the Irish Estates Commissioners to acquire land compulsorily for the purpose of reinstating evicted tenants, the owner to receive compensation to be fixed by the Estates Commissioners in the first instance, subject to an appeal upon value. If the new tenant who has succeeded an evicted tenant is a *bonâ-fide* farmer, and is unwilling to leave, his farm cannot be acquired; but he can be offered another farm or monetary compensation. [*N.B.—This Act was much mutilated by the Lords.*]

*** Evidence (Colonial Statutes).** (7 Edward VII. c. 16.)

Removes a Colonial grievance by providing that Colonial Statutes are to be accepted in British Courts without the formality of being proved as if they were foreign laws.

*** Expiring Laws Continuance.** (7 Edward VII. c. 34.)

Continues, for a further period of one year, various Acts which were passed for limited periods only.

*** Factory and Workshop.** (7 Edward VII. c. 39.)

Applies, with some slight modification, the provisions of the Factory Acts (as regards hours of labour, inspection, ventilation, &c.) to laundries and to all industries carried on for profit in charitable or reformatory institutions (convent laundries, &c.).

*** Finance.** (7 Edward VII. c. 13.)

Differentiates between earned and unearned income for the purposes of the income-tax, reducing the tax on earned income (where the total income does not exceed £2000) to 9*d.*; imposes on employers the obligation to make a return of the payments made to their employes, and amends the law of income-tax in various other particulars; increases the death duties upon estates above £150,000; restores to the control of Parliament the licence duties and other sources of revenue diverted since 1888 to the purpose of grants in aid of local taxation, which will in future be charged upon the Consolidated Fund; removes many anomalies connected with the stamp duties; and strengthens the Sinking Fund by a special additional contribution of £1,500,000 towards the redemption of debt.

*** Imported Watchcases.** (7 Edward VII. c. 8.)

The effect of this measure, taken in conjunction with a recent decision of the Courts, is to subject foreign watchcases for the first time to the same regulations in respect of assay as British cases, while exempting the existing stocks of imported cases in order to avoid undue hardship to traders. Imported watchcases had formerly been held not to be 'plate' within the meaning of the Customs Act of 1842 and the Revenue Act of 1883, and they consequently had an advantage over British cases in that they could be sold without being assayed and hall-marked.

Injured Animals Act (1894) Amendment. (7 Edward VII. c. 5.)

The original Act of 1894 authorises the police to slaughter any horse, mule, or ass found in such a condition that it cannot be removed without cruelty. This Act extends the principal Act so as include cattle, &c.

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† **Notification of Births.** (7 Edward VII. c. 40.)

A permissive Act which may be adopted by local authorities with the consent of the Local Government Board. Requires a birth to be notified to the medical officer of health for the district within thirty-six hours.

* **Patents and Designs.** (7 Edward VII. c. 28.)

A comprehensive Act dealing with the grant and revocation of patents and amending the law relating to patents and designs in many important particulars. An endeavour is made in it to check the system under which foreign manufacturers have hitherto been enabled to take out patents in this country, without any intention of working them here, merely in order to prevent British manufacturers from producing articles which might compete with them either in their own or in other markets. To this end the Act provides what it is hoped will prove a simple and effective procedure by which British patents may be revoked when they are worked exclusively or mainly abroad, unless satisfactory reasons can be given why they are not worked in the United Kingdom.

* **Patents and Designs (Consolidation).** (7 Edward VII. c. 29.)

Consolidates the law (as enacted in six statutes) relating to applications for patents and the registration of designs.

Petty Sessions Clerks (Ireland). (7 Edward VII. c. 22.)

Improves the status of certain assistant clerks to petty sessions in Ireland.

* **Prisons (Ireland).** (7 Edward VII. c. 19.)

This Act enables prisoners in Irish prisons to earn remission of their sentences by good conduct. This has for some time been law in England.

* **Probation of Offenders.** (7 Edward VII. c. 17.)

Largely extends the principle of the First Offenders Act by enabling the Court, whether in the case of a first offence or not, to release a child offender or any other person on probation, without fine or imprisonment. Enables justices to appoint probation officers to supervise and assist released persons during their period of probation.

† **Public Health.** (7 Edward VII. c. 53.)

Embodies clauses as to streets and buildings, sanitary provisions, infectious diseases, common lodging houses, recreation grounds, police, fire brigades, &c., and enables the Local Government Board or the Home Office, as the case may be, to declare any of such clauses in force in urban and rural districts.

* **Public Health (Regulations as to Food).** (7 Edward VII. c. 32.)

Enables the Local Government Board to make regulations authorising measures to be taken for the prevention of danger to public health arising from the importation, storage, and distribution of articles of food intended for sale for human consumption.

* **Public Health (Scotland) Amendment.** (7 Edward VII. c. 30.)

Relaxes certain of the sections of the Public Health (Scotland) Act, 1897, relating to the prevention of infectious diseases, so as to encourage local authorities to deal with phthisis as an infectious disease under the Public Health Act.

* **Public Works Loans.** (7 Edward VII. c. 36.)

Authorises the Public Works Loan Commissioners to borrow money on National credit, in order to lend to Local Authorities in the United Kingdom. Likewise provides for a loan being made by the Commissioners to Southern Nigeria for the purpose of railway construction in Southern and Northern Nigeria, with a view to opening up the cotton-growing areas of those Protectorates; and also for a loan to Jamaica towards repairing the damage resulting from the recent earthquake.

* **Qualification of Women (County and Borough Councils).**

(7 Edward VII. c. 33.)

Provides that a woman shall no longer be disqualified by sex or marriage from being elected and acting as a County or Borough Councillor or Alderman. A woman may also be elected Chairman of a County Council or Mayor of a Borough, but cannot act as a Magistrate.

* **Qualification of Women (County and Town Councils) (Scotland).**

(7 Edward VII. c. 48.)

A measure for Scotland similar to the last-named.

* **Released Persons (Poor Law Relief).** (7 Edward VII. c. 14.)

Relieves ratepayers of a union in which a prison, inebriate reformatory, or reformatory or industrial school is situated, from their present liability to maintain destitute or infirm persons discharged from such institutions in cases where they should more properly be maintained by some other union.

* **Salmon and Freshwater Fisheries.** (7 Edward VII. c. 15.)

Enables the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries to make provisional orders for regulating salmon and freshwater fisheries with a view to their improvement and development.

* **Sea Fisheries (Scotland) (Application of Penalties).**

(7 Edward VII. c. 42.)

Diverts from the Exchequer to the Scottish Fishery Board penalties recovered in respect of illegal sea-fishing in Scotland.

* **Sheriff Courts (Scotland).** (7 Edward VII. c. 51.)

Amends and modifies the procedure in civil cases heard in the Sheriff Courts of Scotland.

* **Small Holdings and Allotments.** (7 Edward VII. c. 54.)

The main object of this Act is to provide further facilities for the provision of Small Holdings and Allotments to be let to tenants. The Act is designed to secure this end by a careful combination of State initiative and local management, and provisions are included to put pressure on County Councils which are unwilling to take action on their own account. The Board of Agriculture will appoint Small Holdings Commissioners, whose duty it will be to ascertain the demand for Small Holdings. They will report to the Board, who may require the County Council to prepare a scheme for providing the Small Holdings needed. If the County Council unreasonably refuse to act, the Board may order the Commissioners to prepare a scheme and to carry it out, the cost being charged against the County Council. If the Commissioners, acting in default of the County Council, incur a loss, the Board may pay the whole or part of the loss, and if a County Council incurs a loss in carrying out a scheme, the Board

have undertaken to pay half the loss. A special Small Holdings Account is set up to which the Treasury will pay £100,000 for the first year, and out of this the Board are empowered to establish Small Holdings as object-lessons, and to pay the whole or part of the expenses of the acquisition of land (other than the purchase price or rent) by County Councils. The just rights of the landlord are carefully safeguarded, provision is made for compensation to any labourers who may be adversely affected by the establishment of Small Holdings, and tenant farmers are protected by the provision for reduction of the rent where part of a holding is taken, and by the limitations in Clause 30, whereby a Council may not take any undue amount from any one tenant, and must take into consideration the size and character of the buildings, so that they are not left without sufficient land attached to them.

* **Telegraph (Money).** (7 Edward VII. c. 6.)

Authorises the borrowing of £6,000,000 for the more rapid development of the telephone service.

* **Territorial and Reserve Forces.** (7 Edward VII. c. 9.)

Provides for the reorganization of the military forces (other than the regulars), for the establishment of county associations, and for the government and discipline of the new territorial force, and makes certain alterations with regard to the constitution and terms of service of the reserve forces.

* **Transvaal Loan (Guarantee).** (7 Edward VII. c. 37.)

Affords the guarantee of the Imperial Government to a loan of £5,000,000, which will be raised gradually as it is required by the Transvaal Government. This loan is part of the policy of reconstruction and reconciliation which is being pursued in South Africa, and by which alone the ravages and devastation of the South African war can be repaired.

* **Vaccination.** (7 Edward VII. c. 31.)

Substitutes a statutory declaration as to conscientious objection to vaccination for the certificate of justices hitherto required.

* **Vaccination (Scotland).** (7 Edward VII. c. 49.)

Extends to Scotland the benefit of the Conscientious Objectors Act, including the amending Act passed this Session.

* **Whale Fisheries (Scotland).** (7 Edward VII. c. 41.)

Regulates the whale killing and curing industry recently established in the Shetland Isles and the Hebrides, and seeks to prevent any damage therefrom to the herring fishery industry.

(1) The *largest* constituency is the Romford division of the County of Essex, with 47,641 electors (an increase of 2062 in one year); the *smallest*, the borough of Kilkenny, with 1584.

(2) The *largest borough* constituency is Newcastle-upon-Tyne (two members), with 37,417 electors.

(3) The *largest single-member borough* constituency is Wandsworth, with 34,461 electors; the next largest, Cardiff, with 27,896; the *smallest*, Kilkenny, with 1584 electors.

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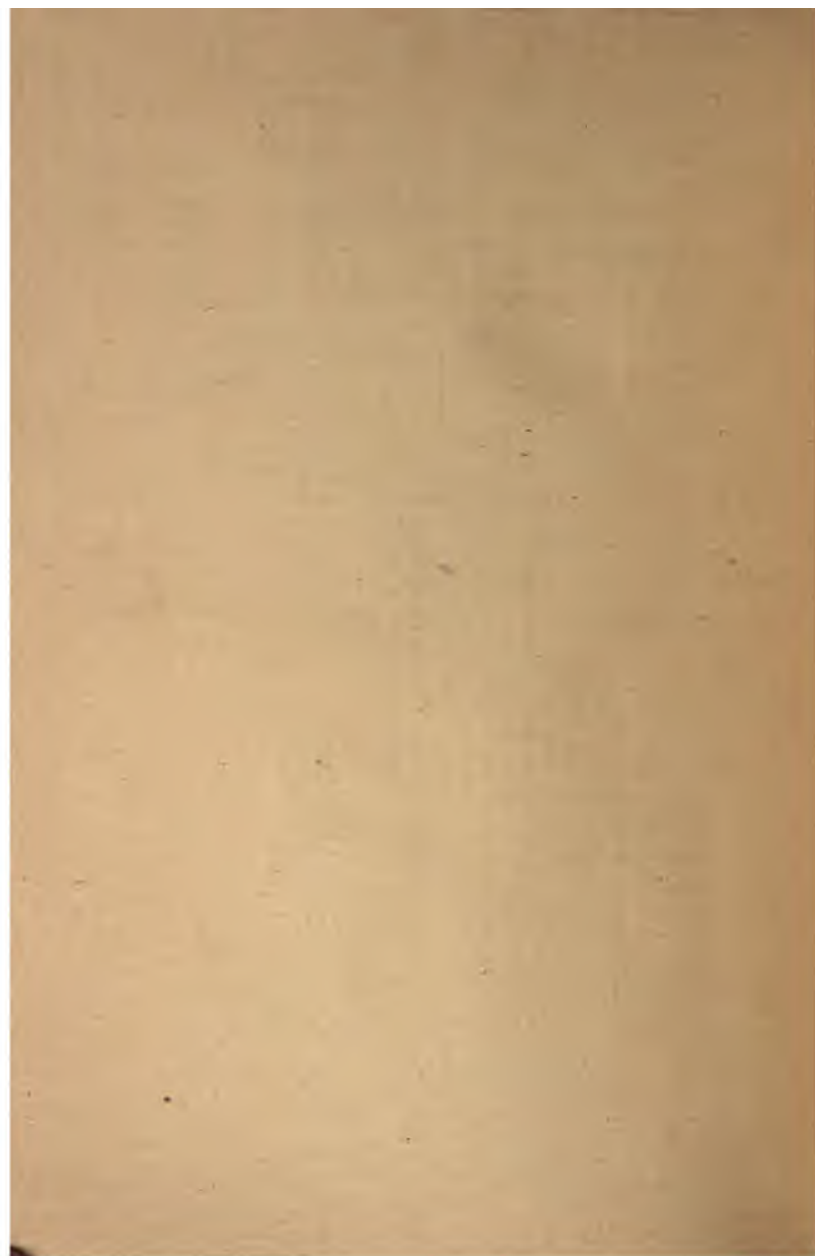
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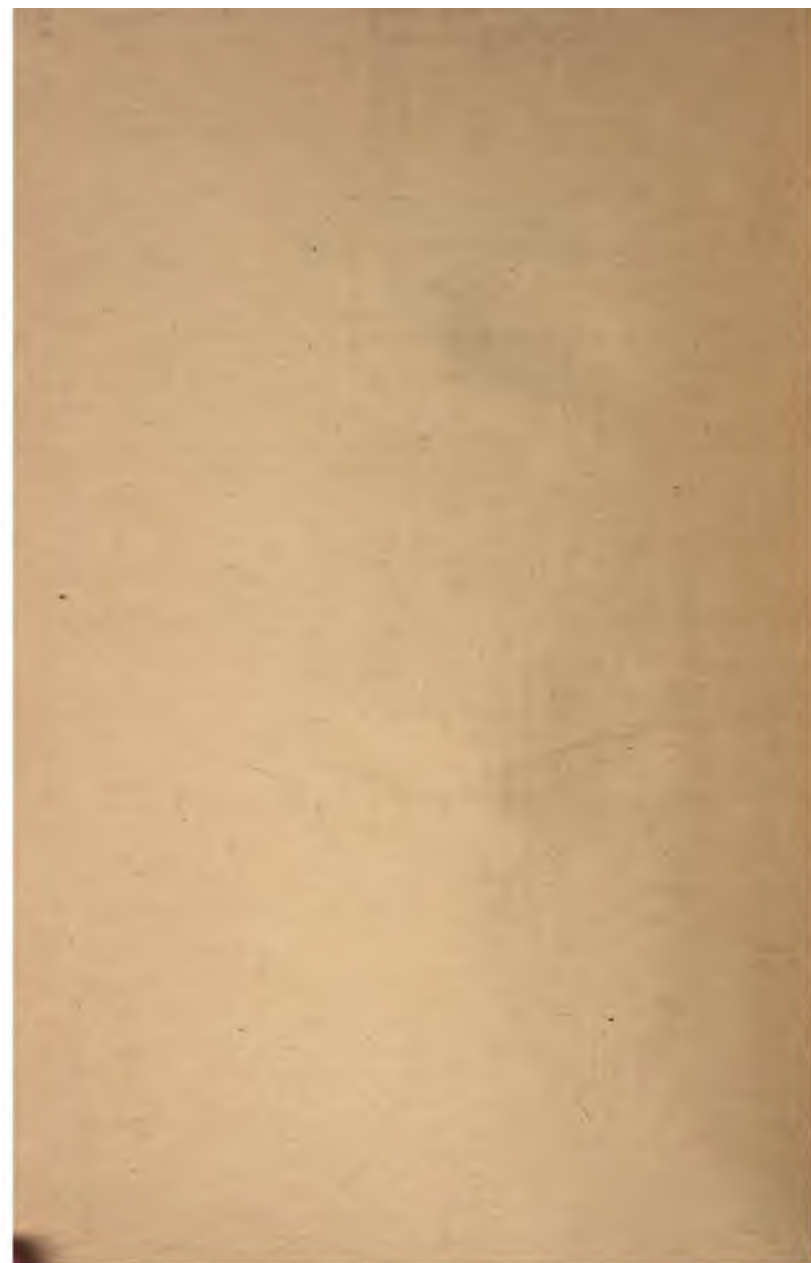
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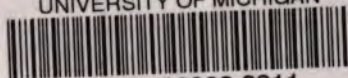


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
