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NC STATE STUDENT RIGHT-TO-KNOW DISCLOSURE

Data from The University of North Carolina Administration show that of the first-time bachelor degree-seeking freshman students who entered NC State in Fall 1993. 64.6% have graduated with a baccalaureate degree from NC State, and an additional 4.5% have transferred and received a baccalaureate degree from another UNC

system institution as of Fall 1999. In addition 4.3% of the 1993 freshman cohort were still enrolled at NC State and 2.0% were still enrolled at another UNC system institution as of Fall 1999. This information is provided pursuant to requirements of the Student Right-to-Know and Campus Security Act of 1990.

North Carolina State University

North Carolina State University is the largest university in the University of North Carolina system and is its leader in science, engineering and technology. As a Land-Grant state university, it shares the distinctive characteristics of these institutions nationally-broad academic offerings, extensive public service, national and international activities, and large-scale extension and research programs.

The University is organized into ten colleges, and, the Graduate School. The colleges are: Agriculture and Life Sciences; Design; Education and Psychology; Engineering; Natural Resources; Humanities and Social Sciences; Management; Physical and Mathematical Sciences; Textiles; and Veterinary Medicine. In addition, numerous other divisions, institutes and centers provide for a wide array of special academic, research, and extension programs.

NC State's rich and varied academic programs offer students opportunities to earn baccalaureate degrees in 91 fields, master's degrees in 95 fields and doctoral degrees in 57 fields including veterinary medicine.

The University has 6,000 employees, including 1,500

full-time faculty.

Research and sponsored programs cover a broad spectrum of scientific, technological and scholarly endeavors supported by an annual budget of approximately \$413 million.

Extension work on a statewide basis in each of the 100 counties and the Cherokee Indian Reservation carries the

University's activities throughout the state.

NC State's campus, located just west of downtown Raleigh, totals approximately 1,800 acres between the central campus, the College of Veterinary Medicine campus, and the Centennial Campus which the University is developing. In addition, NC State owns more than 90,000 acres of land statewide, including one research and endowment forest of 79,000 acres. Near the campus are about 2,700 university-owned acres which house research farms; biology and ecology sites; teaching and research forests; genetics, horticulture and floriculture nurseries; and multipurpose sites, such as Carter-Finley Stadium and the Entertainment and Sports Arena.

The University's athletics teams are well-known nationally. The Wolfpack men's basketball team won NCAA Championships in 1974 and 1983. The football team has been the Atlantic Coast Conference champion five times and ACC co-champion twice. Numerous NC State athletes have won NCAA, national and international honors.

NC State (along with Duke University and the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill) is one of three universities forming the points of a 30-mile geographic triangle encompassing Research Triangle Park where numerous major corporations have located research divisions.

NC State's total enrollment is 27,474, including 19,376 undergraduates, 5,252 graduate students, and 2,846 lifelong education students. The student population consists of approximately 58 percent men and 42 percent women and includes 9.8 percent African-Americans. Students come to NC State from all 50 states in the union and from at least 87 foreign countries. There currently are 1,147 international students at NC State.

NC State is committed to equality of educational opportunity and does not discriminate against applicants. students or employees based on race, color, national origin, religion, sex, age, disability or veteran status. Moreover, NC State is open to people of all races and actively seeks to promote racial integration by recruiting more African-American faculty and recruiting and enrolling a larger number of African-American students.

NC State is a member of the National Association of State Universities and Land-Grant Colleges, the American Council on Education, and the American Council of Learned Societies. The University hosts chapters of Phi Kappa Phi and Phi Beta Kappa honor societies.

THE SUMMER SESSIONS

The Summer Sessions at North Carolina State University offer an extensive educational program planned to meet the varied needs and interests of more than 14,000 students. Sixty departments offer instruction in more than 900 courses, approximately 90% of which are at the undergraduate level.

Each of the University's ten colleges, with a combined faculty of more than 500, participates in the Summer Sessions. The schedule includes two "regular" five-week sessions and a ten-week session, as well as several dozen evening courses scheduled for the convenience of working adults.

Summer courses and special programs are designed for the new student, the undergraduate wanting to advance his or her academic standing at State, the graduate desiring to continue study and research during the summer months and for visiting students pursuing degrees at other institutions. Teachers who need to earn credit toward renewal of teaching certificates or advanced degrees in education and persons in professional fields who wish to keep abreast of new developments and trends also take advantage of State's summer programs.

ADMISSIONS

Students are admitted to the summer sessions in one of seven categories: 1) new freshmen, 2) new undergraduate transfer students, 3) new graduate students, 4) Lifelong Education students/summer visitors, 5) continuing North Carolina State University students, 6) former North Carolina State University students, and 7) suspended North Carolina State University students.

NEW FRESHMEN

Application forms for new freshmen should be obtained from the Director of Admissions, 112 Peele Hall, NC State University, Box 7103, Raleigh, North Carolina 27695-7103. The Summer Sessions application form in this Bulletin should not be completed. Applications should be submitted in the fall of the senior year in high school. The application deadline is February 1. A freshman applicant should be a graduate of an accredited secondary school. The following high school preparation is required: English, 4 units; history or social studies, 2 units including U.S. history; mathematics, 2 units in algebra, 1 unit in geometry, or a third math for which algebra II is a prerequisite, additional advanced math is strongly recommended; science, 3 units, preferably biology, chemistry, or physics (one unit must be a laboratory science); foreign language, 2 units.

Admissions decisions for freshmen are based on many factors including traditional academic factors such as the level and rigor of the high school curriculum, academic performance as evidenced by course grades, overall grade point average, class rank, and SAT or ACT scores. Other factors, such as geographic diversity, area of academic interest, leadership, community service, and extra-curricular activities, are also part of the decision making process.

NEW TRANSFER STUDENTS

Students seeking transfer admission into a degree program should obtain an application from the Office of Undergraduate Admissions and submit it before April 1 for Fall admission or November 1 for Spring admission. These students should not complete the Summer Sessions application in this *Bulletin*.

Students applying for transfer admission into a degree program must present a minimum of 30 semester hours of "C" or better work on courses applicable to the degree program to which they are applying. Although the minimum grade point average required for consideration is a 2.0 on a 4.0 scale, most programs require a higher GPA. College credits must have been earned at an accredited institution and should include a college level English and a college level math course applicable to the requested curriculum.

Students must be eligible to return to all institutions previously attended. Individual transcripts must be sent directly from the Registrar's office at each institution. The high school record must be submitted to show the appropriate course work in high school.

For students entering a degree program in the Fall, 1994 semester or later, foreign language competency will be required for graduation. Students who are not able to show competency through high school or college transcripts will be required to take foreign language before graduation.

NEW GRADUATE STUDENTS

All students working towards advanced degrees must be enrolled in the Graduate School. Prospective applicants may apply to the Graduate School online at http://www.acs.ncsu.edu/scripts/gsadmiss/gsaplfrm.pl. Also, application forms may be downloaded from the web at http://www2.acs.ncsu.edu/grad/admissn/app/gradadm.htm, or may be requested from the Graduate School by e-mail to graduate_admissions@ncsu.edu, or by mail to The Graduate School, Box 7102, NC State University, Raleigh, NC 27695-7102.

STUDENTS ADMITTED TO THE FALL SEMESTER

Any student accepted for regular admission for the Fall semester wishing to attend either summer session should notify the Admissions Office to change the date of entrance. He or she should not complete a Summer Sessions application.

LIFELONG EDUCATION STUDENTS/ SUMMER VISITORS

Lifelong Education students must complete the Summer Sessions Registration Application and NC Residency Form in the back section of this Bulletin. A Lifelong Education student is one who has never been formally admitted as a degree candidate at North Carolina State University. All students visiting from other schools will be classified as Lifelong Education students.

For registration information refer to the Lifelong Education section beginning on page 109 of this Bulletin.

Limitations-Persons found eligible to study as Lifelong Education students are not to assume that they have received formal admission to the University as either undergraduate or graduate degree candidates. To become a degree candidate, formal application must be made through the Undergraduate Admissions Office or the Graduate School. Lifelong Education students may not register for more than two courses plus one physical education course per summer session.

Course Availability Persons found eligible may register for any course offered by the University, provided they satisfy the required course prerequisites and classroom space is available.

Academic Standards The academic standards applicable to undergraduate students at the University also apply to Lifelong Education students.

CONTINUING NC STATE DEGREE STUDENTS

Any regular NC State degree candidate may attend the Summer Sessions. The Summer Sessions application in this Bulletin must not be completed, but registration procedures as listed below must be followed:

READMISSION OF FORMER NC STATE DEGREE STUDENTS

Former NC State degree students who wish to attend the Summer Sessions must apply for readmission through Registration and Records at least 30 days prior to the intended date of return. The readmission application may be obtained by writing to the Department of Registration and Records. NC State. Box 7313. Raleigh, NC 27695-7313. The Summer Sessions application in this Bulletin must not be completed, but registration procedures as listed on page 9 must be followed.

SUSPENDED NC STATE DEGREE STUDENTS

NC State degree students suspended at the end of the Spring semester, 2001, may attend one or both sessions of the Summer Sessions to become eligible to continue in the Fall. The Summer Sessions application in this Bulletin must not be completed, but registration procedures as listed on page 9 must be followed. Students suspended prior to the Spring semester, 2001, may attend one or both sessions of the Summer Sessions but should follow readmission procedures. The readmission application may be obtained by writing the Department of Registration and Records. NC State University. Box 7313. Raleigh, NC 27695-7313.

REGISTRATION INSTRUCTIONS

Welcome to TRACS-NC State University's Telephonic and Computerized Scheduling System. TRACS was implemented to simplify the registration process by offering convenient ways to register for your courses.

TRACS will allow you to register for courses from your home, at work, or any place in the world using either a touch-tone telephone or the World Wide Web.

Registration consists of three steps:

- Determining course requirements and obtaining a PIN (Personal ID Number)
- 21 Planning your schedule and registering for courses using TRACS either by the Telephone or the Web TRACS LINK.
- 3) Paying tuition, fees and all other debts to the University and clearing all "Holds" by the established deadlines

STUDENT ACCESS TO TRACS ...

Continuing Degree Students

If you are a currently enrolled degree student, either graduate or undergraduate, you must register using TRACS. Your advisor will give you your PIN at your advising conference

New Graduate and Undergraduate Degree Students

If you are a new graduate or undergraduate (freshman and transfer) degree student cleared for admission for the 2001 Summer Sessions, you will complete registration using TRACS by the deadline. It is not necessary for you to come to campus as the registration process can be completed either by the telephone or the Web TRACS LINK

If you are a new undergraduate student, you must obtain a PIN from the coordinator of advising in your respective college or school (see below). If you are a new graduate student, you must contact the graduate administrator in your respective department to obtain a PIN. You should then register using TRACS. A list of graduate administrators will be provided by the Graduate School.

<u>Lifelong Education (Non-degree) Students/</u> <u>Summer Visitors</u>

If you are a student in this category (not formally admitted to either a graduate or an undergraduate degree program), you must complete your registration with the Office of Adult Credit Programs & Summer Sessions. See the section pertaining to the Office of Adult Credit Programs & Summer Sessions in the back of this Bulletin.

Students with Disabilities

Readmission of Former Degree Students

If you are a degree student (graduate or undergraduate) previously enrolled but did not attend the 2001 Spring semester, you MUST COMPLETE a readmission application, pay a \$25.00 nonrefundable fee, and have received an official notice of readmissions BEFORE attempting to register. Readmission applications are available from the Department of Registration and Records, 1000 Harris Hall, Box 7313, Raleigh, NC 27695-7313, telephone (919) 515-2572. Once you have received your notice of readmission, you should register using TRACS. You must obtain a PIN from the coordinator of advising in your respective college.

NOTE: Readmission applications should be submitted as soon as possible but no later than 30 days prior to the date of desired enrollment.

REGISTRATION PROCESS FOR STUDENTS ...

1. Determine Course Requirements and Obtain PIN

Degree Students

Advising begins March 19, 2001 and ends April 6, 2001. Advisers will help you plan your course schedule to meet graduation requirements. Although it is your responsibility for planning your program and meeting such requirements, advisers can offer valuable advice to help you achieve your goals. At your advising conference your adviser will also give you your Personal ID Number (PIN) that is needed to complete

registration. Your four-digit PIN should be kept confidential to ensure the security of your registration.

Summer Visitors

Lifelong Education/ (Non-degree students)-If you are a currently enrolled Lifelong Education student, you have already been mailed your PIN. New or reentering Lifelong Education students will be issued their PIN when they submit their Registration Application to the Office of Adult Credit Programs & Summer Sessions.

2. Plan Your Schedule

Using the Timetable Planner in this booklet, work out a class schedule that has no time conflicts. The section at the bottom of the Timetable Planner allows you to list your courses and all pertinent information for easy reference. List the courses you want to take in priority order. You may find it desirable to list courses with the fewest sections first. You also need to prepare alternative courses just in case some classes are full.

Complete the Telephonic Registration Worksheet and call TRACS using the instructions provided. If for any reason you are not eligible to register. you will be given an explanation.

3. Make Your Payment

You are responsible for full payment of tuition, fees and all other debts owed to the University and for clearing all "Holds" by the following deadlines:

Summer I and Ten-Week Session May 10, 2001 Summer II June 21, 2001

Failure to pay tuition, fees and all other debts owed to the University and to clear all "Holds" will result in your schedule being cancelled. NOTE: It is your responsibility to pay even if you do not receive a bill. A copy of your schedule will be mailed to you at your University Correspondence address approximately one week prior to the first day of classes.

TRACS WINDOW ACCESS DATES

Entrance to TRACS either by the Telephone or the Web TRACS LINK is controlled by specific window access dates. Window access is split into four or five days for each undergraduate classification based upon total hours passed at the time of registration (except for Freshmen - see below). For example, seniors with 121+ hours passed have a beginning window access of March 22. Seniors with 111-120 hours have a window access of March 23. Each classification has specific window accesses as outlined below.

You cannot register before your window access is scheduled. Access will be denied if you try to register earlier than the date indicated. Classification is based on your hours passed when your window opens-not at the end of the current semester.

Total hours passed and window opening dates are printed on students' PIN cards. Total hours passed is also available on the WEB by selecting the "View Academic Totals" page from TRACS LINK, TRACS LINK is located at htts://www.acs.ncsu.edu/scripts/RegRec/ logn trc.pl.

TRACS PERIODS

Summer I and Ten-Week Session

Registration: March 21 (7:30 a.m.)-May 8, 2001 (5:00 p.m.)

If possible, you should make every effort to register during this period. If you register during this time your chances of enrolling in specific times and sections are much better than they will be later. You will be sent a tuition bill for your tuition, fees and other outstanding debts. If you pay your tuition, fees and all other debts owed to the University and clear all "Holds" by May 10, 2001 at 5:00 p.m., you will be mailed a confirming copy of the schedule you have created for yourself using TRACS. Failure to pay your tuition, fees and all other debts owed to the University and clear all "Holds" by May 10, 2001 at 5:00 p.m. will result in your schedule being cancelled.

Note: The TRACS system will be closed from 5:00 p.m. on May 8, 2001 until 7:30 a.m. on May 14, 2001.

Late Registration: May 14 (7:30a.m.) - May 25, 2001 (5:00 p.m.)

TRACS will be open for Late Registration during this period. Students will not be required to pay tuition and fees in order to access TRACS. Only students with past due debts or departmental holds must have their accounts cleared by the Cashier's Office to access TRACS. Tuition, fees and the \$25.00 NON-REFUNDABLE late registration fee, will be systematically added to the student's account when they register. Students late registering will be billed during the next Cashier's Office billing cycle.

PLEASE NOTE: It is your responsibility to pay tuition and fees and all other debts owed to the University and clear all "Holds" even if you do not receive a tuition statement.

Summer II

Registration: March 21 (7:30 a.m.) - June 15, 2001 (5:00 p.m.)

If possible, you should make every effort to register during this period. If you register during this time your chances of enrolling in specific times and sections are much better than they will be later. You will be sent a tuition bill for your tuition, fees and other debts. If you pay your tuition, fees and all other debts owed to the University and clear all "Holds" by June 21, 2001 at 5:00 p.m., you will be mailed a confirming copy of the schedule you have created for yourself using TRACS. Failure to pay your tuition, fees and all other debts owed to the University and clear all "Holds" by June 21, 2001 at 5:00 p.m. will result in your schedule being cancelled.

Note: The TRACS system will be closed from 5:00 p.m. on June 15, 2001 until 7:30 a.m. on June 21, 2001.


Late Registration: June 21 (7:30 a.m.)-July 9, 2001 (5:00 p.m.)

TRACS will be open for Late Registration during this period. Students will not be required to pay tuition and fees in order to access TRACS. Only students with past due debts or departmental holds must have their accounts cleared by the Cashier's Office to access TRACS. Tuition, fees and the \$25.00 NON-REFUNDABLE late registration fee, will be systematically added to the student's account when they register. Students late registering will be billed during the next Cashier's Office billing cycle.

PLEASE NOTE: It is your responsibility to pay tuition and fees and all other debts owed to the University and clear all "Holds" even if you do not receive a tuition statement.

TRACS FACTS ...

TELEPHONE TIPS

- If the system does not answer the telephone, it is not working or if the telephone rings busy, all lines are in use. Please call back later.
- The system may "time you out" if you pause more than 30 seconds between entries or if your total transaction time exceeds ten minutes.
- A voice response will guide you after each entry.
 Enter an entire sequence of keys when told to do so.
- The system will let you key ahead if you do not want to listen to entire voice response message. To do this you just begin the sequence of keys for your next transaction.
- You will know you have completed a successful transaction when TRACS informs you that you have added or dropped the requested class. If TRACS disconnects you, all successful transactions are safe and need not be entered again. If a course you have registered for is cancelled because of lack of demand, you will be notified by mail so that you will be able to select an alternative course.

IMPORTANT FUNCTIONS

- If a course you have selected is full, you will be asked to enter an alternative selection or your next entry. Or, you may request to be put on a waiting list if one is available for that course.
- WAIT LIST-If you have placed yourself on a wait list, that day and time has been reserved in your schedule. You cannot add another section of that course or another course that meets at the same day and time. (Wait listed hours will be included in tuition and fee charges). Remember, the wait list ends with the Registration Period. There are no wait lists during Late Registration.

■ SEARCH - If the section you have requested is closed you will be asked to press 1 to search for an open section at the same time day/time slot; press 2 to search for any open section or press 3 if you don't want to search for an open section. The Open section Inquiry function simply checks to see if a requested section is open or closed. It does not check to see if the section has any scheduling restrictions.

SCHEDULING RESTRICTIONS - There is a column headed "Seats" in the course listing section of this publication with two subheadings entitled "MAX" and "RESTR". The "MAX" indicates the maximum number of seats available for that par-ticular section. The "RESTR" indicates the number of seats that are restricted or reserved for a particular purpose. A note describing the restriction appears as a note just above each course listing in this publication. Remember that scheduling restrictions may apply to all or part of the seats in a particular section. Be sure to check the number of unrestricted seats before you assume a section is completely restricted.

 PERMISSION TO ADD - For registration of courses that require instructor or departmental permission, the department teaching the course will either add you to the course on-line or issue you a Schedule Revision Form to be taken to the Department of Registration and Records, 1000 Harris Hall.

■ VARIABLE CREDIT - When the course is for variable credit you will be asked to enter 4 digits to represent the number of credit hours you will receive for the course with the last 2 digits representing values to the right of a decimal point. For example, 3.5 hours would be entered 0350.

Completing the Telephonic Registration Worksheet

Call TRACS only after you have a completed Registration Worksheet in front of you.

- 1. Write in your Student ID Number and your Personal ID Number (PIN) in the spaces provided.
- 2. Transfer the course call number for each course you wish to take to the course call number section on the Telephonic Registration Worksheet. (The Call Number is a six-digit number found in the course listing section of this Bulletin.)
- 3. Complete the Transaction Code section by using the list of various TRANSACTION CODES from the column to the right of the worksheet. Familiarize yourself with these codes and their individual operations. Be sure to write the codes in the space provided on your Registration Worksheet to avoid any confusion when registering.



DROP/ADD INFORMATION

Once you have initially registered, you may make schedule changes (drop/add) anytime TRACS is operational. You are encouraged to make your schedule changes as soon as you are aware that they need to be made. To insure easy access to TRACS, please make changes as early as possible.

No adds will be allowed after these dates.

STUDENT IDENTIFICATION CARDS

North Carolina State University has a permanent photo ID/registration Card called the AllCampus Card. All-Campus Cards are used to gain access to various campus activities including: D. H. Hill Library, Student Health Service, physical education activities, Student Accounts, athletic events and University Dining's meal plan program. The AllCampus Card is also the card used by debit account depositors to access their funds at University Dining locations, the NCSU Bookstore, and the University Laundry.

No fares are required on Wolfline buses of students showing a valid AllCampus Card.

COMPUTING AT NC STATE - YOUR UNITY ACCOUNT - REGISTERING FOR CLASSES VIA THE WEB

Unity is NC State University's distributed computing environment. All students have access to this computing network and many information sources on campus and around the world. Through this network, students can obtain access to the Internet, various software applications, and e-mail. In addition to being an invaluable research tool, the Internet provides students vast information about NC State University (including information on admission, colleges and curricula, financial aid, libraries, registration and records, student accounts, etc.) via the University's web site located at http://www.ncsu.edu. Many instructors also use the Unity system as an integral part of their courses. Continuing students have immediate access to their Unity account. For new and re-entering students a Unity

account is automatically generated within a couple of days after officially being admitted or re-admitted. Login IDs and additional details regarding use of the system may be obtained from Computing Services consultants. Call 515-HELP (4357), or stop by Room 208, Hillsborough Building. Information regarding the Unity system is also available at http://www2.ncsu.edu/ncsu/cc/pub/unity.html. After an account has been established, students can register for their courses on the web by selecting TRACS LINK from the Registration and Records home page located at http://www2.ncsu.edu/ncsu/reg_records/, in addition to registering via touch-tone telephone. On-campus and off-campus access to the system is available.

NC STATE SUMMER PARKING INFORMATION

North Carolina State University has available parking during summer school. All students, faculty and staff must display a valid parking permit between the hours of 7:30 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday. Permits and permit information can be obtained at the Transportation Office located in the Administrative Services Center on Sullivan Drive. For more information, visit our website at www2.acs.ncsu.edu/trans/.

For those students who want to park their personal vehicle on campus during the summer:

 Please bring your AllCampus Card or valid ID when purchasing a parking permit.

- Permits are sold on availability in each zone. The cost of the permit is prorated, based on the date of purchase.
- Summer school permits are valid for both sessions and there are no refunds given for summer school permits once purchased.

 4. Students whose classes begin after 5:00 p.m. can park on campus without a parking permit in any unreserved space/lot between 5:00 p.m. and 7:30 a.m. Monday through Friday, weekends and official University holidays. You may not park in spaces marked "24 hour reserved", accessibility spaces, fire lanes, no parking areas, grass or the sidewalks at any time.

Regularly scheduled Wolfline bus service is available through all summer sessions. The Wolfline is free to all NC State University students, staff and faculty. An AllCampus Card is required to ride the bus. All Wolfline buses are fully accessible to the handicapped. Buses run around the Main Campus area and then run in a variety of directions servicing the outlying campuses, park & ride lots and University Housing such as the Avent Ferry Complex and ES King Village. There are 6 day routes and one evening route. Day buses operate every 15-40 minutes, depending on the route. Evening buses operate every 40 minutes.

Parking in the Park & Ride lots is free and no permit is required. Overnight parking is not permitted and violators are towed. During the summer, there are two Park & Ride lots. The Varsity Park & Ride is located south of Western Blvd., on the northeast corner of Varsity Dr. and Marcom St., just south of the McKimmon Center parking lot. The Westgrove Park & Ride lot is located north of Western Blvd., at Blue Ridge Rd. and Westgrove St. Westgrove St. is the first street to the north of the K-mart shopping complex.

For more information on Summer Service, call 515-WOLF at the start of the session. Pick up a Summer Wolfline Transit Guide. They are available all over campus and on the buses. Detailed information on bus service including timetables and maps is also available on our internet site. It is accessible by typing www.2.acs.ncsu.edu/trans/. The Transportation Department phone number is 515-3424.

TRANSCRIPTS

An official North Carolina State University transcript is a complete record of a student's academic work at the University. These transcripts are issued on official "SCRIP-SAFE" paper and carry the pre-printed signature of the University Registrar, the date of issue, and the pre-printed seal of the University.

An official transcript is issued only at the written request or authorization of the student concerned. Transcript requests must be made in writing, either by mail, FAX, or in person to the Department of Registration and Records, 1000 Harris Hall, Box 7313, North Carolina State University, Raleigh, North Carolina 27695-7313. FAX (919) 515-2376. TELEPHONE REQUESTS FOR TRANSCRIPTS WILL NOT BE HONORED.

When making a request, one must include one's full name (including any names one may have used while at NC State), social security number, date of birth, date of last attendance and the exact address (including ZIP code) where the transcript is to be sent.

Requests received in person or by mail must be accompanied by a check or money order for \$5.00. FAX requests must be accompanied by a Visa or MasterCard number and will be billed at the \$5.00 rate. NOTE: The transmittal of transcripts from the Department of Registration and Records via FAX will be billed to a Visa or MasterCard number at a cost of \$10.00 per transcript. These fees are nonrefundable.

Transcript requests will normally be processed at time of request. However, a longer period of time may be required for processing at the end of each session.

Official transcripts are not issued for those people who are indebted to the University until such indebtedness is paid or satisfactorily adjusted.

WITHDRAWAL FROM THE UNIVERSITY

A degree student who finds it necessary to drop all courses will initiate withdrawal from the University at the Counseling Center. (second floor) Student Health Center, 2815 Cates Avenue. A Lifelong Education student in the same circumstance initiates withdrawal from the University at the Summer Sessions Office, McKimmon Center, Gorman Street and Western Boulevard. A student who withdraws will not have any grades recorded. A student who discontinues attending classes without officially withdrawing will receive all 'F" grades.

The withdrawal deadline for undergraduates (regularly classified and Undergraduate Lifelong Education students) corresponds to the last day to drop a course at the 400-level or below; for graduate students (including Post-Baccalaureate students) the deadline for withdrawal corresponds to the last day to drop 500-900-level courses. (See the appropriate Summer Sessions Calendar for dates.)

SPECIAL NOTES

- Students planning to take courses in both the First and Second Sessions should plan their sequences well in advance. Offerings in the Second Session are often substantially less in number than in the First Session, and in some instances, departments do not offer courses in both summer sessions.
- Everything possible will be done to insure that the
 courses listed in this Bulletin will be given at the time
 indicated. However, the Director of Summer Sessions
 reserves the right to cancel courses in which enrollment is deemed insufficient.
- The maximum load for either session of the Summer Sessions is two courses plus a PE course for undergraduates and six hours for graduates. Any student
- may carry less. Regularly enrolled students who desire to carry more than seven hours must obtain the approval of the dean of the college in which they are enrolled. Students visiting from other institutions who wish to take more than the maximum must obtain the approval of the Director of Summer Sessions.
- 4. All Lifelong Education students (including those from other universities and colleges) are advised that NC State degree students are always given priority for Summer Sessions classes. Acceptance of the Registration Application for Lifelong Education students by the Summer Sessions Office in no way constitutes a guarantee that class space will be available.

PLANNING TO GRADUATE . . .

If you plan to graduate at the end of the Summer Sessions, there are a number of items that should be of interest to you.

NOTE: Degree recipients with outstanding balances of \$25 or greater will have their diploma withheld until all outstanding debts to the University are paid.

- You should submit an Application for Degree card for each degree you are to receive. This should be turned in to your department within two weeks after the beginning of the Session. If you submitted an Application for Degree card last semester, but did not graduate, it is necessary that you submit another Application for the Summer Sessions. Remember: If you are to receive two degrees, you must submit a separate application for each degree.
- Your local address and your official University correspondence address should be kept up-to-date. Also, the address you show on your Application for Degree card will be the address to which your diploma is mailed and also the address to which any correspondence from the University will be sent. Any changes should be made by reporting your new address to the Department of Registration and Records, 1000 Harris Hall, Box 7313, Raleigh, NC 27695-7313.
- If you are transferring hours from another university in order to graduate, this should be

done before the end of the Summer Sessions. If you are enrolled at another institution and that institution is unable to furnish an official transcript by the end of this Session, you must have that University's Registrar send to the Department of Registration and Records a letter showing the course and grade with an official school seal and Registrar's signature. This letter must be received by the end of the Summer Session.

- Correspondence course grades must be received, all "incompletes" and "late grades" cleared, and all fines and fees paid by the end of the Summer Session.
- If you are eligible to take reexamination, it must be taken no later than 30 days after the date of the intended graduation.
- If you would like to participate in the December, 2001 graduation exercises, contact your Dean's office at your earliest convenience. You will be placed on a mailing list to receive all necessary information about the graduation activities.

RESIDENCE STATUS CLASSIFICATION FOR TUITION PURPOSES

To qualify as a resident for tuition purposes, a person must have established legal residence (domicile) in North Carolina and maintained that legal residence for at least twelve months immediately prior to his or her classification as a resident for tuition purposes. To be eligible for classification as a resident for tuition purposes a person must establish that his or her presence in the State is, and during the requisite twelve month qualifying period was, for purposes of maintaining a bona fide domicile rather than of maintaining a mere temporary residence or abode incident to enrollment in an institution of higher education.

North Carolina General Statute (G. S.) 116-143.1 is the governing law concerning resident status classification and sets forth statutory definitions, rules and special provisions for determining resident status for tuition purposes. Copies of the law and implementing regulations are found in A Manual to Assist the Public Higher Education Institutions of North Carolina in the Matter of Student Residence Classification for Tuition Purposes which is available for inspection in the Office of Undergraduate Admissions, 112 Peele Hall. Special situations concerning minors, the military, service members and their military dependents, non-US citizens, and the effect of marriage on residence status are addressed in The Manual. It is the student's responsibility to initiate a review of their situation when classification or re-classification as a resident for tuition purposes is sought.

Summer Session Land Ten Week Session

Active military personnel assigned to North Carolina and their military dependents may be eligible to receive the benefit of the in-state tuition rate under G.S. 116-143.3. A student who qualifies for the in-state tuition rate under this statute is not considered a resident, but merely eligible for the benefit of the in-state tuition rate. Application for eligibility to be charged the in-state tuition rate under G.S. 116-143.3 must be made prior to initial enrollment or re-enrollment for which the student claims the benefit. Further application for such eligibility must similarly be made prior to the outset of each successive academic year of enrollment.

Under NC G.S. 116-143.5, any teacher or other personnel paid on the teacher salary schedule who has established a legal residence (domicile) of any duration in North Carolina and is employed full-time by a North Carolina public school shall be eligible to be charged the in-state tuition rate for courses relevant to teacher certification or to professional development as a teacher. Students qualifying under this statute will be required to supply information verifying their residence status (under NC G.S. 116-143.5) and employment status.

An administrative charge of 5% of the total tuition and fee, room rent, and meal plan charges not to exceed \$100 will be retained.

Students who withdraw after June 11, 2001 (First and Ten-Week Sessions), July 24, 2001 (Second Session) or drop a course(s) after May 25, 2001 (First and Ten-Week Sessions), July 9, 2001 (Second Session) may file a refund application appeal in the Student Accounts Section

of the University Cashier's Office. The appeal must be substantiated by medical reasons, unexpected employment changes, death in the immediate family, or University error and will be reviewed by the University Fee Appeals Committee. The deadline for filing a refund application appeal is June 22, 2001 (First and Ten-Week Sessions) and July 27, 2001 (Second Session).

FINANCIAL AID

Financial aid awards will be made for summer sessions with funds which are still available after the regular academic year. Federal College Work-Study, Federal Stafford Loans and/or Federal Perkins Loans will be given to eligible aid applicants whose academic programs require summer school attendance. Forestry and Geology Camp students, students who will complete graduation requirements in summer school, and students required to take summer courses in order to register for student teaching, field work, or similar programs are examples of students with priority for summer school funds. Students who receive Federal Work-Study or a Federal Pell Grant (if all Federal Pell Grant eligibility was not used during the academic year) should register for six credit hours in each summer session.

Students attending summer school for reasons other than those given in the previous paragraph will be eligible for University funds provided funds are available. Students requesting financial assistance for summer school must have a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) on file for the 2000-2001 academic year. In addition, a separate Summer School Institutional Financial Aid Application is required. Summer institutional aid applications will be available in the Office of Financial Aid beginning March 1, 2001. To be considered for financial assistance, all application materials must be submitted by the deadlines for each summer session indicated on that application.

In order to be considered for any type of financial aid, continuing students must have met the requirements for academic progress.

COUNSELING CENTER

The Counseling Center provides services designed to assist individuals in gaining a better understanding of themselves and their opportunities. Psychologists, professional counselors, and psychiatrists are available to evaluate and to work with students who have concerns such as: choosing a career; academic planning; identifying and coping with educational difficulties; developing greater self-understanding; drug and alcohol problems; developing more satisfying personal relations; and coping with stress or emotional crisis. Faculty members are encouraged to call if they have concerns about a student. All counseling is strictly confidential.

In addition to one-to-one and group counseling for individuals and couples, workshops are offered throughout the year in a variety of areas, including vocational exploration, test anxiety-reduction, and stress management.

Counseling services are available to all enrolled NC State students without cost except for a minimum materials charge for career testing. Appointments may be scheduled over the telephone by calling (919) 515-2424 or in person by coming to (2nd floor) Student Health Center, 2815 Cates Avenue. A counselor is on call 24 hours a day through Health Services, (919) 515-2563.

STUDENT HEALTH SERVICES

The Student Health Services offers health care to students on an outpatient basis. The staff includes full-time physicians, physician extenders, pharmacists, laboratory/x-ray technicians, nurses, physical therapists, health educators and other support staff.

The Health Services is open Monday-Friday, 8:00 a.m.-5:00 p.m. during the summer for outpatient medical care. Patients are seen by appointment. Medical appointments can be made in person or by calling 515-7107 Monday-Friday, 8:00 a.m.-4:30 p.m. Gynecology appointments can be made by calling 515-7762.

All currently registered students are eligible to use the Health Services. Medical care offered includes visits to a nurse and M.D., laboratory tests, x-rays, physical therapy and pharmacy medications. Many services are provided at no charge as part of the health fee included in the required fees paid by all students, including health education materials; consultations; crisis emotional and psychiatric support service. Students are responsible for the nominal cost assessed for certain services and for all services provided off-campus.

It is extremely important that students provide complete medical histories and immunization records to the Student Health Services. All health and medical information is confidential.

The University makes arrangements with an insurance company to offer group health insurance coverage to students. Remember that the student health fee does not provide for the cost of referrals to off-campus specialists for serious illnesses.

Health Promotion seeks to assist students in adopting a healthy lifestyle and behaviors through various out-

reach programs and intervention services. Visit room 2101 Student Health Center or call 515-9355.

Emergency Medical Procedures: If a student becomes ill or injured, the following procedures should be followed: 1) Telephone the University Public Safety Office (515-3333) and report the emergency; 2) Students needing emergency transport between campus locations and the Student Health Center may call the University Public Safety Office.

STUDENTS WITH DISABILITIES

HOUSING

RESIDENCE HALLS

During the 2001 Summer Sessions, housing will be provided in the residence halls on a first-come, first-served basis for men and women who are enrolled for one or more courses.

Assignment to a room for a Summer Session does not guarantee that a room will be available for the Fall Semester. A student must be accepted by NC State for Fall enrollment as a full-time student to be eligible to apply for University housing for the Fall Semester.

ROOM RENTALS AND APPLICATIONS

The rental rates for a five-week Session will be determined at a later date. You may contact University Housing in Suite 1112 Pullen Hall or telephone (919) 515-2440 as of April 2, 2001 for further housing reservation information.

Residents will be permitted to change rooms after the first week of classes with the approval of University Housing. Check-in will begin for Summer Sessions as follows:

FIRST SESSION-Tuesday, May 22, 2001 at 10:00 a.m. *SECOND SESSION-Tuesday, July 3, 2001 at 10:00 a.m. *Check-in date subject to change.

HOUSING REFUND POLICY

Cancellation of a room reservation must be made in writing as follows:

- (a) In person at University Housing in Suite 1112, Pullen Hall, Monday through Friday, between 7:30 a.m. and 5:00 p.m., on the cancellation form provided; or
- (b) By mail addressed to University Housing. Box 7315, NC State University, Raleigh, NC, 27695-7315.

The effective date of cancellation is the date notification is received at University Housing or the date the room

is vacated, whichever is later. Residents who have moved out of their rooms must follow established check-out procedures to avoid a charge for an improper check-out.

If the housing agreement is cancelled on or before the first day of classes, the rental fee paid will be refunded less a \$100 processing fee. If the housing agreement is cancelled AFTER 5:00 p.m. on the first day of classes, the housing charges will be a total of 50% of the session cost plus daily charges. In cases of medical withdrawals, however, a \$100 processing fee will be charged plus a daily charge from date of occupancy.

If a student fails to check in and secure his/her keys by 5:00 p.m. on the first day of classes, the housing agreement will be cancelled and the refund will be made as stated above

STUDENT FAMILY HOUSING

The University operates E.S. King Village as an apartment complex for students with families, single graduate students and non-traditional students. This complex consists of 295 apartments (115 studios, 148 one-bedroom, and 32 two-bedroom). FRATERNITY HOUSES

Several of the 20 fraternity houses located on or adjacent to the campus provide housing for Summer Sessions students. Twelve of the 20 houses are fully air-conditioned and all provide furnished rooms and living areas. In addition, some houses offer board plans during the summer months. NCSU LIBRARIES

The NCSU Libraries contains nearly 2.9 million volumes, 4.9 million microforms and 37,000 periodical titles. The collection is especially strong in the environmental, agricultural, physical, and mathematical sciences; genomic science; computer science and information technology; engineering; materials science; forest resources; and textiles. The main D. H. Hill Library houses the majority of these publications. D. H. Hill Library has been a depository for U.S. government publications since 1924 and is a full depository for U.S. patents.

Four branch libraries—the Burlington Textiles Library in the Textile Building on Centennial Campus, the Harrye B. Lyons Design Library in Brooks Hall, the Natural Resources Library in Jordan Hall, and the Veterinary Medical Library in the College of Veterinary Medicine—serve the special needs of those disciplines. Also affiliated with the NCSU Libraries are the Learning Resources Library in Poe Hall and the African American Cultural Center Reading Room in the Witherspoon Students

dent Center.

The NCSU Libraries' Web site (http://www.lib.ncsu.edu) offers access to a rich array of online resources. Users can search the library's catalog by author, title, subject, and keyword, and can search the collections of other libraries, including Duke, UNC-Chapel Hill, and North Carolina Central University (NCCU). Access to information resources in other libraries is available through interlibrary loan and via TRIPSaver, a service that supplies materials rapidly from Duke, UNC-CH, and NCCU. Borrower's cards are also available for students and faculty members who wish to use libraries on those three campuses.

Also available via the Libraries' Web site are a growing number of online resources, including periodical indexes, some with full-text articles; reference works such as online encyclopedias; electronic books and journals; statistical resources; spatial and numeric data for use with Geographic Information Systems; and digital special collections unique to NC State. These resources are available from both on- and off-campus locations, and librarians offer special services for distance learners to help them take advantage of information regardless of time or location. By using the MyLibrary@NCState customized interface, individuals can select and organize library and campus electronic resources by subject to create their own Web-based library environment. While in D. H. Hill Library or any of the four branches, users may borrow laptop computers as well.

In the Learning and Research Center for the Digital Age in the D. H. Hill Library, a scanning lab offers the ability to scan and digitize multimedia materials. The Media Center in D. H. Hill offers facilities and equipment for both individual and group use of audiovisual

media.

SUMMER ACTIVITIES

Through many curricular and extracurricular activities, the Summer Sessions provide special opportunities to those students engaged in summer study. Interesting, informative and entertaining programs and activities are scheduled for each session.

A few of the more popular activities and special features include the Carmichael Gym athletic and recreation programs and the varied activities sponsored by the University Student Center.

The University's regular program of student personnel services is available to summer students. It includes the Counseling Center for educational, career and per-

sonal counseling; the Planning and Placement Center for career planning and placement; the Residence Life and Residence Facilities offices for residence quarters; the Financial Aid Office for financial assistance; and the Student Health Services for medical care.

Beyond the campus, the city of Raleigh offers cultural and recreational opportunities of interest to students. The Raleigh Little Theater presents several productions during the summer, the North Carolina Museum of Art sponsors gallery concerts and exhibits, and there are several swimming pools and city and state parks located in and around Raleigh.

UNIVERSITY STUDENT UNION

The University Student Centers seek to create "A Perfect Union of Arts and Activities" for all members of the University family-students, faculty, staff, administration, alumni, and guests. The Union's funding is provided

by student fees and the programming is carried out in four buildings: Talley Student Center, Witherspoon Student Center, Price Music Center, and Thompson Building. The University Student Union consists of six arts programs: Center Stage, The Crafts Center, Dance Program, Gallery of Arts & Design, Music Department, and University Theatre, and a major activities program consisting of the Center for Student Leadership, Ethics, and Public Service (which includes the Leadership Library), Student Organizations Resource Center, Union Activities Board, and Women's Center.

The Talley Student Center and Witherspoon Student Center, located within two blocks of each other on Cates Avenue, provide a variety of programs and services designed to offer rest, relaxation and recreation, as well as cultural, social, leadership and artistic development. In addition, Talley Student Center is home to Student Legal Services, Chaplains' Cooperative Ministry, and Copy Center. Thompson Building houses University Theatre and The Crafts Center. The Price Music Center is the location of the Music Department.

Highlights of the University Student Union's Arts and Activities Programs during both Summer Sessions include: Union Activities Board (UAB) field trips, socials, and films (shown in the Campus Cinema located in Witherspoon Student Center); University Theatre's rolling repertory TheatreFest; and a full schedule of non-credit classes at The Crafts Center. ENGLISH LANGUAGE CENTER SUMMER INSTITUTE IN ENGLISH July 2-August 3, 2001

The Summer Institute in English at the NC State University English Language Center is a five-week, noncredit course of study of the English language and American culture. It is designed for individuals from other countries who intend to pursue university studies or specialized training programs in the United States. With an emphasis on developing competence in all aspects of En-

glish language usage, the program includes classroom instruction, use of language laboratories, and extensive opportunities for practicing English in actual communication situations. In addition, opportunities are available for students to become acquainted with life in the US.

The minimum age for applicants is 17 years. The Institute is open to all individuals from other countries who wish to attend. The Institute retains the right to refuse admission to a student who arrives more than two weeks late. Students who are unable to arrive in time for the start of the program should inform the Institute of the date of their arrival.

Admission to the Institute does not imply admission as a degree candidate at North Carolina State University or any other campus of the University of North Carolina.

The Institute is sponsored by Continuing and Professional Education and the Department of Foreign Languages and Literatures. All classroom work is conducted on the campus. Classes, including language laboratory practice sessions, are held five or six hours a day, Monday through Friday, from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. (Attendance at the Institute does not carry academic credit, although students who complete the program receive a certificate of attendance.)

The total cost of the five-week program is approximately \$2,670. The cost of the Institute is estimated on the basis of residence hall accommodations and meals. Incidental expenses, such as laundry, dry cleaning, entertainment, etc., are not included. (Room rent includes sheets and towels.)

COURSE LISTINGS

Courses are listed by department, departmental abbreviation and numerical designator. Semester hour credits for each course are given following the name of the course. Classes meet daily, Monday through Friday, except where specified to the contrary.

Freshman courses are numbered 100-199; sophomore courses are numbered 200-299; junior and senior courses are numbered 300-499. Courses numbered 500 and 600 are taught the Masters level and most are available to advanced undergraduates. Doctoral courses are numbered 700 and 800. Graduate courses numbered at the

500 and 700 levels are letter graded $(A+\dots F)$, while 600 and 800 level courses are S/U graded. Courses regularly letter graded $(A+\dots F)$ may not be taken for S/U grading by graduate students. Courses numbered in the 900 series are open to College of Veterinary Medicine students.

GENERAL INFORMATION

The Office of Adult Credit Programs & Summer Sessions is the contact point for individuals who have not been formally admitted to a degree program at the University but who wish to enroll in courses offered by the University. These "not-admitted" students (including Summer Visitors from other colleges and universities) are classified as "Lifelong Education students".

Essentially (and for the convenience of Lifelong Education students), the Office of Adult Credit Programs & Summer Sessions functions as a "branch office" of the Department of Registration and Records. Office of Admissions, University Cashier and Student Accounts Office, and a number of other University administrative offices.

Lifelong Education students should look to the Office of Adult Credit Programs & Summer Sessions for registration information, clarification of University policies and procedures, and for answers to other questions relative to taking courses at the University.

In general, Lifelong Education students may enroll in any course listed in this Summer Sessions Bulletin (day or night) provided they have satisfied any required prerequisites. Prerequisites are courses or levels of achievement that a student is expected to have completed successfully prior to enrolling in a course. A few classes are restricted to degree candidates only. Restrictive statements appear with the course listing in this Bulletin and/or the University's Course Catalog. Applicants are responsible for checking the Course Catalog to determine what prerequisites, if any, apply and to either satisfy the prerequisites or obtain from the instructor a written waiver of the prerequisites.

Before enrolling in an NCSU mathematics course, Lifelong Education students must talk with an adviser to determine eligibility for mathematics course registration. Telephone 515-2406 to talk with an adviser or to schedule an appointment. It is extremely important that students register for mathematics courses appropriate to their majors and their abilities. The NC State University Mathematics Placement Exam assesses mathematical skill for appropriate course placement.

Credits earned while registered as a Lifelong Education student accumulate on a transcript maintained by the Department of Registration and Records and may later be transferred to a degree program at NC State or by transcript to another college or university. NOTE: Lifelong Education students are required to adhere to the academic standards, policies, procedures, deadlines, etc. which apply to all students of the University.

Whether you are a new Lifelong Education student, one who is currently enrolled or one who is returning after an absence of a semester or more, you are strongly urged to read the information that is included in this section as well as the information pertaining to all students which is included in the first few pages of this Bulletin. Your attention should be specifically directed to the REGISTRATION INSTRUCTIONS.

The general classification of "Lifelong Education student" is divided into two categories depending on whether the student already has a baccalaureate degree or not. A listing of the applicable policies follows:

UNDERGRADUATE STUDIES (UGS)

To be eligible to register as an Undergraduate Studies student (UGS) for the Summer Sessions, a person should:

- have acquired a high school diploma or GED certificate; and
- 2. not be a degree candidate at North Carolina State University; or
- be a high school student who has been recommended by his/her school to take lower level courses through the established Academic Enrichment Opportunities (AEO) Program.

POST-BACCALAUREATE STUDIES (PBS)

The following policies apply to individuals who wish to register as Post-Baccalaureate Studies students (PBS):

1. All must have baccalaureate degrees from accredited institutions of higher education.

All classes taken for credit by PBS students will be graded in the usual manner that applies for the particular course (A+ through F, or S, U). All courses taken at NC State will show on the student's transcript. If the student is admitted as a graduate student, a maximum of nine hours may apply toward the minimum requirements of the degree for which the student is enrolled, including hours approved for graduate credit while classified as a senior, unclassified undergraduate or professional engineering student.

The grade point average (GPA) of a graduate student who has credits in the PBS classification will include only those PBS credits which become part of the Plan of Graduate Work. However, no course taken six (6) years prior to enrollment into a program will be considered in the GPA calcula-

tion.

4. Registration is limited to a maximum of two courses per session. Individuals who are employed full-time should limit their PBS registration to one course per session.

5. The PBS classification carries with it no implication that the student will be admitted to the Gradu-

ate School in any degree classification.

6. All course work accepted for degree credit must be approved by the student's advisory committee as being germane to the program. Requests for degree credit for courses completed in the PBS classification are considered after admission to a graduate degree program when the student's Plan of Graduate Work is filed with the Graduate School.

7. PBS students are expected to familiarize themselves with Graduate School policies and to seek further

advice or clarification as needed.

STUDENTS WITH DISABILITIES

Students desiring reasonable accommodations for their documented disability should contact Disability Services for Student (DSS), Suite 1900, Student Health Center, 2815 Cates Avenue 919-515-7653 (Voice) 919-515-8829 (TTY). Students needing assistance in scheduling courses should first meet with their academic advisers, then contact DSS as far as possible in advance of registration deadlines.

COUNSELING SERVICES

The Counseling Center provides services designed to assist individuals in gaining a better understanding of themselves and their opportunities. Psychologists, professional counselors, and psychiatrists are available to evaluate and to work with students who have concerns such as: choosing a career; academic planning; identifying and coping with educational difficulties; developing greater self-understanding; drug and alcohol problems; developing more satisfying personal relations; and coping with stress or emotional crisis. Faculty members are encouraged to call if they have concerns about a student. All counseling is strictly confidential.

In addition to one-to-one and group counseling for individuals and couples, workshop offerings vary throughout the year on topics such as vocational exploration, test anxiety-reduction, and stress management.

Counseling services are available to all enrolled NC State students without cost except for a minimum materials charge for career testing. Appointments may be scheduled over the telephone by calling (919) 515-2424 or in person by coming to (2nd floor) Student Health Center, 2815 Cates Avenue. A counselor is on call 24 hours a day through Health Services, (919) 515-2563.

ACADEMIC ADVISING

Assistance provided by the Office of Adult Credit Programs & Summer Sessions through Adult Services includes educational advisement, occupational information, general course selection and general University information. Talk with an adviser or schedule an appointment by calling (919) 515-7007.

If you intend to eventually apply for admission to a degree program, contact with an admissions officer is required. For information on all matters concerning admission to NC State, including transfer of credits from other universities and colleges, call the Office of Admissions,

(919) 515-2434.

If you are an Undergraduate Studies student (UGS) and you intend to enroll in a degree program in the College of Humanities and Social Sciences (CHASS), you may confer with the Coordinator of Evening Programs for CHASS. Appointments are available Monday through Thursday until 7:00 p.m. and may be scheduled by calling (919) 515-3638.

Each college or department has a coordinator of advising, who can assist any student who wants to major in the coordinator's area of study but is ineligible at the time to transfer into it. These Coordinators of Undergraduate Advising are listed in the General Information Section in the front of this Bulletin.

If you are a Post-Baccalaureate Studies student (PBS) and you intend to eventually enroll in a graduate degree program at NC State, you are urged to seek advice from

the department in which you intend to enroll.

ADMISSION OF LIFELONG EDUCATION STUDENTS AS REGULAR UNDERGRADUATE DEGREE CANDIDATES

Any Undergraduate Studies student (UGS) who has completed at least 30 semester credit hours of "C" or better college level course work, including a college-level math and college-level English course, may apply to the Office of Admissions for admission as a regular degree candidate. Programs that are experiencing space limitations require a higher minimum grade point average for admission. These 30 hours may include those earned at North Carolina State University and at other accredited colleges or universities. The cumulative NC State record must be satisfactory (2.0 or better) for consideration. Students should apply by the posted deadlines or at least six months before they expect to complete admissions requirements.

In addition, an adult Lifelong Education student who has no previous college experience may be considered for admission to a degree program upon completion of at least 15 hours of college level work with a "C" or better on each course at North Carolina State University, provided the record includes grades of "C" or better on at least one college-level English composition course and one college-level mathematics course appropriate to the student's desired major. Acceptance depends on space availability. The Undergraduate Admissions Office should be contacted (919/515-2434) to determine GPA requirements and programs experiencing space limitations.

An adult student seeking admission under the "Lifelong Education Student 15 Hour Provision" but having some previous college experience must either complete 15 hours at NC State satisfactorily (including ENG 111 and a college-level math, excluding MA 101, if not completed at another institution) and must have a cumulative 2.0 (higher for some programs) GPA on all college-level work attempted. Or, the student must complete sufficient hours satisfactorily at NC State so that

he/she has a total of 30 semester hours of satisfactory college-level work with a minimum cumulative 2.0 grade point average (higher for some programs).

If you graduated from high school after the spring of 1990, you must meet the Minimum Coursework Requirements (MCR) established by the University of North Carolina System Board of Governors with respect to high school course preparation. In order to be considered for admission, you must provide high school transcripts indicating the minimum requirements have been met. The following high school courses are required:

- 4 units in college preparatory English
- 3 units in mathematics, including Algebra I, Algebra II, and Geometry or a third mathematics course for which Algebra II is a prerequisite
- 2 units in social science, including US History
- 3 units in science, including a physical science, life science, and a laboratory course.

Students who graduated from high school before the spring of 1990 and/or students who are 24 years old or older are exempt from MCR.

If you do not meet these requirements, you can be considered for admission only if you have received an A.A., A.S., or A.F.A. degree or have completed 24 semester hours (36 quarter hours) in the required subject areas at an accredited college or university. You must complete six semester hours (9 quarter hours) in each of the following subject areas: English, mathematics, science, and social science. In addition, you must meet all other admissions requirements with regard to grade point average. Students may not make up MCR deficiencies at NC State.

COURSE LOAD

THE MAXIMUM COURSE LOAD FOR ALL LIFE-LONG EDUCATION STUDENTS (BOTH UGS AND PBS) IS TWO COURSES PLUS ONE PHYSICAL EDUCATION COURSE EACH SUMMER SESSION.

All Undergraduate Studies (UGS) students are charged at the undergraduate rate. SPECIAL NOTICES

1. Students registering during the Registration Period will be mailed a statement of tuition and fees a few days after the Registration Period ends. The statement must be returned with full payment or complete the Financial Aid/Scholarship/Sponsorship postcard and return by the indicated due date or the scheduled TRACS space will be cancelled. It is important to remember that it is the full responsibility of each student registering during the Registration Period-whether they receive a statement or not-to make full payment or provide complete financial aid information to the University Cashier's Office by the appropriate due dates for each summer session. Failure to make full payment or provide proper financial information will result in the irretrievable cancellation of the class schedule. The NCSU Cashier's Office Payment Form appearing on page 22 can be used if a statement is misplaced or not received.

2. Students registering during the Late Registration Period will not be required to clear tuition through the Cashier's Office in order to access TRACS. Only students with past due debts or departmental holds must have their accounts cleared by the Cashier's Office to access TRACS. Tuition, fees and the \$25.00 late registration fee, will be systematically added to the student's account when they register. Students late registering will be billed during the next Cashier's Office billing cycle.

Required fees are included in the rates listed above and must be paid by all students. Students are entitled to the services, facilities, and programs offered by the Student Center, Health Services, Transportation Office, Physical Education Department, and Athletics Department. An itemization of required fees will be provided upon request.

4. Upon adding course work that results in an increased rate, students should pay at Room 1101, Pullen Hall. The tuition and fees charge is based on the official number of hours and courses carried at 5:00 p.m. on May 25, 2001 (First Summer Session and Ten-Week Session) and July 9, 2001 (Second Summer Session).

 Returned Checks: A returned check fee of \$25 will be assessed for dishonored checks. The University has the right to cancel the registration of any student whose tuition and fees are paid with a "returned" check.

HOW TO ENROLL

All students (including Lifelong Education students) will use the TRACS system to enroll in the 2001 Summer Sessions. You will find detailed instructions on

using TRACS in the front section of this Summer Sessions Bulletin.

GAINING ACCESS TO TRACS

Continuing Lifelong Education students (those of you who are currently enrolled in the 2001 Spring Semester) have already been sent your Personal Identification Number (PIN), and may enroll by following the TRACS instructions. You are not required to complete the Lifelong Education Student Registration Application. Please note that it is absolutely imperative that you notify Registration and Records if your address should change.

Re-entering Lifelong Education students (you have been enrolled at NC State through the Office of Adult Credit Programs & Summer Sessions, but you are not currently enrolled in the 2001 Spring Semester) must complete the Reg-

istration Application and NC Residency Form which you will find in this section of the *Bulletin*. When you submit it to the Office of Adult Credit Programs & Summer Session by mail, by FAX, or in person at the McKimmon Center), you will be issued a PIN which will allow access to TRACS.

New Lifelong Education students (you have never been enrolled as a Lifelong Education student at NC State) must complete the Registration Application and NC Residency Form found in this section of the Bulletin. When you submit it to the Office of Adult Credit Programs & Summer Sessions (by mail, by FAX, or in person at the McKimmon Center), you will be issued a PIN which will allow access to TRACS.

TRACS REGISTRATION PERIODS

REGISTRATION. Entrance to TRACS is done by specific window access dates. Window access is based upon your current classification. All Lifelong Education students (UGS and PBS) who have obtained a PIN have a window access of April 4-May 8, 2001 for the First and Ten-Week Sessions and April 4-June 15, 2001 for the Second Session. The telephone lines will be open Monday through Friday from 7:30 a.m. to midnight and on Sunday from 2:00 p.m. to midnight. If you register during this time, your chances of enrolling in specific times and sections are much better than they will be later. You will be sent a bill for your tuition and fees and for any other debts (parking fines, overdue library book fines, etc.) that may have caused a "Hold" to be placed on your registration. Paying your tuition bill by May 10, 2001 at 5:00 p.m. for the First and Ten-Week Sessions and June 21, 2001 at 5:00 p.m. for the Second Session will result in your being mailed a confirming copy of the schedule you have created for yourself using TRACS. Failure to pay by these dates will result in your schedule being cancelled.

LATE REGISTRATION- A Late Registration Period will be held May 14 through May 25, 2001 for the First and Ten-Week Sessions and June 21 through July 9, 2001 for the Second Session. This is clearly the less preferred of the registration periods. Keep in mind that many courses and sections may have been filled by students who registered during the Registration Period. Detailed instructions for completing late registration will be available at the Office of Adult Credit Programs & Summer Sessions' Registration Desk in the McKimmon Center.

Students will not be required to pay tuition and fees in order access TRACS. Only students with past due debts or departmental holds must have their accounts cleared by the Cashier's Office to access TRACS. Tuition, fees and the \$25.00 NON-REFUNDABLE late registration fee, will be systematically added to the student's account when they register. Students late registering will be billed during the next Cashier's Office billing cycle.

NOTE: The TRACS system will be closed from 5:00 p.m. on May 8, 2001 until 7:30 a.m. on May 14, 2001 and from 5:00 p.m. on June 15, 2001 until 7:30 a.m.

on June 21, 2001.

DROP/ADD

Once you have initially registered, you may make schedule changes (drop/add) anytime TRACS is operational. You are encouraged to make your schedule changes as soon as you are aware that they need to be made.

TRACS will close officially at the end of the drop/add period (May 25, 2001 for the First and Ten-Week Sessions and July 9, 2001 for the Second Session). No adds will be allowed after these dates. NOTE: The May 25, 2001 date for the First and Ten-Week Sessions and July 9, 2001 for the Second Session is the last day to drop or withdraw with a refund or reduction in rates. Please refer to the Withdrawal Refund Policy on page 22.

All drops processed by Lifelong Education students after the dates listed above must be handled in person at the McKimmon Center Registration Desk.

Dropping ALL of the courses for which you are registered constitutes WITHDRAWING from the University. If you find it necessary to drop ALL of your courses, you must initiate the WITHDRAWAL process with the Office of Adult Credit Programs & Summer Sessions.

STUDENT IDENTIFICATION CARDS

North Carolina State University has a permanent photo ID/registration Card called the AllCampus Card. AllCampus Cards are used to gain access to various campus activities including: D. H. Hill Library, Student Health Service, physical education activities, Student Accounts, athletic events, and University Dining's meal plan program. The AllCampus Card is also the card used by debit account depositors to access their funds at University Dining locations, the NCSU Bookstore, and the University Laundry.

No fares are required on Wolfline buses of students showing a valid AllCampus Card.

Students continuing their studies during the Summer Sessions will use the cards they currently possess. New students can have their pictures taken and AllCampus Cards made at the West Dunn Building located on the corner of Dan Allen Drive and Thurman Drive.

Office hours will be extended until 7:00 p.m. on May 23 and again on July 5.

Lost/stolen cards can be replaced any regular business day at the AllCampus Office from 8:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. There is a nonrefundable \$15.00 service charge for this replacement. For additional information, telephone (919) 515-3090.

Grades are provided toll free and are available telephonically during the exam period until

approximately two weeks in the next succeeding session or semester.

IN WRITING:

A printed copy of summer session grades will be issued only at the written request or authoriza tion of the student concerned. The written request should be submitted after the first day of classes, but before the last day of classes, each session and should include the following information: student's full name, student identification number and correct correspondence address. Requests for printed summer session grade reports should be mailed to: Department of Registra-

tion and Records, Box 7313, NCSU, Raleigh, NC 27695-7313.

IN PERSON:

Students may come in person to the Department of Registration and Records, 1000 Harris Hall, and request a printed copy of grades for their last enrolled term. The student should see one of the Student Services Representatives and show a picture I.D. to receive grades. Office hours are

8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday.

NC STATE STUDENT RIGHT-TO-KNOW DISCLOSURE

Data from The University of North Carolina Administration show that of the first-time bachelor degree-seeking freshman students who entered NC State in Fall 1993, 64.6% have graduated with a baccalaureate degree from NC State, and an additional 4.5% have transferred and received a baccalaureate degree from another UNC

system institution as of Fall 1999. In addition 4.3% of the 1993 freshmen cohort were still enrolled at NC State and 2.0% were still enrolled at another UNC system institution as of Fall 1999. This information is provided pursuant to requirements of the Student Right-to-Know and Campus Security Act of 1990.

LATE DROPS OR WITHDRAWALS

The deadlines for dropping a course(s) or withdrawing from the University (dropping all courses for which enrolled) are listed under "Important Dates for Summer

2001" (above).

THE UNIVERSITY'S OFFICIAL DROP (WITH-DRAWAL) DEADLINES APPLY TO ALL CURRENTLY ENROLLED STUDENTS INCLUDING LIFELONG EDUCATION STUDENTS. It is considered that after the last day of the official drop period a student has become a partner in an implied contract with the University to continue until the end of the session. Therefore, with-drawals without academic penalty are granted only when exceptional circumstances exist.

Lifelong Education students may petition to receive late withdrawals under the following three conditions:

 Certification by a physician of inability to continue for medical reasons. Such medical petitions must be on the physician's letterhead. Certification by an employer of inability to continue for work-related reasons. Such certifications must be on the employer's letterhead and signed by a supervisor.

3. Verification by the Office of Adult Credit Programs & Summer Sessions of a documented hardship other than medical or work-related. The hardship must be one normally beyond the student's control or for which the consequences were reasonably unforesee-

able.

A letter of petition from the student should accompany the documentation noted above. Petitions for late drops or withdrawals for Lifelong Education students must be initiated at the Registration Desk, McKimmon Center and approved by the Office of Adult Credit Programs & Summer Sessions. Call (919) 515-2265 for additional information.

FIRST-YEAR COURSE REPEAT POLICY

(For courses first attempted Fall 1995 and afterwards)

Effects

■ The eligible student who repeats a course while electing that the first-year course repeat policy apply will have the grade points and the credit hours attempted and earned on the first completion of the course removed from the calculation of the cumulative grade point average and from the calculation of the total hours attempted regardless of the grade earned on the second attempt. The modification of the cumulative grade point average which will result from the removal of the grade points and credit hours attempted and earned on the first completion of the course will be calculated and recorded on the student's record after the second completion of the course.

The course title and grade for the first completion will be shown on the official record with a code (R) to indicate that it was repeated and the first grade was removed from the computation of the cumulative

grade point average.

The recorded grade point average of the student for the semester in which the course was originally taken

will not be changed.

Repeating a course and exercising the first-year course repeat policy does not retroactively change the status of the student as to semester academic honors, academic warning, probation, or suspension in prior semesters. Many graduate and professional schools recompute grade point averages in the process of considering an applicant for admission to such programs. This recomputation of grade point averages may include restoring the cumulative grade point average effects of initial attempts at courses repeated under this policy.

Eligibility

The initial attempt and the repeat under this policy must be an NC State course;

The course being repeated was completed for the first time after the Summer Session II 1995;

The course being repeated must be at the 100or 200 level;

■ The student received a grade below C- in the course that is repeated; and

Both attempts of the course were for letter grades; no unsuccessful audits or credit only attempts may be repeated nor may the repeats under the policy be made for audit or credit only;

The student has not received credit for an advanced course dealing with the same subject matter as the

course being repeated;

■ The first attempt of the course must have occurred within 12 months of the student's initial enrollment in any classification at NC State; this period is not lengthened by voluntary or involuntary failure to

enroll in subsequent semesters or summer sessions, nor by enrolling at less than a minimum full time load, following the initial date of enrollment;

The second attempt is for the same course or for an approved substitute course (see "Listing of Approved Substitute Courses for the First-Year Course Repeat

Policy");

The second attempt occurs in a regular semester or summer session which ends within 12 months of completion of the first attempt of the course; if the course is not available during that period or if the student is not enrolled when it is available, then the second attempt must occur in the next regular semester during which the student is enrolled at NC State and the course is available:

■ The total number of courses repeated by the student under this policy will not exceed two (2) courses nor will the total of the hours of such courses exceed eight (8) hours, nor will the total number of courses repeated under this policy combined with those repeated under the Course Repeat Without Penalty Policy exceed three (3) courses nor will the total hours of

such courses exceed twelve (12) hours;

The Application for First-Year Course Repeat is filed by the student with the Department of Registration and Records on or before the "last day to drop a course without a grade for courses at the 400 level and below" of the semester or summer session in which the course is repeated.

Procedures

Students are advised to consult with their academic advisers in making the decision to elect a course

repeat under this policy.

■ The student must submit an Application for First-Year Course Repeat to the Department of Registration and Records on or before the last day to drop a course without a grade at the 400 level or below of the semester or summer session in which the course is repeated. Forms may be obtained from faculty advisers, departmental coordinators of advising, associate deans for academic programs, and the Department of Registration and Records.

Warning Regarding Timing of Filing Necessary Forms

This policy requires the election of the repeat under the policy to be made early in the semester during which the repeat of the course is being attempted.

MATHEMATICS ALTERNATIVES FOR ADULT STUDENTS

Mathematics is a stumbling block for many adults, more so than most other courses. However, it is reasonable to expect that anyone capable of doing college-level work is capable of mastering mathematics through introductory calculus without undue stress. It is a matter of approaching the subject systematically and progressively, not attempting more advanced concepts and skills until proficient in preliminary and prerequisite concepts and skills. Some guidelines are:

 Introductory calculus (MA 121, MA 131) requires a sound and current background in a precalculus course (MA 107). MA 141 requires such a background in MA 111 or MA 107 and MA 108.

2. The precalculus courses (MA 107 and MA 111) assume a minimum of recent successful completion of two years of high school algebra and one year of formal geometry. Students who lack mastery of algebra but have been exposed to two years of high school algebra can take an intermediate algebra course (MA 101), a course that reviews main topics covered in high school Algebra I and Algebra II. This course is not recommended for beginning algebra students or for students whose past algebra work in high school was especially poor. This type of student should first study beginning algebra at another school such as a community college.

Generally, it is advisable to enroll in the highest level course you can handle and for which you satisfy all prerequisites unless you are extremely anxious about the subject. If you really feel very little confidence in your math ability, then take particular care in selecting your first course.

4. Some persons are sufficiently apprehensive about mathematics that they benefit from assistance in overcoming this anxiety prior to or concurrently with enrolling in a mathematics refresher program. The Counseling Center offers workshops on academic related issues such as study skills, test anxiety, time management, and test taking. Individual assistance is also provided for personal, academic, and vocational issues.

5. Once enrolled in a math course, a source of on-going assistance is the Mathematics Audio-Visual Tutorial Center in 244 Harrelson Hall, (919) 513-2300. Also, subject to availability of funds, Tutorial Sessions which provide additional help in some math courses are offered in the evening. The schedule for these Sessions will be posted on the bulletin

board near Harrelson 244.

6. If you need more help in determining where to start, especially with other than introductory courses, talk with the Coordinator of Classroom Instruction, Department of Mathematics, 255 Harrelson Hall, (919) 513-2288. If you are relatively certain you need to start with an elementary course, but wish more information, talk with the coordinator of MA 101, Department of Mathematics, Science and Technology Education, 326 Poe Hall, (919) 515-2239.

NOTE: The NC State University Lifelong Education Mathematics Placement Exam assesses mathematical skill for appropriate course placement. Before enrolling in an NCSU mathematics course, Lifelong Education students must talk with an adviser to determine eligibility for mathematics course registration. Telephone 515-2406 to talk with an adviser or to schedule an appointment.

TRANSCRIPTS

An official North Carolina State University transcript is a complete record of a student's academic work at the University. These transcripts are issued on official "SCRIP-SAFE" paper and carry the pre-printed signature of the University Registrar, the date of issue, and the pre-printed seal of the University.

An official transcript is issued only at the written request or authorization of the student concerned. Transcript requests must be made in writing, either by mail. FAX, or in person to the Department of Registration and Records, 1000 Harris Hall, Box 7313, North Carolina State University, Raleigh, North Carolina 27695-7313. FAX (919) 515-2376. TELEPHONE REQUESTS FOR TRANSCRIPTS WILL NOT BE HONORED.

When making a request, one must include one's full name (including any names one may have used while at NC State), social security number, date of birth, date of last attendance and the exact address (including ZIP code) where the transcript is to be sent.

Requests received in person or by mail must be accompanied by a check or money order for \$5.00. FAX requests must be accompanied by a Visa or MasterCard number and will be billed at the \$5.00 rate. NOTE: The transmittal of transcripts from the Department of Registration and Records via FAX will be billed to a Visa or MasterCard number at a cost of \$10.00 per transcript. These fees are nonrefundable.

Transcript requests will normally be processed at time of request. However, a longer period of time may be required for processing at the end of each semester.

Official transcripts are not issued for those people who are indebted to the University until such indebtedness is paid or satisfactorily adjusted.

NC STATE SUMMER PARKING INFORMATION

North Carolina State University has available parking during summer school. All students, faculty, and staff must display a valid parking permit between the hours of 7:30 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday. Permits and permit information can be obtained at the Transportation Office located in the Administrative Services Center on Sullivan Drive. For more information visit our website at www.2.acs.ncsu.edu/trans/.

For those students who want to park their personal vehicle on campus during the summer:

- 1. Please bring your AllCampus Card or valid ID when
- purchasing a parking permit.

 2. Permits are sold based on availability in each zone.
 The cost of the permit is prorated, based on the date
 of purchase.
- Summer school permits are valid for both sessions and there are no refunds given for summer school permits once purchased.
- 4. Students whose classes begin after 5:00 p.m. can park on campus without a parking permit in any unreserved space/lot between 5:00 p.m. and 7:30 a.m. Monday through Friday, weekends and official University holidays. You may not park in spaces marked "24 hour reserved", accessibility spaces, fire lanes, no parking areas, grass or the sidewalks at any time.

Regularly scheduled Wolfline bus service is available through all summer sessions. The Wolfline is free to all NC State University students, staff and faculty. An AllCampus Card is required to ride the bus. All Wolfline buses are fully accessible to the handicapped. Buses run around the Main Campus area and then run in a variety of directions servicing the outlying campuses, park & ride lots and University Housing such as the Avent Ferry Complex and ES King Village. There are 6 day routes and one evening route. Day buses operate every 15-40 minutes, depending on the route. Evening buses operate every 40 minutes.

Parking in the Park & Ride lots is free and no permit is required. Overnight parking is not permitted and violators are towed. During the summer, there are two Park & Ride lots. The Varsity Park & Ride is located south of Western Blvd. on the northeast corner of Varsity Dr. and Marcom St.. just south of the McKimmon Center parking lot. The Westgrove Park & Ride lot is located north of Western Blvd., at Blue Ridge Rd. and Westgrove St. Westgrove St. is the first street to the north of the Kmart shopping complex.

For more information on Summer Service, call 515-WOLF at the start of the semester. Pick up a Summer Wolfline Transit Guide. They are available all over campus and on the buses. COMPUTING AT NC STATE - YOUR UNITY ACCOUNT - REGISTERING FOR CLASSES VIA THE WEB

Unity is NC State University's distributed computing environment. All Lifelong Education students have access to this computing network and many information sources on campus and around the world. Through this network, students can obtain access to the Internet, various software applications, and e-mail. In addition to being an invaluable research tool, the Internet provides students vast information about NC State University (including information on admission, colleges and curricula, financial aid, libraries, registration and records, student accounts, etc.) via the University's web site located at http://www.ncsu.edu. Many instructors also use the Unity system as an integral part of their courses. Continuing students have immediate access to their unity account. For new and re-entering students, a Unity ac

count is automatically generated within a couple of days following the processing of the Lifelong Education Student Registration Application. Login IDs and additional details regarding use of the system may be obtained from Computing Services consultants. Call 515-HELP (4357), or stop by Room 208, Hillsborough Building. Information regarding the Unity system is also available at http://www2.ncsu.edu/ncsu/cc/pub/unity.html. EVENING DEGREE PROGRAMS

Students who work full-time during the day or have other extensive daytime responsibilities may be able to complete an undergraduate degree during the evening hours at NC State. While NC State does not have an "evening college" or separately administered evening degree programs, NC State does allow students admitted to degree programs to attend classes on a part-time, as well as a full-time, basis. Students arrange their own class schedules each semester from University course offerings and may choose evening classes, daytime classes, or a combination of the two.

The University and the College of Humanities and Social Sciences (CHASS) try very hard to assure that courses to meet the bachelor of arts general education requirements will be offered in the evening hours over the course of several semesters. In addition, a number of departments in CHASS make enough course work available in the evening hours within several years that students in selected majors are able to pursue a degree in the evening. These majors include:

- Communication (Public and Interpersonal Communication and Public Relations options)
- English (including the Rhetoric, Writing and Language option)
- History
- Multidisciplinary Studies (see below for further information)
- · Political Science
- Sociology (including Criminology)
- Spanish

For further information about these degree programs, contact Lynda Hambourger, Coordinator of Evening Programs, CHASS, (919) 515-3638.

Evening degree students may make use of transfer credits, credit-by-examination credits, and CLEP (College-Level Examination Program) credits to complete degree requirements. They may also use credits earned through cable-TV courses, videocassette courses, and

Independent Studies (correspondence) courses. These last options are discussed in more detail below.

CHASS undergraduate evening degree students may receive registration materials through the mail. To be put on the mailing list, such students should contact Lynda Hambourger, Coordinator of Evening Programs, CHASS, (919) 515-3638.

MULTIDISCIPLINARY STUDIES CONCENTRATIONS FOR EVENING STUDENTS

A bachelor of arts degree in multidisciplinary studies (MDS) may be an attractive option for adult evening students for several reasons:

Because it follows the CHASS general education requirements, the MDS degree provides students with the writing, speaking, and critical thinking skills and the knowledge of our own and other cultures characteristic of a strong liberal arts education.

• Under the MDS program, students have the opportunity to design their own majors by organizing a concentration or field of specialization from two or more academic disciplines. For example, a concentration in Business Organization and Communication might combine courses in business management, communication, and computer science. A concentration in American Studies might combine courses in English, history, and political science. A concentration in Advertising might combine courses in business management, English, and psychology. In addition to using NC State evening courses (such departments as Accounting, Business Management, Communication, Computer Science, Economics, English,

Foreign Languages and Literatures, History, Mathematics, Political Science, Psychology, and Sociology and Anthropology offer upper-level undergraduate courses in the evening hours), evening students may also use transfer courses, independent study courses, and, if their schedule permits, NC State daytime courses, to build their major concentration.

• The MDS program allows a large number of free elective credits, giving students room to put transfer and other previously earned credits that do not meet general education or major (concentration) requirements. For students who do not have a large number of transfer credits, these free elective slots may be used to pursue a minor course of study in one of the departments that offers sufficient evening courses or to take other course work of interest.

MDS concentrations are designed with the help of an adviser and must meet MDS guidelines and be approved by the faculty MDS committee. For further information, contact Lynda Hambourger, Coordinator of Evening Programs, CHASS, (919) 515-3638.

THE MALS PROGRAM

The Master of Arts in Liberal Studies degree at NC State is a broad, interdisciplinary program of part-time graduate study that integrates and expands awareness and that is geared to a student's personal interests. Each student, in consultation with an academic adviser, designs an individual program of study. This curriculum will be based on an interdisciplinary theme or topic that is of intrinsic interest to the student or that relates to the student's professional or vocational interests. Students will have the opportunity to take regular courses from a number of NC State departments. They will also take special MALS seminars designed specifically for the MALS program and taught by "master teachers" at NC State.

The degree requirements consist of 30 credits of course work, or 10 three-credit-hour courses, including:

1) three MALS seminars

2) six courses that make up the student's interdisciplinary concentration

3) a three-credit-hour culminating project

Students will be free to design their own individual six-course interdisciplinary concentrations. Examples of concentrations that are well supported by graduate courses, presently in the NC State curriculum are:

Science, Technology, and Society

National and International Issues and Decision-Making The American Experience

CERTIFICATE PROGRAMS

NC State offers several Certificate Programs which are structured packages of courses intended to provide specific knowledge and skills for persons who either do not need or want a complete degree program in the subject. These programs are expressly for Lifelong Education students

Although every class may not be offered in the evenings every semester, the selection usually permits the student to complete the program in approximately two years.

AND EVENING CLASSES SCHEDULE OF

The following afternoon and evening classes are scheduled primarily for the convenience of Lifelong Education students and Evening Degree students who are unable to attend day classes.

Freshman courses are numbered 100-199; sophomore courses are numbered 200-299; junior and senior courses are numbered 300-499. Courses numbered 500 and 600 are taught the Masters level and most are available to advanced undergraduates. Doctoral courses are numbered 700 and 800. Graduate courses numbered at the 500 and 700 levels are letter graded (A+ . . . F), while 600 and 800 level courses are S/U graded. Courses regularly letter graded (A+ . . . F) may not be taken for S/U grading by graduate students. Courses numbered in the 900 series are open to College of Veterinary Medicine students.




